P. Cassin, is also very badly hurt, these three it is thought, must die. I saw poor Rogers as he lay on the floor of the adjoining house; he was perfectly sensible, but writhing in the most excruciating agony; long will it be before I forget his heart rending groans and fruitless entreaties for help. The physicians having done all they could do were obliged to stand inactive spectators of his misery.
