**A BY-LAW.**

A Supplement to a By-Law passed July 10th, 1835, entitled, "A By-Law compensating the City Commissioners."

**JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND, DECEMBER SESSION, 1837.**

WEDNESDAY, December 27th, 1837.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

William F. Giles, Solomon Hillen, Jr., and Henry McKinnell, Esquires, delegates returned for the city of Baltimore, and Stephen N. C. White, Esquire, a delegate returned for Montgomery county, severally appeared, qualified, and took their seats.

Mr. Harrison presented a petition of Jonathan Crane, of Queen Anne's county, praying that the clerk of Queen Anne's county may be authorized to insert the date of a deed and so knowledge in the same.

Mr. Blocher obtained leave to bring in a supplement to an act, to accept the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled, an act for the continuation and repair of the Cumberland Road, in the States of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, passed at December session, 1834, chapter 208.

Mr. Merrick submitted the following order, Ordered, That there be appointed by the Chair a special committee to consist of seven members, which shall be denominated the Committee on the Currency, and whose duty it shall be diligently and carefully to inquire into the state and condition of the circulating medium in use in this State, and into the situation, practices and condition of each and every of the banking institutions of the State, and to the end that their enquiries shall be as perfect as possible, they shall have power to send for, and cause to be brought before them, persons and papers, and to examine said persons upon oath, and a full report thereon to make to this House as early a day as conveniently may be, accompanied by such bill or bills for the remedy of existing evils as, upon a full view of the subject referred to them, they may judge to be necessary or expedient.

Which was twice read.

Mr. Bowie moved to amend said order, by striking out "seven," and inserting in lieu thereof "nine."

Determined in the negative.

Mr. Alexander moved to amend said order by striking out "seven," and inserting in lieu thereof "five."

Determined in the negative.

Mr. Turner, of Baltimore county, offered as a substitute for said order, the following: Gentlemen of the Senate,

We propose with your concurrence the appointment of a joint committee of three from this House to act conjointly with such committee as your Honorable body may think proper to appoint, to examine into the condition of the Banks of this State, and inquire into the cause of the suspension of specie payments, and redemption of their notes, in conformity with the stipulation of their charters, and that said committee have full power to examine the books and papers with the amount of specie and other available property or assets on hand, and that said committee be authorized and empowered to take testimony on oath, if necessary, with a due regard to the faithful discharge of their duty, and that they have power to send for persons and papers, and that said committee make report of their investigation to this House as early a day as practicable.

Which was twice read.

On the question being put, will the house adopt the substitute;

It was determined in the negative.

The question then recurred upon the order as offered by Mr. Merrick;

On motion of Mr. Causin, said order was amended by adding at the end thereof the following:

"And be it further ordered, that the said committee be instructed to examine into and report the causes of the suspension of specie payments by the Banks, and to report to this house such remedies as in their opinion may tend to effect a permanent guard against any future suspension."

The said order was then read as amended and adopted.

Messrs. Hopewell and Parker, the committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Governor and inform him that a quorum of the house convened, were ready to proceed to business, and receive any communication he might be pleased to
