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MOST HORRIBLE.

There has never come within our notice a case of moral turpitude equal to the following:—A black woman, named Sarah Henry, having, it is said, an animosity against another woman of her color, enticed her out on the common beyond Federal Hill on Saturday night, after getting her intoxicated with the liquor to which she had treated her. When they were on the common, Sarah tied the arms of the other negro woman, to prevent her resistance, and then set fire to her clothes. The wretched woman was burnt from the head to the feet almost to a crisp. Though the injury inflicted has not yet produced death, there is every reason to suppose that she cannot survive. Sarah Henry was arrested yesterday by officer Smith, and committed by Esquire Gray for further hearing.—Sun.

RESURRECTION OBITUARY.

Although there are constantly occurring among us calamities—caused too often by the most criminal disregard of human life and suffering—which awaken our deepest sympathies, seldom have the feelings of a whole community been more strongly excited than by the recent loss of the Pulaski, with her numerous passengers. To think of such a dumb of our fellow-creatures, and among them those whom we have known, respected, and loved, in a moment hurried from life, or dying only after hope had fled, and nature had exhausted, and then to reflect on the wide-spread desolation, the sorrow for which earth has no cure, consequent on such a calamity, brings before the mind a degree of human suffering at which we involuntarily shrink back, and are tempted to ask, why has God permitted it?

Among all the affecting incidents to which the destruction of this vessel has given rise, none have reached us more touching, more sad, yet at the same time mingled with so much that is consoling to the Christian, than those connected with the fate of the Rev. J. Loting Woart and his wife.

Mr. Woart was on his return from his adopted home, the scene of his usefulness and his labors, to the home of his childhood, a home consecrated by the holiest affections, and filled with a thousand sweet associations, where many hearts that rejoiced not only in the past, but still more in the consciousness of his present usefulness, were anxiously awaiting his coming, and joyfully anticipating the hour of meeting. But that meeting God, in his wise providence, had ordained should not be on earth; and instead of the loved and long-expected one, came the sad messenger of his sufferings and death. But who shall tell the bitter anguish of those from whom he is thus suddenly taken, of the relatives and friends left to mourn his early death? To them earthly comfort is indeed vain—heavily has the blow fallen; yet even in the cup of sorrow thus poured out, God in mercy has mingled consolation.

Mr. Woart was fitted for college at Newburyport, under the care of the Hon. Caleb Cushing, and entered Harvard University in 1824. He graduated with honor in 1829, in a class distinguished for the number of its excellent scholars, and which has already been called to mourn over many of its choicest and brightest members. For seven years after leaving college, he resided in the family of Col. Stonow, of Virginia, as a private tutor, and then entered the Episcopal Theological Seminary at Alexandria. On his admission to the order of deacons, he became the principal of a large and flourishing school near Alexandria, where he remained about two years, often performing divine service and preaching in the neighborhood, when he was invited to the charge of the ancient parish of Swedesborough, in New Jersey, was admitted to the holy order of priests, and instituted rector of — church. Shortly before his removal to Swedesborough, he was married to Miss Elizabeth West, daughter of Richard West, Esq., of Maryland; and in about a year, found himself obliged to resign the charge of his church, and seek, under the milder skies of France, the restoration of his wife's health, which always delicate, had been for some time rapidly failing. After a residence of some months in the south of France, which in a remarkable degree effected the object of the voyage, he returned to the United States; and as a warm climate was still deemed essential to the health of Mrs. Woart, he was induced, much to the regret of his friends at the north, to proceed to Tallahassee, in Florida, and become the rector of St. John's Church in that city. At this place he continued, with the exception of his visits to the north, during the unhealthy season, until the commencement of the present summer, when he left as usual to visit his friends in Maryland and New England. On his way he embarked with his wife at Savannah on board the unfortunate Pulaski.

The rest of his sad story is too well known; the heart-rending description of the loss of the packet, and of the sufferings of those of her passengers who did not at once find a grave in the Atlantic, has been read by all. It is needless here to recount the sufferings of the last few days of his life—to speak of the hope which kindled with each rising sun, only to sink in disappointment at its setting,—and of the gra-
