The examination of Franklin Camper, charged with the nurder of Martin Reagan, on the 12th instant, was resumed this morning, at the Court House; Justices Goddard and Morsell presiding, and the Mayor of Washington present.

the Mayor of Washington present. Every part of the court-room was crowded almost to sufficiently and the interest over the length and breadth of our city was probably never exceeded. Without the slightest desire to create preindice against the unfortunate man. I have only to say that the evidence throughout for the prosecution has been sust ined in a remarkable manner; remarkable that, after the labors and riots of the few previous hours—surrounded by the fiery element and its consequent distress to the sufferens—the general excitement and probably another fight in prospect, the recollections of the basy actors in the scene should have been so distinct, as to time, to persons, and localities.

The evidence of John Clarvoe, who declares himself to have been the companion of Camper, witnessed his assant on the deceased; saw his companion unke a blow or plunge, which must have been with the knile, into the heart's blood of the apparently unoffending victim, the weapon drawn therefrom recking with gore, and deliberately returned to the pocket of the perpetrator, was thrilling in the extreme, producing a shudder through every heart present. I need scarcely add that Franklin Camper stands fully committed for trial at the next term of the Crimical Court.

On vesterday officer Edward G. Handy proceeded to Annapolis and received from the Governor of Maryland a requisition for the body of William L. Chaplin. Hon. Judge Cranch immediately directed that Chaplin be surrendered up accordingly, unless there were charges against him which required his recention neve. These being the encounter Mr. C. will remain until his case shall be disposed of by the Court of this District.
