A Dead House.—We have frequently thought that some place should be set aside in Baltimore as a dead house, where dead bodies might be kept for a time to allow some opportunity for recognition. A case in point, to show the propriety of it, occurred on Wednesday. A man was drowned about twelve o'clock, found immediately afterwards, an inquest held, and in a short time afterwards buried. No one knew him—nor was there anything about him, by which he could be recognized. He was buried without being known. Had there been a dead house, the body might have been kept very easily for twenty-four hours, and during that time the probability is, it would have been recognized and claimed by friends. There are strong reasons for appropriating some suitable place for the purpose.

Dedication.—We understand that a building designed for religious worship, will be dedicated on Sunday next, at the iron works of Robert Howard, Esq., at Stemmer's Run, about seven miles from the city, on the farm, called, we believe, "Locust Grove." The house, we are tolerably confident we are not wrong in saying, was built at the personal expense of Mr. Howard, who was desirous of having a place dedicated to the service of the Most High, where those employed by him, and others in the vicinity could repair. All denominations have been invited to participate in the ceremonies, and all denominations will be permitted, if they choose, alternately to fill the pulpit. This will give an opportunity to the neighborhood to hear various preachers, and afford a chance to the different religious societies to do good in their own way.

City Court.—The case of the State v. Stirling, indicted for the outrage upon Margaretta Eheman, was taken up on Wednesday morning, and still occupies the attention of the court. The testimony having been published heretofore, as fully as delicacy would permit, it has been deemed inexpedient to burden our columns with it again. The case is conducted by the attorney general for the State, assisted by Mr. Hamilton; and for the defence Messrs. Walsh Lovegrove and O'Neil are engaged.

Volunteers in the County.—We learn that a fine company of volunteers, calling themselves the Mechanicsville Riflemen, has been organized at Mechanicsville, in the neighborhood of Woodberry Factory, Baltimore County.—They number at present 53 men, and have elected Mr. Samuel Hall captain; Mr. Richard Armicost 1st lieutenant, and Mr. Amos Cox 2d do. Their uniform is to be gray, trimmed with yellow. They will rank among the noblest sons of "Old Maryland," who are always ready to defend their country's rights.
