

MHHD VISION & MISSION

The target ethnic/racial groups shall include African Americans, Hispanic/Latino Americans, Asian Americans and Native Americans.

October 1 Summit—Health Disparities: Impact on Business and Economics

On Wednesday, October 1, 2008 the *Health Disparities: Impact on Business and Economic Summit* took place in the President's Conference Center of the Miller Senate Building in Annapolis. The Summit was sponsored by the Maryland General Assembly; the Health and Government Operations Committee Minority Health Disparities Subcommittee; and the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, Office of Minority Health and Health Disparities. Additional support was provided by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Minority Health, and CareFirst BlueCross BlueShield.

The Summit's purpose was to discuss how health disparities impact the cost and quality of healthcare. Participants were provided with examples of how the costs of health disparities impact business productivity; city, state, and federal budgets; health care delivery systems; minority populations; and the entire population.

Opening remarks were provided by Lt. Governor Anthony G. Brown; Chairman Peter A. Hammen; Speaker of the House Michael E. Busch; and Delegate Shirley Nathan-Pulliam. Dr. Brian D. Smedley of The Joint Center for Political and Economic Studies served as Summit Moderator.

The Government Panel included: Dr. Garth N. Graham, Office of Minority Health, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services;



Secretary John M. Colmers, Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene; Secretary Thomas E. Perez, Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation; and Dr.

Robert S. Gold, University of Maryland College Park, School of Public Health. Panelists spoke on how local, state, and federal government can play a role in effective public health systems.

The Business Panel included : Ms. Carmela Coyle, Maryland Hospital Association; Mr. Forest Harper, Pfizer, Inc.; Dr. Thomas A.

LaVeist, Hopkins Center for Health Disparities Solutions, Bloomberg School of Public Health; and Mr. John R. Miller, MidAtlantic Business Group on Health. Panelists discussed the need to address cultural proficiency in the business environment.

Advocates and Providers Panel included: Dr. Myron L. Weisfeldt, Johns Hopkins Hospital and School of Medicine; Dr. Trudy Hall, Maryland State National Medical Association and Monumental City Medical Association; Dr. Marcella A. Copes, Coppin State University, Helene Fuld School of Nursing; Mr. William G. Robertson, Adventist HealthCare, Inc.; and Mr. Jay Wolovovsky, Baltimore Medical System. Panelists addressed issues of developing healthcare policies that reflect the population served.

The Workforce Diversity and Major Payers Panel included: Dr. E. Albert Reece, University of Maryland School of Medicine; Dr. Michael Christopher Gibbons, Johns Hopkins Urban Health Institute, Bloomberg School of Public Health; Ms. Stacey Mink, 1199/SEIU United Healthcare Workers; and Dr. Jon P. Shematek, CareFirst. Panelists discussed the need for the health care population to become more reflective of the population being cared for.



Closing Remarks and Action

Recommendations were provided by Dr. Claudia R. Baquet, University of Maryland School of Medicine, and Dr. Carlessia A. Hussein, Maryland Office of Minority Health and Health Disparities.

The one-day event in Annapolis was attended by approximately 200 elected officials; leaders from the business community; state and federal government officials; representatives from academic institutions; and health care providers. "Unnatural Causes" Viewings—DHMH Attorney General's Office & Sinai Hospital

The MHHD Team took part in two recent presentations of the documentary *Unnatural Causes...Is Inequality Making us Sick?*. This seven-part series, produced by the California Newsreel, explores the racial and socioeconomic inequalities in health.

In November 2008, MHHD presented the episode "Place Matters" to the DHMH Attorney General's Office. Dr. Hussein, MHHD Director, provided an introduction to the series and facilitated a follow-up discussion. Participants felt that the film heightened awareness of the impact of socio-economic factors on health and of health conditions in their own communities. Daniel O'Brien, Principal Counsel to DHMH, challenged the attorneys to think about how the law can be used as a tool to affect public health policies.

Additionally, in December 2008, Sinai Hospital held a Special Administrative Grand Rounds on health disparities that included segments of the episode "In Sickness and In Wealth." Neil Meltzer, President of Sinai Hospital; Warren Green, President and CEO of LifeBridge Health; Del. Shirley Nathan-Pulliam and Dr. Olivia Carter-Pokras provided remarks. Dr. Hussein offered an introduction about the series. Attendees viewed the segments and engaged in small group discussions. Attendees were challenged to raise awareness about health disparities and social conditions that impact health status.
