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Key Bridge to get artistic touch for 1812 events

Members of the Maryland Commission on Public Art, Maryland State Arts Council, Maryland Office of Tourism and Maryland Transportation Authority toured the Francis Scott Key Bridge by water and land, Aug. 6, as a prelude to commissioning an installation of public art at the bridge. The project – which is expected to use 21st-century technology – will enhance the bridge in time for the start of the War of 1812 bicentennial celebrations in June 2012, when a parade of tall ships and other vessels sail under the bridge into Baltimore's Inner Harbor.



Morgan State conductor joins Arts Council

Eric Conway, director of the <u>Morgan State University Choir</u> and chair of the university's Fine and Performing Arts Department, was recently appointed by Gov. Martin O'Malley as the newest member of the Maryland State Arts Council.

"I am excited about this opportunity to serve Maryland on the Arts Council," Conway said. "The Council is vital for shaping the arts in this great state. I certainly look forward to taking on this important job."

Conway was associate conductor and principal accompanist for the Morgan choir prior to becoming its director in 2004. As a pianist, he has toured Eastern Africa and Eastern Asia. He has also performed as a soloist with several orchestras, including the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra and Baltimore Chamber Orchestra. Conway, who has a doctorate from the Peabody Conservatory of Music of the Johns Hopkins University, is also a certified public accountant.



Get familiar with Cultural Data Project


Training sessions for using the <u>Maryland Cultural Data Project</u> (CDP) – an online management tool for nonprofit arts and cultural organizations – are available this month in Annapolis, Bethesda, Cambridge and Frederick. Two webinars are also available. Check the Maryland State Arts Council web site for <u>information</u> and <u>online registration</u>.

CDP was designed to enhance financial management capacity, evaluate grant-making activities and establish performance benchmarks. Pew Charitable Trusts developed the program and, launched it in Pennsylvania in 2004. It is now used in seven additional states: Maryland, California, Illinois, New York, Massachusetts, Ohio and Michigan. More than 150 public, private, corporate and community-based grant-makers with nearly 170 funding programs are linked to CDP.



Place local events on national *Arts and Humanities* calendar Organizations can post their *National Arts and Humanities Month* events on the *NAHM* calendar at the Americans for the Arts web site. The Maryland State Arts Council also welcomes notice of plans and activities.

National Arts and Humanities Month is a nationwide celebration of art and culture during October. Since 1993, NAHM has provided Americans with opportunities to engage with the arts and humanities on local levels. It raises the visibility of the arts, promotes participation in the arts, and encourages legislators and community leaders to show support for the arts.



U.M.'s Driskell Center gets \$150,000 grant

The David C. Driskell Center for the Study of the Visual Arts and Culture of African Americans and the African Diaspora was recently awarded a grant for nearly \$150,000 from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. The center is located on the University of Maryland's College Park campus in the Cole Student Activities Building, the former Cole Field House.

This two-year grant will provide support for documenting and presenting the Professor David C. Driskell (pictured) Archive of African American Art – a collection of 50,000 objects acquired over a period of more than 60 years. Funds will be used to hire an archivist and two graduate interns, and retain a consulting archivist. Accessibility to the archives will also be enhanced through an online site.

The Institute of Museum and Library Services is the primary source of federal support for libraries and museums across the nation.



Arts in Education Week starts Sept. 12

In late July, the U.S. House of Representatives passed a resolution that designated the second week of September as <u>Arts in Education Week</u>. Rep. Jackie Speier (D-Ca.) introduced the resolution, along with 101 co-sponsors. It's the first time that Congress has expressed support for all of the disciplines in arts education: dance, music, theater and visual arts.

"You cannot have a first-class school system without the arts," said John Ceschini, executive director of the <u>AEMS (Arts Education in Maryland Schools) Alliance</u>. "The arts give students opportunities to think creatively, work collaboratively, solve problems and enhance cross-cultural understandings. We are fortunate to have the commitment of our state and school leaders in recognizing the importance of a strong arts program."

The Arts in Education Week resolution comes at a time when Congress is planning to overhaul U.S. education policy through the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, also known as the No Child Left Behind Act.



Clarice Smith presents Liz Lerman premiere

<u>Liz Lerman Dance Exchange</u> offers its take on physics and beginnings when it presents the premiere of an interactive performance, *The Matter of Origins*, at the University of Maryland's <u>Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center</u> in College Park, Sept. 10 and 12. Lerman has described the production as "a performance, a conversation, a floor show, a quiz show and a chance to meet big minds."

The first act is a dance presentation with multi-media accompaniment that depicts Marie Curie's lab, the Large Hadron Collider at CERN (European Center for Nuclear Research) and the Hubble Space Telescope. During the second act, members of the cast serve tea to the audience in an interpretive representation of Edith Warner's tea house in Los Alamos, N.M. – a gathering spot for scientists working on the Manhattan Project.

Liz Lerman Dance Exchange, established in 1976, is based in Takoma Park. It received co-commissions from Clarice Smith and Peak Perfomances at Montclair State University (N.J.) to create *The Matter of Origins*. Clarice Smith has posted an <u>interview with Liz Lerman</u> discussing the production on its web site.



Funk, arts leader at bi-county commission, stepping down
Barbara Funk is retiring from her position as head of the Arts & Cultural
Heritage Division at the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning
Commission, an organization that serves both Montgomery and Prince
George's counties. During her tenure at the commission, which began in
1974, she guided the renovation of Publick Playhouse and opened Arts/
Harmony Hall Regional Center.

She also developed partnerships with the Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center, Bowie Center for the Performing Arts and the Gateway Arts Center. She was a strong proponent of the Gateway Arts District. During a 20-year span, she coordinated a series of arts programs for Black History Month. Funk has served on boards for the Cultural Alliance of Greater Washington and the Prince George's Arts Council.

Two major components of AiE are the Visiting Performers and Artists-in-Residence programs. Residencies are available in performing arts, playwriting, poetry and visual arts. In an average year, the Arts Council supports about 7,000 performances and workshops, reaching 200,000 students in nearly 500 Maryland schools. Deadline for applications is Sept. 17.
