## Absentee Ballots Available for November 8, 2011 City Election

In accordance with Section 6-30 of the City Code, any qualified voter of the City who may be unavoidably absent from the City or who is otherwise prevented from being present and personally voting at the polls may make application for an absentee voting ballot. Applications are available from the City Clerk's Office at City Hall, or on the City's website, *www.cityofbowie.org*.

Application for an absentee ballot must be made in writing and signed by the applicant. If the applicant is unable to sign, the application must bear the mark of the applicant. The application must be presented to the City Board of Elections in person or by mail to 15901 Excalibur Road, Bowie, Maryland 20716, no later than 5 p.m. on November 7th.

When the application is received by mail, the City Clerk will issue the absentee voting ballot by return mail; when the application is presented in person, the City Clerk will issue the absentee voting ballot to the voter or duly authorized agent. Persons receiving absentee ballots will also be furnished official self-addressed return envelopes for use in returning the marked ballots. Only those ballots received in official return envelopes shall be counted and considered properly cast. All absentee ballots must be received by the Board of Elections by the closing of polls at 8 p.m. on November 8, 2011.

## 4th of July Traffic Information

### **Parking**

Handicapped parking ONLY is available, with proper identification, in the main parking lot at Allen Pond Park located off of Northyiew Drive.

Public parking is available at the Mitchellville Road soccer fields (beginning at 5 p.m.) and on side streets.

Parking is prohibited along the Enfield Chase side of Northview Drive from Health Center Drive to Mitchellville Road.

A drop-off zone will be set up along Northview Drive from 7 a.m. - 8 p.m. Individuals are asked to unload vehicles and then immediately remove the vehicle from the drop-off zone. Unattended vehicles will be ticketed and towed.

### Exit Traffic Plan - In Effect 9:30 - 11 p.m.

Traffic exiting the parking lot of Allen Pond Park must turn right onto Northview Drive. Northview Drive will be two lanes out to Route 197 and one lane toward Mitchellville Road.

Traffic exiting Nottinghill Drive must turn left onto Northview Drive toward Route 197. Traffic on Nottinghill Drive is two-way. Traffic exiting Nottinghill Drive onto Mt. Oak Road must turn right onto Mt. Oak Road.

Vehicles traveling south on Mitchellville Road toward Route 301 may turn left onto Mt. Oak Road. All traffic leaving the Mitchellville Road ballfield site must turn right onto Mitchellville Road toward Route 197.

Traffic northbound on Route 197 will **not** be allowed to turn left onto Northview Drive. Only traffic traveling southbound on Route 197 (toward Route 301) will be allowed to turn right onto Northview Drive.

Please obey the directions of the City of Bowie and Prince George's County Police Officers, as changes may occur.

## Playhouse Adds Fourth Resident Company

The Bowie Playhouse, located inside the City's Whitemarsh Park, is adding a fourth resident company, Annapolis Shakespeare Company. Just founded in 2009, the Annapolis Shakespeare Company's mission is to "provide young people with performing arts opportunities which will inspire and educate the next generation of performing artists and theater patrons." Since its founding, the founder and director Sally Boyett-D'Angelo has worked with over 150 middle school and high school students.

The cast of its fall 2009 production of Shakespeare's *The Taming of the Shrew* was invited to perform at the Folger Secondary School Shakespeare Festival in March 2010. They received a grant from the Folger and again were asked to perform in its 2011 Shakespeare Festival, this time *Hamlet*. The company recently finished a production of the classic American play *Our Town* by Thornton Wilder. This summer it is offering workshops along with preparing for its production of Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night*, which will be its first show at the Bowie Playhouse.

## Bowie Youth and Family Services (BYFS)

BYFS has moved to another location within the newly named Kenhill Center at 2614 Kenhill Drive. It is now located in the center of the building inside the center entrance door in Room 203. All of the services remain the same including the groups, family counseling, Teen Mentoring Program, Teen Job Bank and prevention activities. The phone number remains as **301-809-3033**. BYFS offers counseling for families with school-age children living in the home. Groups are offered on a variety of topics, including groups for those who want guidance with parenting skills, social skills for young children, or parenting children with ADHD.

**COST**: Families and individuals residing within the corporate limits of the City of Bowie will be charged \$20 per session with a counselor beginning July 1, 2011. Participants in the program who reside outside the City limits will be charged \$30.

**STAFF:** BYFS staff is composed of master and doctoral level clinicians with extensive training in family counseling plus professionals in the field of community outreach and program development.

**REFERRALS:** Families are encouraged to call 301-809-3033 for more information or to make an appointment. An initial intake will be done either by phone or in person.

**TEEN JOB BANK:** Teens can go online or call 301-809-3033 for an application to sign up to help citizens with jobs like baby-sitting, snow shoveling, lawn and yard work, housework, etc. You must be 13-17 years old to sign up. Residents can call 301-809-3033 to get names of teens who are willing to help you for a fee.

## Bowie Well on Its Way to Becoming a "Community Wildlife Habitat"

As the *Spotlight* goes to press, Bowie is approaching the halfway mark for achieving the benchmarks needed to become a National Wildlife Federation (NWF) Community Wildlife Habitat. What's needed? To join the ranks of more than 50 communities that have coordinated efforts to create and enhance wildlife habitat, Bowie needs to have at least 200 homes, five schools, and six community sites (such as businesses, places of worship, and public spaces) certified by NWF. So far, we have nearly 100 certified sites, including homes, one place of worship, and three schools.

How do residents, schools, places of worship, businesses, and others certify their property as a wildlife habitat? First, provide the four basic elements that all wildlife need to thrive: (1) food, such as native fruiting trees and shrubs; (2) water, such as a pond or well-maintained birdbath; (3) cover, such as ground covers and evergreens; and (4) places to raise young, such as nesting boxes or host plants for caterpillars. Second, submit an application (and small fee) to NWF showing how you provide habitat. That's it! Your certificate will arrive by mail. NWF provides a list of Bowie addresses that receive certification, and the City's Planning Department maintains a current list and map of certified properties.

## **New Fertilizer Application Law**

Maryland House Bill 573, entitled "The Maryland Fertilizer Use Act of 2011" and sponsored by Delegate Jim Hubbard, limits the nutrient content of lawn fertilizer and restricts when it may be applied by homeowners. It was signed into law by Governor Martin O'Malley in May to help the State clean up the Bay. The law was championed by the Chesapeake Bay Commission.

The law prohibits homeowners from using fertilizer from November 15 to March 1. Additionally, fertilizer can contain no phosphorus unless it is for specific uses, such as establishing a lawn or repairing turf. The law also restricts the amount, and type of nitrogen that can be used in fertilizer, and requires that at least 20 percent of nitrogen be slow-release.

The law stipulates that no fertilizer can be labeled for use as a deicer. Labels must contain a statement warning users not to apply it near water, storm drains and drainage ditches, or if heavy rain is expected.

Homeowners who violate the law may be subject to a \$1,000 fine.

## Mosquito Control Program Underway

The City's 2011 Mosquito Control Program began with spring larviciding in April. The regular season began May 11 and will continue into early September. Work may continue late into September if necessary.

The program consists of larviciding (control of immature stages of the mosquito), public education about the Asian Tiger Mosquito, and adult surveillance with possible spraying on Tuesday (North Bowie) or Wednesday nights (South Bowie).

Larviciding involves the treatment of the immature stages (eggs, larvae or pupae) of the mosquitoes in the stagnant water where they occur. Known breeding areas will be checked every three weeks and will be treated as necessary.

Your neighborhood has been scheduled for adult mosquito surveillance and possible spraying according to the schedule to the left. This part of the program will begin the end of June and will continue through the end of September. Please call the Public Works Department if you have a mosquito problem in your area.

The Tiger Mosquito is a major pest in this area. You can help reduce its "backyard breeding". Mosquitoes can breed in any standing water. To prevent backyard breeding areas, water should be changed weekly in birdbaths and wading pools, and daily in pet dishes. Gutters should be cleaned at least twice a year. Other water holding containers should be disposed of or stored upside down.

### Pet Waste - What a Nuisance It Can Be

Everyone should be concerned with animal waste and the effect it may have on our health, our environment and the well-being of our pets. Several diseases can be transmitted to humans after contact with pet feces and we don't want our children handling animal excrement. We want to protect our pets because they can contract canine parvo, whipworms and other diseases from fecal matter. The accumulation of feces in our yards can foul the air and create a public nuisance. Pet waste can also create a health hazard by polluting our storm water system or by providing a food source for rodents and other unwanted animals.

The Bowie City Code addresses the issue of animal waste:

- Sections 4-13, (c), 15-3 and 11-3. A public nuisance exists when an animal's uncleanliness or deposit of excrement causes odor or unsanitary conditions.
- Sections 4-17 and 17-2. Anyone owning or keeping a companion animal shall immediately remove and properly dispose of the excrement deposited by the animal from private property, other than their own, or from public property, including City sidewalks, streets and City parks.

It is the responsibility of every pet owner or custodian to properly dispose of pet waste. Pet owners must frequently clean their yards of pet excrement. When walking your dog or cat, immediately clean up the waste. Do not toss your pet's excrement into a storm drain or sewer and don't expect it to dissolve into the ground. Carry a pet waste bag and dispose of your animal's waste with your other solid waste.

### Don't Leave Your Pet In a Car

These summer months can take a toll on companion pets when they are left in a motor vehicle. Merely lowering a window will not reduce the buildup of heat in your car. The temperatures inside the vehicle can rise rapidly and create a significant health risk to your pet. When you can, leave your pet at home. If it is necessary to take your pet with you on warm days, have a responsible adult remain in the air conditioned vehicle with your pet while you complete you errands.

## **Neighbors Helping Neighbors**

The City's Neighbors Helping Neighbors program, has been established for several years. As a public service, the program was designed to assist senior citizens and handicapped individuals with financial or physical limitations to rectify potential or actual City code violations. The program has helped many residents to repair or resolve issues such as dead trees, overgrown shrubs, fallen fencing and other minor repairs.

## Code Corner ... Loud or Raucous Noise that Annoys Others

Chapter 13, Section 13-3 of the City Code prohibits "loud or raucous sound" so as to "cause unreasonable annoyance to or disturbance to others living or located nearby". An integral part of this section is the offending noise must be a disturbance to more than one person. The ordinance is intended to address a public nuisance; not a private nuisance. More than one person must be annoyed or disturbed before a municipal infraction may be issued. Section 13-3 (b) specifies that no municipal infraction citation shall be issued except upon the submission of an "Application for the Issuance of a Municipal Infraction" by at least two witnesses residing in separate households. Requiring the loud sound to be offensive to more than one person deters the use of the noise ordinance as a tool to annoy or harass a next door neighbor.

When you experience disturbing loud or raucous sound in your neighborhood, the Code Compliance Office recommends you document the day, time, date, and length of time the noise exists. Note the origin of the noise, the type of noise and ask your neighbors if they were also annoyed. If other noise abatement measures fail, your documentation will properly prepare you to apply for a municipal infraction against the offending party.

Note: It is very important for owners of commercial properties, including private pools, restaurants, and other outdoor establishments to remember the Environmental Noise Ordinance applies to them too. We all should be aware of the level of noise we create and the effects it may have on neighbors and the community. Please respect the right of others to a reasonably peaceful and quiet environment.

## No Smoking on City Property

By City Ordinance smoking is now prohibited on all City property.

Section 15-9 of the City Code took effect in May of this year and prohibits smoking by anyone on any City property or in any City facility. This includes all City-owned parks and ballfields as well as parking lots and buildings. You will see signs at facilities and event locations reminding visitors of this new law. Information about the new law will be included on all picnic and field rental permits. Park Rangers and other City staff will work to educate those seen smoking.

The fine for violating this City Code is \$50 and can be enforced if a friendly request is ignored. We ask your cooperation in helping to make Bowie a better place to live. Please leave your cigarettes, cigars and pipes at home. It will be healthier for you and better for others and the environment.

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## Parent Internet Safety Tips

### from the City's Public Safety Committee

Unfortunately, the same advances in computer and telecommunication technology that allow our children to reach out to new sources of knowledge are also leaving them vulnerable to exploitation and harm by computer offenders. The following guidelines were prepared from actual investigations by the FBI involving child victims and may be signs that your child is at risk while online:

- Most children who fall victims to computer offenders spend large amounts of time online especially in chat rooms and especially at night.
- Your child is receiving calls from individuals you don't know or may be making possibly long distance calls to numbers you don't recognize.
- · Your child receives mail, gifts or packages from someone you don't know.
- · Your child turns the computer monitor off or quickly changes the screen when you enter the room.
- · Your child becomes withdrawn from the family.
- Your child is using an online account belonging to someone else.

You can help minimize the chances of your child becoming a victim by communicating and talking to your child about online danger. Also, keep the computer in a common room in the house and not in your child's bedroom.
