A New Council

As three freshly elected members formally joined its ranks, the Town Council began its May meeting with a few minutes of heartfelt ceremony: a plaque, a congratulatory speech by the mayor, handshakes, and a photo opportunity. And the new Councilmembers didn't seem to mind a bit that they were only spectators for the festivities.

The honoree was, in fact, a boy called Pablo, a fourth grader from Holy Cross Elementary School and the author of a winning essay in the "If I Were Mayor I Would..." contest sponsored by the Maryland Municipal League. Pablo wrote that, were he mayor, he would make a Web page for kids and have a kids municipal day. He would study lighting for safety, build telecommuting centers, and ask people to "watch less TV and do more community services."

Taking that advice to heart, the newly constituted Council went straight to work. Mayor Shawaker detailed the areas of responsibility for each member. Beth Irons will oversee the Historic (continued next page)

Preservation Committee, Garrett Park Conservation Trust, and the Setback Advisory Committee. Solange Hansen will take on town right of ways and arboretum duties. Charles Berry gets parks and open spaces and the Garrett Park Swimming Pool Association. Hans Wegner will worry about town streets and drains, Strathmore Avenue, and streetlights. And Jack Mandel will look after Town Hall and Penn Place. (As his first official act in that capacity, Jack asked that we all remember to wipe our feet.)

The Mayor also updated the Council on plans for the traffic light at Kenilworth and Strathmore avenues, which is due to be "fully signalized" around June 1—with no restrictions on left turns from Strathmore. The installation, she explained, will employ modern traffic management technology, including sensors that instigate a full cycle of the light if cars are queued up on Kenilworth.

Speaking of Strathmore, Hans Wegner reported that a number of new plants put in by the state road construction folks last fall had defied fears and survived to grow again this spring. A mention by Ted Pratt that he had just received a question about some deceased azaleas in the same vicinity put a damper on the botanical positivity.

And speaking again of Strathmore (Hall, that is), Beth Irons reported on plans for a Baltimore Symphony Orchestra—sponsored tour of historic homes in Garrett Park October 19 and 20. The event, she explained, will benefit Montgomery County schools, in support of arts education, and Garrett Park is the first community chosen as a sightseeing venue. Three residents have already offered their homes as places to see. As a premium, Beth said the BSO has dangled the possibility of a special show for the town. (We can only presume it will be a musical performance and not interpretive dance.)

Other reports detailed street repair planning around town and floor refinishing needs at Penn Place—which will, presumably, involve different materials.

The new Council moved briskly through its agenda, wrapping up the meeting in less than an hour. Perhaps it was the siren song of this season's penultimate episode of the TV show "24" calling. But if that's true, please don't tell Pablo.

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Town Administrator Notes

The Betsy White Emergency Loan Fund: The fund is one of Garrett Park's unique institutions, and something I have been very pleased to be involved with in my duties as Town Clerk-Treasurer. Since I arrived in September 2002, quite a few people have been helped by the fund, and many town residents have made generous donations to support it. That generosity is needed again.

The Betsy White Emergency Loan Fund was established by the Women's Club of Garrett Park in the late sixties as a memorial to Betsy White, a town resident and an officer and beloved member of the Club. The purpose of the fund is to provide emergency financial assistance to residents of the town when other resources are not available. The loans are interest free and can be repaid when the emergency has passed, if possible. This helps replenish the fund for others in need. Applications for funds are made to the Town Clerk-Treasurer, who refers the application to the Board of Trustees. The decisions made by the Trustees are reported to the Town Clerk who, under normal circumstances, is the only person who has direct contact with the applicant. This is a discreet fund, and the appointed Trustees conduct all business in a confidential manner.

The fund is maintained by money raised by the Women's Club, supplemented by donations and bequests from Garrett Park residents and others. Over the years this fund has been well used, and in particular in the last 4 years a number of requests have been received. As a result, the fund balance is currently lower than usual. Large Item Collection: There will be a large item collection Saturday, July 14.

Garrett Park Building Permits: We are well into the building season, and I would like to remind everyone to please check with the Town Office to find out if your project needs a Garrett Park permit. A town permit is required to demolish any building larger than 400 square feet. Also, a Garrett Park building permit is required whenever a new structure is to be built, including a new house, shed, garage, or similar structure, or when the size of a house is proposed to be increased with an addition, a deck, a porch, or the like. The town is concerned only with the relationship of the proposed construction to the size of the lot and its setback from the lot's boundary. The town also requires a permit for driveway or parking pad construction or repair. A town building permit should be applied for before you apply for a Montgomery County building permit.

Montgomery County Building Permits:

Montgomery County requires building permits for any structure above ground level (not patios or driveways) including sheds, garages, decks, fences, etc. A county permit is also required for any alteration to a structure (other than ordinary repair or maintenance) and for demolition. The county is concerned with zoning, health and safety, plumbing, structural, electrical, and the like. Bride and Prejudice, our June film, originally scheduled for June 22, will be shown on June 29. Please make a note of the change.

India has its own unique style of popular entertainment, little appreciated or understood by much of the West. The most well known are Bollywood musicals. They're easy to roll your eyes at if you're not used to them—but the same could be said of the explosions and drivel in some of our home-grown movies. *B&P* is a Bollywood update of Jane Austen's story of a mother eager to find husbands for four unmarried daughters.

B&P doesn't attempt to show a foreign family simply trying to conform to the West's lifestyle (like director Gurinder Chadha's other well-known film, *Bend It Like Beckham*). Chadha offers up an exuberant spin on the Jane Austen classic. It celebrates the diversity of the cultures, passes no judgment on any person or practice, and allows a dignified India to be well portrayed. Much of this takes place along with music and laughter—what could be better? Jane Austen in the Punjab: If you want to see something new and wonderful, you'll love this movie.

Obituary

Patricia Regina Houck Abernethy (Pat)

On April 24, Pat Abernethy, 76, died suddenly in her home in Kensington. A Washington, D.C., native, she was the mother of 8 children. She married Jack Abernethy in 1951 and moved with him to a house on Strathmore in Garrett Park in 1953. As the family grew to need more space, they took on the Victorian house at 10818 Kenilworth. She and her family were among the founders of Holy Cross Catholic Church. In 1985, after the children were grown, the Abernethys moved to Kensington, but still kept close ties with Garrett Parkers.

As part of Adventure Theatre, Rockville Community Chorus, the Holy Cross choir and folk group, and the annual Christmas Sing-Along in the Town Hall, she lent her wonderful alto voice to choral presentations, theater, and religious services. For years she was Jack's "right hand man" at his garage, doing the bookkeeping, running errands, and generally keeping things moving.

Besides her husband, she is survived by their children Michelle Reilly-Maurer of Boonsboro, Christine DeVlaming of South Carolina, John (James) of Olney, Joe of College Park, Regina Early of Virginia, Mary Pat Orenstein of North Carolina, and Michael of Virginia, as well as 17 grand-children.

A rousing funeral was held at Holy Cross on April 30, with music provided by 35 singers from all her singing groups. It concluded with a standing ovation from the congregation in her honor. She was buried at Gate of Heaven Cemetery. Memorial contributions can be made in her name to Adventure Theatre at Glen Echo Park, 7300 MacArthur Blvd., Glen Echo, MD 20812.

Art at Penn Place

The Penn Place gallery is featuring the work of two very different photographers in May and June. Hanging in the gallery now is the work of Garrett Park Estates resident Carolyn Martin. The photos shown were taken over a period of nearly 20 years. Some are of local subjects: the Potomac River and C&O Canal, violins in Weaver's Violin Shop in Bethesda, the piano at Strathmore Hall. Others are from France. Ms. Martin shoots both her color and black and white photos with a film camera. She develops the black and white views herself. Ms. Martin graduated from Brown University with a degree in art and took additional studio courses at the Rhode Island School of Design. In addition to her photography, she also paints and draws. Her work has been shown in a number of D.C. area galleries. She has also taught at the University of Maryland, University College.

Beginning on May 27, the gallery will feature the photographs of Sean Ruttkay, who grew up in Garrett Park and still comes back to manage the swimming pool in the summers. Sean will be showing his large-format digital artwork that is designed to be hung outdoors. The technique is one that was devised by Sean's dad, Tom Ruttkay, but never marketed. It involves taking an image from a digital camera and printing it on PVC paper that is then mounted on aluminum. It has the look of stretched canvas. Sean says that many of his works hang in outdoor rooms—on patio fences or spa enclosures. But many people buy them to hang inside as well. Sean has done a lot of traveling to capture the images in his portfolio. They come from Barbados, Hawaii, the southeast United States, and Italy. Sean's work is shown at the Discovery Gallery in Bethesda. He also has a Web site with his current images. Each of his pieces is hand fabricated and can be made in any size. Sean's academic training is in special education. His art training comes from observing and working with his father.

Jack Mandel: Penn Place and Town Hall Buildings



Another Fine Musicale

It's becoming one of Garrett Park's best traditions—the annual spring musicale, in which townies and others sing and play for a couple of hours in the Town Hall. Ticket proceeds go to fund a music scholarship for a young local musician. The idea originated with Ilah Gieser, who before her death established the scholarship fund.
