FROM THE MAYOR

Employee Service Awards On June 29, the Town will celebrate our employees who have served for 5 or more years. Each will be given a token of the Town's appreciation at the staff and public service/75th Anniversary picnic dinner beginning at 6 PM at the Gazebo behind the University Park Elementary School. We will also honor the many volunteers who help make this Town such a wonderful place to live, especially those who made our 75th Anniversary so much fun. Refreshments will be served and music provided. If it rains, the festivities will move to the Riverdale Presbyterian Church.

Town Street Work The contractor is preparing to complete the last sections of Town at this point, principally Ward 4 and 5. Once all the streets have been repaved, the contractor will replace the existing speed humps and tables with speed tables similar to those on Pineway on the northern curve. It was decided that the Pineway-style

tables are more in character with the neighborhoods needing speed tables. The Town is completing a small traffic study and may place additional speed tables elsewhere in Town, either in late summer or early fall.

PEPCO Tree Trimming PEPCO would like to trim street trees in the vicinity of their electrical lines. As a Tree City, poorly managed tree trimming can cause significant damage to our canopy. For this reason, the Town is discussing this issue with PEPCO and will make every effort within our legal powers to ensure that all trimming is done under a mutually agreed upon plan that balances Town needs against PEPCO's desires. When you receive notices from PEPCO regarding tree trimming, it would be very helpful if you notify Town Hall so we can monitor their crews.

A UP Korean War Hero

Robert William Bennington grew up at 6501 41st Avenue. "Sonny" Bennington attended UPES and Hyattsville High School. School photos show Sonny and UP resident Mickey Lucas, who today resides across the street from the former Bennington home, as typical youngsters of our nation's World War II and post-war years.

Sonny was movie-star handsome with a winning smile and persuasive ways. In the fall of 1947 he enlisted in the Army, giving his birth date as February 6, 1930. Sources indicate that he was actually 15, but looked older. But he was 18 when his platoon received orders to report to the Korean front. Initially he was to remain in Tokyo, but Sonny persuaded his commanders to allow him to join his unit at Yongsan, Korea.

On the night of September 15, 1950, Private First Class Bennington and his platoon were holding Hill 189 near Yongsan when they came under heavy attack by Communist forces. In the early hours of September 16 the order came to withdraw to higher ground. Bennington provided cover for his comrades, allowing them to escape, until he was killed by an enemy hand grenade. When his body was recovered later that day, the remains of fifty enemy soldiers lay around him. General Douglas MacArthur was one of the commanders writing his parents with expressions of condolence. Today the area that Private Bennington died defending is known as Heartbreak Ridge.

On March 6, 1951, the President posthumously awarded Pfc Robert W. Bennington the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action. The award was upgraded by Bennington's division commander from the Silver Star originally recommended by his corps commander. His parents accepted the award on Memorial Day. 1956 in a special ceremony at their home in Florida, where they had relocated in 1954. Robert W. Bennington is buried in Arlington National Cemetery under a headstone bearing the designation "DSC."

FROM THE CHIEF & CRIME REPORT

It's summer vacation season. UPPD offers the following vacation safety tips.

Stop mail, newspapers and other deliveries. If a neighbor brings your newspapers and deliveries inside, have them put it somewhere that can't be seen through the window.

Use motion detectors with outside lights and timers. If an intruder comes to your house at night, it's the action of the light coming on that scares them away, not just the light being on. Also use timers to turn lights and a radio or TV on and off at appropriate times.

Arrange to have yard work done. Unmown grass gives the impression a home is not occupied. Also have a neighbor set out trash on normal collection days. Empty cans and recycle bins should be removed the same day.

Turn ringers on phones down or off, and don't change the outgoing message on your answering machine. Never program it to announce that you're out of town, or to give another number where you can be reached. Instead, periodically call and listen to messages.

Make sure electrical appliances are unplugged, the gas supply is shut off, and water taps are tightly turned off. Set the air conditioner to a higher temperature, but don't turn it off. A silent compressor on a hot day is a good indication that the house is unoccupied.



If you have an alarm system, make sure it is in working order. If it's connected to a monitoring service, tell them when you'll be gone and where you're going, along with a phone number of the person keeping an eye on

things. A home protected by a security system is three times less susceptible to a break-in than one without.

Avoid discussing your travel plans in public places. A stranger could overhear them, follow you home and return after you've left on your trip. Use luggage tags that can't be easily read, or use your business address. Someone standing behind you at the airport check-in counter could notice your address and write it down.

Don't leave a garage door opener in the car, especially if you are parking your car on the street. Unplug your

electric garage door opener before you leave. Don't keep keys hidden around the outside of your home or in your garage. Intruders know all the secret places where keys could be hidden. After everyone is in the car, take one last walk around. Check to make sure that all windows and doors are securely locked and that the alarm system has been properly armed.

A travel safety kit for your vehicle should contain everything from a simple flashlight and batteries to a fluorescent safety vest. Many of the items can be found around your house. Start with an old tote or duffel bag and add the following items:

- Small throw rug
- Work gloves
- 2 bread wrappers and 4 rubber bands
- Basic tools: large standard screwdriver, pliers, four-way tire wrench, rubber hammer, folding shovel or a shorthandled shovel
- Penetrating oil
- Jumper cables
- Wheel chock
- Emergency flares
- Large flashlight and extra batteries
- Mechanic's wire
- Funnel
- Old shower curtain for ground covering if you have to crawl under the car
- Belt or scarf for emergency hose repairs
- Cigarette lighter
- Plastic jug of water
- First aid pack
- Fluorescent safety vest to wear if you have to repair a car on the side of the road
- Dried fruit, nuts or other nonperishable food in case you ever get stranded
- Blanket to ward off cold weather

University Park Receives Award for Compost Pilot Program

The Maryland Recycling Network (MRN) recently awarded the University Park the Outstanding Small Government Program Award for their work on the STEP-UP Kitchen Waste Compost pilot program. Director of Public Works Mickey Beall received the award on behalf of the Town at the statewide MRN meeting.

STEP-UP partnered with a local company, Compost Cab, to provide weekly household pick-up from fifty volunteer households for composting. Compost Cab used sturdy, foodgrade plastic buckets with screw-top lids that



eliminated the need for backyard composters and delivered the kitchen scraps to local urban farms for composting.

All but one respondent said they would recommend the program "enthusiastically with no reservations," and 98% of respondents ranked their overall satisfaction as 8 or higher on a scale of 1 to 10. In the five months the program has been running, Compost Cab collected an average weekly weight of 8.5 pounds of food scraps per pilot household, adding up to almost 4 tons of food waste. A Town-wide program could divert more than 150 tons of food scraps from the Town's waste stream each year.

University Park Elementary Becomes First County School to Use Solar Energy

UPES is slated to become the first public school in Prince George's County with roof-mounted solar panels. The solar project, now entering the initial design phase, is part of the STEP-UP program.

Working in partnership with the Prince George's County Board of Education, University Park should be ready to accept bids for the initial engineering work within a few weeks. The planned solar array could generate enough power to offset the electricity consumption of up to seven homes with families of four, according to estimates by real estate trade publication *The Cooperator*.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

May 21 Council Meeting Highlights

Present were Mayor Tabori; Council Members Brosch, McPherson, Cron, Sorensen, Bradley Chacón. Excused were Council Members Gekas, Carey.

Permits

Application to Replace Sections of an Existing 6' Fence, 6930 Pineway Motion to approve the application to replace old and damaged sections of the existing 6' fence located at 6930 Pineway. Motion approved 5 to 0.

Application to Replace Existing Walkway, Patio and Stoop, 4406 Underwood Street Motion to approve the application to replace the existing walkway, patio and stoop located on at 4406 Underwood Street. Motion approved 5 to 0.

Department Reports

Mayor Tabori said he is waiting to find out the date of the final vote on the Cafritz property by the District Council. Mayor Tabori said the Town Clerk hiring decision would happen on June 4, 2012 when the full Council is present.

Mayor Tabori reported that all the planned STEP-UP municipal agreements have been signed, including agreements with Riverdale Park, Hyattsville and College Heights Estates. College Park is not eligible to participate in the program as they have received Department of Energy funds under a different program.

Mayor Tabori reported that 9-Ponds discussions are continuing. Using 9-Ponds as a means of reducing storm water surges is important to halting the deterioration of the 44th Street bridge. Mayor Tabori praised Mr. Tom Stickles and Mr. Mickey Lucas for their seven years of continued focus and effort to address the health of Wells Run. Mayor Tabori said he did not doubt that without a means of managing storm water surge, the park would be significantly damaged.

Director of Public Works Mr. Beall said that the contractor working on Town Hall has completed the work. As a result, the attic space at Town Hall is much more usable. The air infiltration has been decreased by 25%. The Saturday electronics recycling and paper shredding event was very successful; almost 3 tons of paper and almost 4 tons of electronics were collected.

Mr. Beall said that on Thursday he attended the Maryland Recycler's meeting and accepted an award on behalf of University Park in recognition of the compost pilot program. Prince George's County is actively working to be able to accept food scraps with yard waste. He estimated that University Park's recycling rate is 63%. He discussed various alternatives for hazardous waste recycling.

Mr. Beall recommended that the 44th Avenue Bridge have the curb removed, as two bicyclists have had accidents there. He said that unless the Council directed otherwise, the Public Works Department would maintain the bridge as minimally as possible.

Suellen Ferguson, Town Attorney, reported that a public hearing will be held on June 18 at the Town's regular Council meeting to discuss negotiations and renewal of the cable franchise with Comcast. Attorney Ferguson and the Council members briefly discussed the I-Net and the potential to broadcast the Council meetings.

Chief Wynnyk said the e-tickets citation-writing program is fully operational and being used by the officers. He also reported that the police radios are fully compliant with the new FCC requirements. Mayor Tabori noted that Chief Wynnyk had just completed a 300-mile bike tour, as part of the Police Unity tour, which raises funds for charitable causes.


