Service to the community through wise environmental choices is the goal of MOM's Organic Market.

Mark Torsani - Entrepreneur of the Year — Mark Torsani of Chesapeake Grille & Deli joined our business community as the first franchise owner of the Outback Steakhouse in Bowie. Campers participate in on-ice instruction, on and off-ice games and arts and crafts. Skaters put on a show at the end of the week. Fee for Bowie residents is \$100.

Calling All Artists, Crafters and Performers

The arts-friendly City of Bowie is home to a number of artists, crafts persons and performers. To celebrate the unique talents of our hometown artistic community, the City's Arts and Economic Development Committees want to create a database of local artistic information. The City will use the data for two important projects: a Bowie Artists Directory and a possible application to the State of Maryland for designation as an Arts and Entertainment District.

Maryland is one of the first states in the country to develop Arts and Entertainment Districts on a statewide basis. The benefits offered to designated districts include property tax credits for new construction or renovation of certain buildings that create live-work space for artists and/or space for arts and entertainment enterprises, an income tax subtraction modification for income derived from artistic work sold by "qualifying residing artists," and an exemption from the Admissions and Amusement Tax levied by an "arts and entertainment enterprise" or "qualifying residing artist" in a district. Arts and Entertainment Districts will further the goals of Smart Growth by locating within a Priority Funding Area and by carefully coordinating with local plans and policies for economic development.

To be eligible for State designation as an Arts and Entertainment District, the City must document its existing arts and cultural assets. Hence, the City is asking local artists, crafts persons and performers to complete a survey so it will have up-to-date listings of its artists, the specialties, and the primary location of their work. Bowie Business Innovation Center Launched

at Bowie State University

The Bowie Business Innovation Center (Bowie BIC), located at Bowie State University, is a new resource for entrepreneurs and early stage companies in the Bowie area. It is a mixed-use business incubation program which targets growth-oriented professional service firms and technology firms in the industries and markets which reflect the composition of the Bowie business community.

Bowie BIC works with a variety of client companies including: professional service companies (business consultants, project management companies, financial services and training companies); information technology companies (software and hardware developers, network services, information assurance and social media companies); government contractors; construction-related companies; home-based businesses; and Bowie State University related companies.

Bowie BIC offers furnished office space with high-speed internet service, telephone/voice mail, and reception services on a flexible, monthly lease basis. Conference and meeting space is included.

Business incubation is the process of supporting and accelerating the growth of young companies through a coordinated program of support services. The Bowie BIC business development services include business plan review and strategic support services, mentoring, networking, marketing support and educational programs designed for its client companies. Bowie BIC also assists client companies by actively engaging its network of professional service providers and investors. Bowie State University student interns are available to assist Bowie BIC client companies. Bowie BIC even assists its clients with identifying, applying for and securing the most appropriate funding available.

A free monthly "Lunch and Learn" series at Bowie BIC presents expert speakers on a range of business topics of interest to entrepreneurs. Upcoming sessions include "Legal Tips for Entrepreneurs" with Carroll James Harris of Harris & Associates LLC on July 25 and "Tax Tips for Entrepreneurs" with Greg Busink of CliftonLarsonAllen LLP on September 26. In addition, counselors from the Maryland Small Business Development Center (SBDC) and the Procurement and Technical Assistance Program (PTAP) hold office hours at Bowie BIC each week.

The Bowie BIC has a dual mission - to spur economic development and retain business growth in the Bowie community by providing an integrated business development platform, and to provide enhanced learning opportunities for Bowie State University students through experiential internship programs and entrepreneurship activities.

Bowie BIC is a non-profit organization with an independent Board of Directors. The program receives financial support from the public and private sector, including the City of Bowie, Prince George's County and corporate sponsors.

4th of July Traffic Information

Parking

Handicapped parking ONLY is available, with proper identification, in the main parking lot at Allen Pond Park located off of Northview Drive.

Public parking is available at the Mitchellville Road soccer fields (beginning at 5 p.m.) and on side streets.

Parking is prohibited along the Enfield Chase side of Northview Drive from Health Center Drive to Mitchellville Road.

A drop-off zone will be set up along Northview Drive from 7 a.m. - 8 p.m. Individuals are asked to unload vehicles and then immediately remove the vehicle from the drop-off zone. Unattended vehicles will be ticketed and towed.

Exit Traffic Plan - In Effect 9:30 - 11 p.m.

Traffic exiting the parking lot of Allen Pond Park must turn right onto Northview Drive. Northview Drive will be two lanes out to Route 197 and one lane toward Mitchellville Road.

Traffic exiting Nottinghill Drive must turn left onto Northview Drive toward Route 197. Traffic on Nottinghill Drive is two-way. Traffic exiting Nottinghill Drive onto Mt. Oak Road must turn right onto Mt. Oak Road.

Vehicles traveling south on Mitchellville Road toward Route 301 may turn left onto Mt. Oak Road. All traffic leaving the Mitchellville Road ballfield site must turn right onto Mitchellville Road toward Route 197.

Traffic northbound on Route 197 will not be allowed to turn left onto Northview Drive. Only traffic traveling southbound on Route 197 (toward Route 301) will be allowed to turn right onto Northview Drive.

Please obey the directions of the City of Bowie and Prince George's County Police Officers, as changes may occur.

Stream Buffer Study Available

Bowie has approximately 40 miles of streams (including Levitt channels). The area immediately adjacent to them is known as the stream buffer. This area provides many benefits - habitat; interception of fertilizers, pesticides, pet waste, sediment and other pollutants from yards and streets; aesthetics and increased property values; and shading for the stream and its inhabitants. Unfortunately, there are many threats to stream buffers in urban and suburban areas including removal of trees, mowing of grass to the stream edge, and the installation of impervious surfaces that don't infiltrate rain (e.g., streets, parking lots, buildings, and sidewalks).

Staff from the City's Planning Department reviewed and analyzed existing buffer data, including maps of all impervious surfaces in the City, to determine the extent of buffer threats, or encroachments. The final report is available on the City's website, <code>www.cityofbowie.org/GreenBowie</code>, and the next steps will be additional, more detailed studies of some of these areas in the future. So, What is a City Right-of-Way Street Tree?

About three years ago, I summarized the answer to this question, and I think now would be a good time to review this important information. One of the regular, ongoing and most important aspects of my role as Community Forester is the maintenance of the city's 17,000 street trees in the right-of-ways. This is in addition to the many park trees that exist. Many in our fair town are not aware of what qualifies as a "right-of-way" street tree; so, let's spend a few moments reviewing that specification.

In Bowie, "street trees" are determined by one of two stipulations. The first one is as follows: If there is a sidewalk along a given City street, and there is a tree planted/growing between the curb and the sidewalk, then that tree is a City of Bowie street tree. The second instance is as follows: If there is no sidewalk along a given City street, and there is a tree planted/growing with any part of its trunk (main stem) within 12 feet of the "face of the curb", then that tree is a City of Bowie street tree. While there are a very limited number of exceptions to these specifications, in general, you can be pretty sure whether or not a tree is a City street tree using these parameters.

You may have noticed that I have used the terms "City streets" several times in this article. It is important to point out that we have at least four classifications of streets in the City of Bowie: 1) City of Bowie streets; 2) Prince George's County roads such as Mitchellville Road, Church Road, Old Chapel Road and Race Track Road; 3) State roads such as Rt. 450 and Rt. 197; and 4) Private roads and HOA roads. The only street trees for which our division is routinely responsible are those on City streets. This includes a routine pruning rotation schedule (every 5-7 years depending on growth, need, and circumstances), necessary service call pruning, and necessary tree removals due to tree decline or a hazardous situation. Our division is also responsible to assess and address emergencies and hazards regardless of road classification throughout the City limits, such as storm damages and/or road and sidewalk blockages. The course of action with these is determined on a case-by-case basis.

I hope this helps you understand a little better how tree maintenance and health is addressed in the public domain in the City of Bowie. Single Stream Recycling Reminder

All recyclables are collected by one full-size refuse truck from one recycling container. You may put all of your papers, cardboard, junk mail, catalogs (tied in bundles or put in bags so that they don't blow around) and phone books into your recycling bin with your glass, cans and plastics. And if you need larger containers (maximum 50 pounds when filled) you may use any container marked **RECYCLE**.

Just about all plastics are now collected – soft or rigid; margarine/yogurt/sour cream containers; bottles, cups, milk jugs, toys, lawn furniture, plastic bags tied up (to prevent them from blowing around).

Styrofoam, motor oil, chemical bottles, plates and utensils are **NOT** accepted.

Recycling helps save the planet and saves all City residents a minimum of \$55 per ton in landfill costs.

Pets Need Exercise Too

Most dogs were bred for a purpose, like herding, hunting, or protecting. Today however, most dogs are companion animals and spend far more of their time sedentary. While not bred for working, indoor cats too are significantly less active than outdoor counterparts. It is the owner's responsibility to ensure their pet's need for physical activity and mental stimulation are met on a daily basis.

Exercise is vital to the health and well-being of our pets. It helps prevent obesity and the associated health risks and it burns excess energy so Fido can be content and well-behaved during his inside time. Exercise and mental stimulation can be achieved in a number of different ways, such as leash walks, fetch, chasing a toy, or a trip to the dog park. Keep in mind that allowing your pet time outside in a fenced yard does not mean your pet will run laps to expel energy. Unless you have multiple dogs that will play together your dog is not likely to be more active in your backyard than in the house. Cats allowed outdoors should have a secure area that contains them safely on their owner's property and prevents them from running at large.

The City has a dog park to help you in your exercise endeavors. The dog park is located at 3600 Northview Drive next to Northview Elementary school. The dog park is open daily from 8 a.m. to dusk. The park is one acre and has separate areas for small and large dogs to run off-leash. To utilize the park your dog must be at least four months old and display current rabies vaccine and county pet license tags. The dog owner is responsible for following all city and county ordinances, removing fecal matter promptly, discouraging inappropriate behavior (i.e. digging, excessive barking), and assumes all legal responsibility for their dog's behavior. Please Clean Up Pet Waste

It is the responsibility of every pet owner or custodian to properly dispose of pet waste. Pet owners must frequently clean their yards of pet excrement. When walking your dog or cat, immediately clean up the waste. Do not toss your pet's excrement into a storm drain or sewer and don't expect it to dissolve into the ground. Carry a pet waste bag and dispose of your animal's waste with your other solid waste.

The Bowie City Code addresses the issue of animal waste:

- Sections 4-13, (c), 15-3 and 11-3. A public nuisance exists when an animal's uncleanliness or deposit of excrement causes odor or unsanitary conditions.
- Sections 4-17 and 17-2. Anyone owning or keeping a companion animal shall immediately remove and properly dispose of the excrement deposited by the animal from private property, other than their own, or from public property, including City sidewalks, streets and City parks.

Microchip Your Pet for \$15

The City Animal Control Office continues its low cost pet microchipping program. In a partnership with the Highway Veterinary Hospital, the program provides a permanent identification device to assist in the return of your lost pet. The Bowie Animal Control Office has an almost 100% return to owner rate of lost pets when the animal is found with a microchip implant.

Code Corner

Commercial Vehicles are Prohibited from Parking On City Streets

Commercial vehicles are prohibited from parking on a City street unless the vehicle is actually engaged in the loading or unloading of property or passengers in the course of a commercial purpose. In most instances, commercial vehicles are prohibited from parking on a residential lot too.

What is a commercial vehicle? Any crane, tow truck, or stake platform truck, or any motor vehicle, trailer or semi-trailer used in the furtherance of any commercial enterprise or used for carrying freight, merchandise, passengers, or tools of a trade for compensation, AND has a manufacturer's gross vehicle weight (gvw) specification exceeding 7500 lbs; or exceeds 300 cubic feet of load space; or has dual rear wheels; or contains advertising (lettering less than 4" in height of a firm name or similar designation is not considered advertising).

Not all vehicles used for a commercial or business enterprise are prohibited. Many work vans, vehicles with lettering less than 4", and small trucks with ladders do not meet the criteria above and are not prohibited from parking on the street..

Pursuant to **Chapter 14**, **Sec. 14-11** of the City Code prohibited commercial vehicles parked on the street are subject to a \$50 fine and/or towing.

You Need to Know the Bowie City Code

It is very important for every resident, business owner, property owner, visitor or newcomer to the City to be aware of the Bowie City Code. The common expression, "ignorance of the law is no excuse" is still valid today. It is your personal responsibility to know the code. Failure to comply with the code can result in serious penalties such as fines, property liens, court ordered abatements and even criminal prosecution.

The City educates the public through various forms of communication including public meetings, cable TV programming, brochures and pamphlets. Taking Steps To Be Prepared for Medical Emergencies
