

Information About the Maryland Register and COMAR

MARYLAND REGISTER

The Maryland Register is an official State publication published every other week throughout the year. A cumulative index is published quarterly.

The Maryland Register is the temporary supplement to the Code of Maryland Regulations. Any change to the text of regulations published in COMAR, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal, or emergency action, must first be published in the Register.

The following information is also published regularly in the Register:

- Governor's Executive Orders
- Attorney General's Opinions in full text
- Open Meetings Compliance Board Opinions in full text
- State Ethics Commission Opinions in full text
- Court Rules
- District Court Administrative Memoranda
- Courts of Appeal Hearing Calendars
- Agency Hearing and Meeting Notices
- Synopses of Bills Introduced and Enacted by the General Assembly
- Other documents considered to be in the public interest

CITATION TO THE MARYLAND REGISTER

The Maryland Register is cited by volume, issue, page number, and date. Example:

• 19:8 Md. R. 815—817 (April 17, 1992) refers to Volume 19, Issue 8, pages 815—817 of the Maryland Register issued on April 17, 1992.

CODE OF MARYLAND REGULATIONS (COMAR)

COMAR is the official compilation of all regulations issued by agencies of the State of Maryland. The Maryland Register is COMAR's temporary supplement, printing all changes to regulations as soon as they occur. At least once annually, the changes to regulations printed in the Maryland Register are incorporated into COMAR by means of permanent supplements.

CITATION TO COMAR REGULATIONS

COMAR regulations are cited by title number, subtitle number, chapter number, and regulation number. Example: COMAR 10.08.01.03 refers to Title 10, Subtitle 08, Chapter 01, Regulation 03.

DOCUMENTS INCORPORATED BY REFERENCE

Incorporation by reference is a legal device by which a document is made part of COMAR simply by referring to it. While the text of an incorporated document does not appear in COMAR, the provisions of the incorporated document are as fully enforceable as any other COMAR regulation. Each regulation that proposes to incorporate a document is identified in the Maryland Register by an Editor's Note. The Cumulative Table of COMAR Regulations Adopted, Amended or Repealed, found online, also identifies each regulation incorporating a document. Documents incorporated by reference are available for inspection in various depository libraries located throughout the State and at the Division of State Documents. These depositories are listed in the first issue of the Maryland Register published each year. For further information, call 410-974-2486.

HOW TO RESEARCH REGULATIONS

An Administrative History at the end of every COMAR chapter gives information about past changes to regulations. To determine if there have been any subsequent changes, check the "Cumulative Table of COMAR Regulations Adopted, Amended, or Repealed" which is found online at www.dsd.state.md.us/CumulativeIndex.pdf. This table lists the regulations in numerical order, by their COMAR number, followed by the citation to the Maryland Register in which the change occurred. The Maryland Register serves as a temporary supplement to COMAR, and the two publications must always be used together. A Research Guide for Maryland Regulations is available. CITIZEN PARTICIPATION IN THE REGULATION-MAKING PROCESS

Maryland citizens and other interested persons may participate in the process by which administrative regulations are adopted, amended, or repealed, and may also initiate the process by which the validity and applicability of regulations is determined. Listed below are some of the ways in which citizens may participate (references are to State Government Article (SG).

Annotated Code of Maryland):

- By submitting data or views on proposed regulations either orally or in writing, to the proposing agency (see "Opportunity for Public Comment" at the beginning of all regulations appearing in the Proposed Action on Regulations section of the Maryland Register). (See SG, §10-112)
- By petitioning an agency to adopt, amend, or repeal regulations. The agency must respond to the petition. (See SG §10-123)
- By petitioning an agency to issue a declaratory ruling with respect to how any regulation, order, or statute enforced by the agency applies. (SG, Title 10, Subtitle 3)
- By petitioning the circuit court for a declaratory judgment on the validity of a regulation when it appears that the regulation interferes with or impairs the legal rights or privileges of the petitioner. (SG, §10-125)
- By inspecting a certified copy of any document filed with the Division of State Documents for publication in the Maryland Register. (See SG, §7-213)



REGULATIONS CODIFICATION SYSTEM

Under the COMAR codification system, every regulation is assigned a unique four-part codification number by which it may be identified. All regulations found in COMAR are arranged by title. Each title is divided into numbered subtitles, each subtitle is divided into numbered chapters, and each chapter into numbered regulations.



A regulation may be divided into lettered sections, a section divided into numbered subsections, a subsection divided into lettered paragraphs, and a paragraph divided into numbered subparagraphs.

Cumulative Table of COMAR Regulations Adopted, Amended, or Repealed

This table, previously printed in the Maryland Register lists the regulations, by COMAR title, that have been adopted, amended, or repealed in the Maryland Register since the regulations were originally published or last supplemented in the Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR). The table is no longer printed here but may be found on the Division of State Documents website at www.dsd.state.md.us.

Table of Pending Proposals

The table below lists proposed changes to COMAR regulations. The proposed changes are listed by their COMAR number, followed by a citation to that issue of the Maryland Register in which the proposal appeared. Errata pertaining to proposed regulations are listed, followed by "(err)". Regulations referencing a document incorporated by reference are followed by "(ibr)". MARYLAND RULES OF PROCEDURE TITLE 1 - GENERAL PROVISIONS CHAPTER 300 - GENERAL PROVISIONS

AMEND Rule 1-322.1 to clarify its applicability, to add a Committee note, to add a cross reference, to delete references to birth dates, to permit the filing of personal identifier information required to implement a court order, to correct internal references, and to make stylistic changes, as follows:

Rule 1-322.1. EXCLUSION OF PERSONAL IDENTIFIER INFORMATION IN COURT FILINGS

(a) Applicability

This Rule applies only to pleadings and other papers filed in an action on or after July 9, 2013 by a person other than a judge or

judicial appointee. The Rule does not apply to administrative records, business license records, or notice records, as those terms are defined in 16-1001 (a).

Committee note: Although not subject to this Rule, judges and judicial appointees should be aware of the purpose of the Rule and refrain from including personal identifier information in their filings, unless necessary.

Cross reference: For the definition of "action," see Rule 1-202. For the prohibition against including certain personal information on recordable instruments, see Code, Real Property Article, §3-111. For the prohibition against publicly posting or displaying on an Internet Website certain personal information contained in court records, including notice records, see Code, Courts Article, §1-205.

[(a)] (b) Generally

[Unless] *Except as* otherwise *provided in this Rule*, required by law, [or] permitted by court order, *or required to implement a court order*, the following personal identifier information shall not be included in any electronic or paper filing with a court:

- (1) an individual's Social Security number[,] or taxpayer identification number[, or date of birth]; or
- (2) the numeric or alphabetic characters of a financial or medical account identifier.

[(b)] (c) Exceptions

Unless otherwise provided by law or court order, section [(a)] (b) of this Rule does not apply to the following:

- (1) a financial account identifier that identifies the property allegedly subject to forfeiture in a forfeiture proceeding; or
 - (2) the record of an administrative agency proceeding[;].
 - [(3) in a charging document, the date of birth of the defendant; or
 - (4) a court record filed prior to July 1, 2013.]

[(c)] (d) Alternatives

- If, by reason of the nature of the action, it is necessary to include in a filing personal identifier information described in section [(a)] (b) of this Rule, the filer may:
- (1) include in the filing only the last four digits of the Social Security or taxpayer identification number[, the year of the individual's birth,] or the last four characters of the financial or medical account identifier, unless that identifier consists of fewer than eight characters, in which event all characters shall be redacted;

Committee note: Financial accounts include credit and debit card accounts, bank accounts, brokerage accounts, insurance policies, and annuity contracts. PIN numbers or other account passwords also may need to be redacted, as well as health information identifiers.

- (2) file the unredacted document under seal, if permitted by order of court;
- (3) if the full information is required to be provided only to another party or to a court official, other than a judge or judicial appointee, provide the information separately to that party or official and file only a certificate that the information has been so provided;

Committee note: It may be necessary to provide personal identifier information to a court official, including a clerk, sheriff, or constable, in order for that official to send or serve notices, summonses, or other documents. Subsection [(c)(2)(A)](d)(3) of this Rule is not intended to permit *ex parte* communications with a judge.

(4) if the full information is required to be in the filing and the filing is a paper filing, file the paper in duplicate, one copy with the information redacted as required by section [(a)] (b) of this Rule and one copy without redaction, together with instructions to the clerk to

shield the unredacted copy in conformance with the Rules in Title 16, Chapter 1000; or

(5) if the full information is required to be in the filing and the filing is electronic, designate, in conformance with the applicable electronic filing requirements, the information to be redacted or shielded for purposes of public access.

Cross reference: See Rule 20-201.

[(d)] (e) Protective Orders

For good cause, the court may, by order, in a case:

- (1) require redaction of additional information; and
- (2) limit or prohibit a nonparty's remote electronic access to a document filed with the court.

Committee note: Other than remote access to docket entries, nonparties currently do not have remote access to documents filed with the court, except under certain limited circumstances, such as in asbestos-related litigation.

[(e)] (f) Non-conforming Documents

(1) Waiver

A person waives the protection of section [(a)] (b) of this Rule as to the person's own information by filing it without redaction and not under seal.

(2) Sanctions

If a person fails to comply with this Rule, the court on motion of a party or on its own initiative, may enter any appropriate order.

Committee note: This Rule does not affect the discoverability of personal information.

They will also be able to use crossbows for fishing. There is also a negative economic impact because finfish trotlines are limited to 25 hooks per line, and other nonactive line fishing gear is limited to no more than 25 lines per person. The Department is not aware of persons using more nonactive line fishing gear than is purposed. Overall, the recreational and charter boat community may see some slight indeterminable positive impact from the ability to use traps and catch their own bait.

E. By allowing new gear, bait shops and gear manufacturers may see a slight increase in their revenues as they are now able to sell more types of gear for use in the recreational fishery in Maryland. The amount of the impact is indeterminable and will depend on user demand.

- S. In addition to any requirements in this chapter, gear may only be used in accordance with the requirements in COMAR 08.02.25.

08.02.25 Gear

Authority: Natural Resources Article, §4-221, Annotated Code of Maryland

.01 Gear Definitions.

- A. In this subtitle, the following terms have the meanings indicated.
 - B. Terms Defined.
- (1) "Bank pole" means a line and hook dangling into a river, stream, or lake that has the other end attached to a pole which is stuck into the ground.

- (2) "Bow and arrow" means a projectile with a thin straight shaft that is intended to be shot from a weapon operated by hand which is composed of a curved piece of material with a taut cord to propel the arrow.
- (3) "Bush-bob" means a line and hook dangling into a river, stream, or lake that has the other end attached to an overhead tree or bush limb.
- (4) "Cast net" means a circular monofilament or multi-ply net with weights distributed around its edge that is cast or thrown by hand in such a manner that it spreads out on the water and sinks.
- (5) "Circle hook" means a non-offset hook with the point turned perpendicularly back to the shank.
- (6) "Crossbow" means a weapon for shooting a projectile with a thin straight shaft with an attached line that consists of a short bow mounted crosswise by the end opposite the stock.
- (7) "Dip net" means a mesh bag of netting which is suspended from a circular, oval, or a rectangular frame attached to a handle or rope which is fished by hand.
 - (8) "Eel pot" means an enclosure constructed of wire having:
 - (a) A square mesh size not less than 1/2 inch; or
- (b) If the mesh is smaller than 1/2 inch by 1/2 inch, an escape panel installed in an exterior wall of the retention chamber made of 1/2 inch by 1/2 inch mesh measuring at least 16 square inches
- (9) "Finfish trotline" means a single line from which hang, at intervals, multiple short lines which terminate with single baited hooks.
- (10) "Fish pot" means a single, finfish entrapment net device, without associated wings or leads, consisting of:
- (a) An enclosure of various shapes covered with mesh webbing of not less than 1-1/2 inch mesh size;
 - (b) One or more conical entrance funnels; and
- (c) One or more unobstructed escape vents, in the holding chamber, of at least 2-1/2 inches in diameter, if circular, or 2-1/2 inches mesh size if square.
- (11) "Fyke net" means a fixed finfish entrapment net device, without a pound or crib, consisting of:
- (a) A series of hoops covered by mesh webbing of #12, or larger, twine of not less than 1-1/2 inch mesh size;
 - (b) No more than one set of wings;
- (c) A leader or hedging not longer than 250 feet consisting of #12, or larger, twine and with a minimum mesh size of 3 inches;
- (d) In nets with a mesh size less than 2-1/2 inches, a cull panel at least 1 foot by 1 foot with unobstructed escape meshes when set with a minimum mesh size of 2-1/2 inches;
 - (e) A single entrance funnel; and
 - (f) One or more internal funnel shaped throats.
- (12) "Gig" means a hand-thrown implement with a shaft and three-pronged barbed point used for catching fish.
 - (13) "Gill net" means a net which:
- (a) Is maintained in a vertical position in the water with sinkers, floats, or stakes, or a combination of sinkers, floats, and stakes; and
- (b) Captures fish by means of a mesh too small to permit passage of the body of the fish or withdrawal of the head once the posterior margin of the gill covers has passed through the mesh.
- (14) "Gill net, anchored" means a gill net that is stationary in the water and secured to the bottom by conventional anchors or heavy weights on either end or along the bottom line which prevent the gill net from drifting freely with the tide or current.
- (15) "Gill net, attended" means the licensee remains in the boat within 2 miles of the gill net while it is in waters of the Chesapeake Bay, or within 1 mile when the gill net is in waters of the Atlantic Ocean, its coastal bays and their tributaries, or a tributary of the Chesapeake Bay.

- (16) "Gill net, drift" means a gill net not secured to or anchored to the bottom, designed to drift with the natural or prevailing tidal current, including a gill net rigged with up to 20 pounds of weight at each end, in addition to the weight required to achieve negative buoyancy.
- (17) "Gill net, stake" means a gill net hung from or supported by stakes which are set in a row and driven into the bottom.
- (18) "Hand" means a method of fishing whereby an individual uses their own hand to physically capture the fish.
- (19) "Handline" means a fishing line attended primarily by hand
- (20) "Haul seine" means an encircling type of net with wings, brail lines and poles, and a bunt or pocket, and with the following characteristics:
 - (a) Made of at least #12 twine;
- (b) Wings not greater than 15 feet in width at the attachment with the brail poles or brail line;
- (c) A width or depth not exceeding 22 feet at the bunt or back; and
 - (d) A width of the bunt or back not greater than 100 feet.
- (21) "Hook and line" means a line free of mechanical devices except for reels attached to a pole or rod or held in hand and attended in a manner that the fish is caught by the hook.
- (22) "Hoop net" means a single finfish entrapment net device consisting of:
- (a) An enclosure formed by a series of hoops covered by mesh webbing of #12 twine, or larger, and of not less than 1-1/2 inch mesh size:
 - (b) One or more internal funnel-shaped throats;
 - (c) A single entrance funnel;
 - (d) No wings and leader; and
- (e) In nets with a mesh size less than 2-1/2 inches, a cull panel at least 1 foot by 1 foot with unobstructed escape meshes when set having a minimum mesh size of 2-1/2 inches.
- (23) "J hook" means a hook having a point parallel to the hook shank.
- (24) "Jug" means a method of fishing, where the fish take the bait voluntarily, that uses lines suspended from floating plastic containers or devices.
- (25) "Landing net" means a mesh bag which is suspended from a circular, oval, or rectangular frame attached to a handle which is operated by hand to capture a fish attached to a line.
 - (26) "Lure" means an artificial bait used for catching fish.
- (27) "Net" means a mesh webbing panel or multiple panels which may be joined in various configurations for the capture of fish.
- (28) "Noodling" means a method of catching fish using one's hand or foot while in the water.
- (29) "Number 12 twine" means tightly twisted or braided nylon fibers, which are between 0.043 and 0.048 inches in diameter when compressed.
- (30) "Offset hook" means a hook with the point and barb not in the same plane with the shank.
- (31) "Pound net" means a fixed finfish entrapment net device consisting of:
- (a) One or more pounds or cribs each measuring at least 16 feet long by 16 feet wide at the surface of the water with a netting floor and open top;
 - (b) Mesh webbing with a twine size of #12 or larger;
 - (c) At least one heart leading into the crib;
- (d) A leader or hedging consisting of #12 twine or larger and with a minimum mesh size of 3 inches; and
- (e) No other type of fishing device, netting, or wire within the pound or crib.
- (32) "Rod" means a pole, cane, or stick to which a line can be attached directly.

- (33) "Rod and reel" means a pole with a line and usually a mechanism, attached at the bottom of the pole, and is turned by a crank so that the line is wound around a barrel
 - (34) "Seine" means an encircling type of net with mesh.
- (35) "Slat basket" means a wooden box that funnels fish down into a holding area that is usually baited.
- (36) "Snagging" means actively fishing with a hook that intentionally foul-hooks the fish outside the mouth.
- (37) "Spear" means a shaft with a sharp point and/or barbs for capturing a fish by piercing its body.
- (38) "Spear gun" means any type of device used for propelling a spear under water by any means other than manual in order to catch fish.
- (39) "Stinger hook" means any hook which trails another hook, either by direct physical attachment to the lead hook or by a connective device such as a swivel or chain, and is part of the same bait or lure.
- (40) "Trap" means a single, bait finfish entrapment device, without associated wings or leads, and consisting of:
- (a) An enclosure of various shapes covered with mesh webbing of not greater than 1/2-inch square mesh size for tidal waters and 1/4-inch square mesh for nontidal waters;
- (b) One or more entrances with an opening not more than 2 inches in diameter in tidal waters or not more than 1 inch in diameter in nontidal waters; and
 - (c) No dimension greater than 24 inches in any direction.
- (41) "Trip" means the duration which begins with departure of the fishing vessel from a shore-based location and which terminates with return to a shore-based location.
- (42) "Trolling" means the method of angling during which fish are attracted to a lure or bait being trailed from a boat which is moving forward or backward by mechanical, manual, or wind power.

.02 Recreational Gear.

- A. Recreational Gear.
- (1) An individual may only use finfish gear in accordance with this chapter except as described in Natural Resources Article, §\$4-714 4-730 and 4-735, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (2) An individual using finfish gear in accordance with this chapter shall comply with all seasons, creel limits, size limits and other species specific regulations as specified under this subtitle and Natural Resources Article, Title 4, Annotated Code of Maryland.
 - B. Traps.
- (1) An individual harvesting finfish for recreational purposes may use one trap in State waters except as provided in $\S B(4)$ of this regulation and in accordance with this subsection.
- (2) A trap shall be marked with the individual's DNRid number.
- (3) An individual may not harvest fish with a trap in all Special Trout Management Waters as described in COMAR 08.02.11.01C, D, G, and H.
 - (4) A trap shall be set:
- (a) In front of the individual's property, within 100 yards of the shore, and:
- (i) Attached by a line to the property or a privately owned pier or dock; and
 - (ii) Marked by a buoy or pole and sign; or
 - (b) By attaching to a boat that is not docked.
 - C. Active Line Fishing Gear.
 - (1) The following gear is considered active line fishing gear:
 - (a) Hook and line;
 - (b) Rod and reel; and
 - (c) Handline.
- (2) A maximum of three or a combination of three of the gear listed under \$C(1) of this regulation may be used by an individual fishing in nontidal waters.

- (3) The gear listed in SC(1) of this regulation shall be used in a manner in which the individual is handling the gear or actively in control of the gear.
- (4) No more than two hook units per line may be used on the gear listed under C(1) of this regulation.
 - (5) Snagging is not legal in State waters.
- (6) Any gear listed in §C(1) of this regulation used to harvest striped bass shall be used in accordance with the restrictions described in COMAR 08.02.15.03.
 - D. Nonactive Line Fishing Gear.
- (1)The following gear is considered nonactive line fishing gear:
 - (a) Jug;
 - (b) Bank pole;
 - (c) Bush-bob; and
 - (d) Finfish trotline.
- (2) Nonactive line fishing gear must be marked with the individual's DNRid number.
- (3) No more than 25 nonactive line fishing gear as listed in SD(1)(a)—(c) of this regulation may be used by an individual in State waters.
 - (4) An individual may use no more than two finfish trotlines.
 - (5) Bush-bobs and bank poles may not be used in tidal waters.
- (6) Bush-bobs and bank poles may only be used in accordance with Natural Resources Article, §4-617, Annotated Code of Maryland.
 - (7) Finfish Trotlines:
 - (i) Shall have no more than 25 hooks;
 - (ii) Shall be no more than 100 feet in length;
 - (iii) May not be made of metal; and
 - (iv) May not be baited with scaled fish bait.
- (8) A jug shall have no more than 2 hooks per line and no more than one line per jug.
 - E. Nets.
 - (1) The following gear is considered recreational fishing nets:
 - (a) Cast nets;
 - (b) Seines;
 - (c) Dip nets; and
 - (d) Landing nets.
 - (2) Cast nets shall:
 - (a) Only be used in tidal waters; and
 - (b) Have a radius not exceeding 10 feet.
 - (3) Seine.
 - (a) In tidal waters seines:
 - (i) Shall have mesh no greater than 1/4 inch;
 - (ii) May not exceed 50 feet in width and 5 feet in height; and
 - (iii) Shall only be emptied from shore.
 - (b) In nontidal waters seines:
 - (i) Shall have mesh no greater than 1/4 inch;
 - (ii) May not exceed 6 feet in width and 4 feet in height;
- (iii) May not be used within 50 yards of the base of any dam or the mouth of any river or tributary; and
 - (iv) Shall only be emptied from shore.
 - (4) Dip Net.
- (a) A dip net may only be used in accordance with COMAR 08.02.11.04 and Natural Resources Article, §4-617, Annotated Code of Maryland.
 - (b) A dip net may not be used in tidal waters of the State.
 - F. Projectile Gear.
 - (1) The following gear is considered projectile gear:
 - (a) Bow and arrow;
 - (b) Crossbow;
 - (c) Gig;
 - (d) Spear; and
 - (e) Spear gun.

- (2) A person may not kill, try to kill, or otherwise injure fish by the use of projectile gear except as provided in this regulation.
- (3) In nontidal waters, an individual may only use projectile gear in accordance with COMAR 08.02.11.04 and 08.02.19.06.
- (4) A person may use projectile gear to take any fish except for the following species:
 - (a) American lobster (Homarus americanus);
 - (b) All species of shark;
 - (c) Snapping turtle (Chelydra serpentina);
 - (c) Striped bass (Morone saxatilis);
- (d) Any species listed as threatened or endangered under COMAR 08.03.08; and
 - (e) Any species prohibited in COMAR 08.02.11.04.
- (5) A person may not shoot projectile gear without specific advance permission within 100 yards of any:
 - (a) Human being;
 - (b) Private or public swimming area;
 - (c) International diving flag;
 - (d) Occupied duck blind; or
- (e) Vessel other than that occupied by the individual using the projectile gear.
 - (6) Projectile gear shall have a retrieval line attached to it.
- (7) Gigs or other hand-thrown implements with a shaft and barbed point may be used to catch fish in accordance with this chapter.
- G. Hand Gear. The following gear is considered legal hand gear that may be used in all open State waters:
 - (1) Hand; and
 - (2) Noodling.
 - H. Recreational Gear General.
- (1) An individual harvesting with any legal gear as described in this chapter shall be licensed, registered, or otherwise authorized to recreationally harvest fish in Maryland in accordance with Natural Resources Article, Title 4, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (2) Individuals harvesting finfish for recreational purposes may only use gear as listed in this regulation.

III. Assumptions. (Identified by Impact Letter and Number from Section II.)

- D(1). The projected decrease in revenue to the commercial industry is a 20% reduction of the dockside value for the 10-year average Atlantic menhaden harvest in Maryland. The actual annual reduction will vary by year, but should average around 20% as this is the target level of reduction in landings required by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission. Seafood dealers will also see a reduction in revenue as there will be fewer menhaden for them to sell. The reduction in revenue for seafood dealers is indeterminable as there is no way to calculate the lost profits of the dealers with regards to the reduction of the menhaden harvest.
- D(2). There will likely be an indeterminable amount of increased expenditure by the commercial industry because of these regulations. Atlantic menhaden is the preferred bait of crab pot fishermen. As such, a reduction in bait availability caused by these regulations could increase the price of bait and therefore increase operating costs for individual fishermen. It is likely that the industry will find alternatives for bait or compensate for lower menhaden availability through fishing behavior, but some increase in expenditures is likely.
- F(1). Tackle stores often sell bait to fishermen, including Atlantic menhaden. With the reduction in the menhaden harvest, bait stores will have less access to menhaden to sell in their stores. The amount of these reductions is not quantifiable due to pricing variability and unknown distribution of sales.
- F(2). Recreational anglers use Atlantic menhaden for bait in various fisheries in the Chesapeake Bay and along the Atlantic Coast. If bait prices increase due to lower than normal supply, these anglers will have to pay more to use menhaden as bait. Individual fishermen's response to increased bait price or unavailability will vary, making quantifying any effect difficult.

A. Ouota.

- (1) The annual total allowable landings of Atlantic menhaden for the commercial fishery is set by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission and shall be published through a public notice issued in accordance with §F of this regulation.
- (2) Any annual overages of the quota will be deducted from the subsequent year's quota.
- B. Seasons. A public notice shall be issued in accordance with §F of this regulation when the quota and season is approved by the Atlantic State Marine Fisheries Commission.
 - C. Commercial Catch Limits.
- (1) Prior to the State quota in §A of this regulation being met or exceeded, there is no catch limit for Atlantic menhaden.
- (2) Upon the State quota being met or exceeded, the catch limit for Atlantic menhaden and the harvest rate at which an Atlantic menhaden bycatch allowance landing permit is required shall be established and may be modified through a public notice issued in accordance with §F of this regulation.
 - D. Atlantic Menhaden Bycatch Allowance Landing Permits.
- (1) An individual may apply for an Atlantic menhaden bycatch allowance landing permit if, as of February 18, 2013, the individual had a pound net site registered with the Department.
- (2) An individual may be issued only one Atlantic menhaden bycatch allowance landing permit.
- (3) A permittee shall have in possession the Atlantic menhaden bycatch allowance landing permit when engaged in permitted activities
- (4) Atlantic menhaden bycatch allowance landing permits may not be transferred and are valid only for the named individual on the permit card.
- (5) A permittee shall be on board any boat harvesting Atlantic menhaden under an Atlantic menhaden bycatch allowance landing permit.

E. Reporting.

- (1) In addition to the requirements of Natural Resources Article, §4-206, Annotated Code of Maryland, an individual in possession of an Atlantic menhaden landing permit shall report in the manner specified by the Department.
- (2) The Department may suspend the holder of an Atlantic menhaden landing permit from participation in the menhaden fishery for up to 90 days per violation for failing to comply with \$E(1) of this regulation.
- (3) The Department may deny an application for an Atlantic menhaden landing permit for failing to comply with $\S E(1)$ of this regulation during the previous season.

F. General.

- (1) When the menhaden quota, established by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission, has been met, the Secretary may issue a public notice on the Fisheries Service website to modify the season and catch limits in compliance with the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission Interstate Fishery Management Plan.
- (2) The Secretary shall make a reasonable effort to disseminate a public notice issued under this section through various other media so that an affected individual has a reasonable opportunity to be informed.
- (3) A violation of the restrictions set by the Secretary in accordance with this section is a violation of this regulation.

Three changes do not worsen the position of any group affected by the regulation or the general public and they could reasonably have been anticipated by the participants in the rulemaking. These changes occurred in response to public comments received from school systems, disability and special education advocates, parents, and others in the community.

Regulation .03B(11)(a): Amends the definition of 'Developmental delay' by adding "using a child's adjusted or chronological age" after "A 25 percent delay", and before " and as measured and verified by appropriate diagnostic instruments and procedures, in one or more of the following developmental areas."

Regulation .03B(2): Adds a definition "Adjusted age means, for children born before 37 weeks gestation, the number of weeks born prematurely subtracted from the infant's chronological age. An infant's adjusted age is used until the infant's adjusted age is twelve months."

All infants are evaluated for disabilities in part by determining when they achieved developmental milestones and whether their milestone achievements are delayed compared to their peers. Several commenters, including the University of Maryland School of Medicine, the Maryland Developmental Disabilities Council, infants and toddler programs, advocates for children with disabilities, parents, grandparents, family members, and the State Interagency Coordinating Council (SICC) requested the addition of the 'adjusted age' definition in .03B(2) and .03B(11)(a). Commenters noted that some Maryland Infants and Toddlers Programs use a child's chronological age while others used an adjusted age, and that the United States Department of Education's Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) recommended clarifying this inconsistency during a review of Maryland's services to infants and toddlers with disabilities, as the inconsistency causes duplication of services, which is barred under 34 CFR § 303.302(c)(2)(i) and the use of criteria different than that used by Neonatal Intensive Care Units (NICUs) failed to comply with service coordination requirements under 34 CFR 303.302(c)(1). Commenters also noted that the SICC identified that Infant and Toddler Programs were not consistent in the use of chronological age or adjusted age and advised MSDE as required under 34 CFR § 303.651 that this inconsistency be corrected.

The adjusted age is only applicable to those children born prematurely and potentially referred to local Infants and Toddlers Program (ITPs) following release from a NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit). NICU follow-up clinics use certain criteria to follow prematurely born children at risk for developmental delay. Many of these children will make up their developmental delay through ongoing monitoring with the NICU follow-up clinic prior to age one. Using adjusted age ensures that Infant and Toddler Programs do not duplicate services to infants receiving services from NICU follow-up clinics.

If the ITPs use chronological age, both the NICU follow-up clinics and the ITPs may be serving the same children (duplication). This is inconsistent with 34 CFR §303.302(c)(2). Also including adjusted age provides consistency for parents across NICUs and LITPs (coordination) consistent with 34 CFR §303.302(c)(1). The ITPs would be speaking the same language that parents are hearing from the NICUs.

These changes clarify for statewide practice that proper evaluation for infants born prematurely is not based on their chronological age but on their adjusted age. These changes are not substantive because the changes reflect the legal requirements on coordination and non-duplication that implicitly governed the proposed regulations. These changes also comply with the recommendations given by the SICC and OSEP and ensure consistency across Maryland Infant and Toddler programs as with other agencies that serve children with disabilities, e.g. Neo-natal Intensive Care Unit (NICUs). This change increases program efficiency by reducing duplicative efforts to serve this population, which allows more children to be served.

An agency wishing to adopt, amend, or repeal regulations must first publish in the Maryland Register a notice of proposed action, a statement of purpose, a comparison to federal standards, an estimate of economic impact, an economic impact on small businesses, a notice giving the public an opportunity to comment on the proposal, and the text of the proposed regulations. The opportunity for public comment must be held open for at least 30 days after the proposal is published in the Maryland Register.

Following publication of the proposal in the Maryland Register, 45 days must pass before the agency may take final action on the proposal. When final action is taken, the agency must publish a notice in the Maryland Register. Final action takes effect 10 days after the notice is published, unless the agency specifies a later date. An agency may make changes in the text of a proposal. If the changes are not substantive, these changes are included in the notice of final action and published in the Maryland Register. If the changes are substantive, the agency must repropose the regulations, showing the changes that were made to the originally proposed text.

Proposed action on regulations may be withdrawn by the proposing agency any time before final action is taken. When an agency proposes action on regulations, but does not take final action within 1 year, the proposal is automatically withdrawn by operation of law, and a notice of withdrawal is published in the Maryland Register.

- (2) Be registered with the Advisory Committee by February 15 as a 4-year-old or a 5- year-old to race that year.
 - C. Sustaining Fees.
- (1) Except as provided in C(2) of this regulation, the following sustaining fees are required by the following dates for the maintenance of a horse's eligibility:
- (a) A sustaining fee as a 4-year-old, \$120 and a completed sustaining form by February 15 of that year; or
- (b) A sustaining fee as a 5-year-old, \$120 and a completed sustaining form by February 15 of that year.
- (2) If the March 15 2-year-old payment and the February 15 3-year-old payment were made, no sustaining fee is due.
- (3) Except as provided under \$C(2) of this regulation, a horse shall be disqualified from participation in any races during the current year sponsored by this Program if there is a failure to make a timely payment of a fee under this section.

D. Declaration Fee.

- (2) If the due date for a payment falls on a weekend or a holiday observed in this State, the payment shall be timely if:
- (a) Delivered to the Advisory Committee by the next business day; or
- (b) Mailed bearing a postmark which is not later than the next business day.
- (3) Exceptions may not be made to the requirements of this section.
- F. The owner of the horse is responsible for the declaration fee, and, if the owner of the horse is not the declarer of the horse, the person making the declaration is also responsible for the declaration fee.

G. Eligibility to Start.

- (1) A horse, otherwise eligible to participate in this program, may not be declared in to start unless the horse has at least one satisfactory charted performance line at the time set for declaring in.
- (2) A satisfactory charted performance line is a performance line:
- (a) Credited to a horse after the horse starts from behind a starting gate in a qualifying or purse race within 30 days of the Sires Stakes Program for 4 and 5 Year-Olds race in which the horse is to participate; and
- (b) Which shows that the horse has completed the race without a break, other than a break caused by interference or broken equipment, at, or within, the following times according to the horse's age and gait:

(i) For events conducted on a 5/8 mile track:

H. Use of Fees.

- (1) All sustaining fees, less administrative costs, shall be added to the purse monies for this program.
- (2) All declaration fees shall be added to the purse of the event for which the fees were paid.
 - I. Types of Races.
- (1) Provisions may be made for the running of the following races at a distance of 1 mile, to be known as the Sires Stakes Program for 4 and 5-Year-Olds, which shall be open only to those horses eligible to participate in the Sires Stakes Program for 4 and 5-Year-Olds:
 - (a) 4- and 5-year-old pace for colts and fillies; and
 - (b) 4- and 5-year-old trot for colts and fillies.
- (2) Upon the recommendation of the Advisory Committee, the races provided for in §I(1)(a) and (b) of this regulation may be separated into races for colts only and fillies only.
- J. If more horses are declared to start in an event than can fit on the starting gate, the licensee holding the event shall split the event and divide the purse equally, except the declaration fees shall be allocated based on the number of horses in each division.
- K. The various age, sex, and gait divisions established under §I of this regulation may, from time to time, be eliminated by the Commission upon the recommendation of the Advisory Committee.
- L. Each age, sex, and gait division, depending upon the availability of funds, may not be raced more than three times per year.
- M. The purse amounts and the number of times per year each race is offered for the races authorized under §I of this regulation shall be determined by the Advisory Committee and approved by the Commission.
 - N. Breeder Awards.
- (1) 10 percent Breeder Award, based upon the amount of the purse distributed, shall be divided between the dam and sire of a horse, if the horse:
- (a) Receives purse monies from a race provided for under §I of this regulation; and
- (b) Meets the applicable eligibility requirements set forth for registration in the Foaled Stakes Program under Regulation .43 of this chapter, or in the Sire Stakes Program under Regulation .53 of this chapter.
 - (2) Of the 10 percent awarded under $\S N(1)$ of this regulation:
 - (a) 8 percent shall be awarded to the dam of the horse; and
 - (b) 2 percent shall be awarded to the sire of the horse.
- (3) The awards, as apportioned under $\S N(2)$ of this regulation, shall be paid to the:
- (a) Individual or entity who was the owner of record with the USTA of the dam and sire at the time the horse was bred; or
 - (b) Lessee of the horse, rather than the owner, if the:
- (i) Dam or the sire, respectively, was leased at the time the breeding took place; and
 - (ii) Lease was on record with the USTA at that time.
 - $O.\ Post\ positions\ for\ all\ races\ shall\ be\ determined\ by\ lot.$
 - P. Gait.
- (1) A horse's gait shall be specified and accompany each sustaining fee.
- (2) A change of a horse's specified gait may be made at the time the horse is declared into a race.
- (3) Any payments made before a change in the specified gait of a horse shall be credited to the races for the gait originally specified.

- Q. Time.
- (1) The time for starters to declare into a Sires Stakes Program for 4 and 5-Year-Olds race shall be the same as the time established by the race track for declaring into an overnight race.
- (2) If the race track schedules the time for drawing into an overnight race more than 5 days before the running of the races, a Sires Stakes Program for 4 and 5-Year-Olds race may not be drawn with these races, but shall be drawn at a time that is not more than 5 days before the scheduled running of the race.
 - R. Purse Distribution.
- (1) The purse in each race shall be divided in the following manner:
- (a) 50 percent, 25 percent, 12 percent, 8 percent, and 5 percent to the first five finishers, respectively, if five or more horses finish;
- (b) 50 percent, 25 percent, 15 percent, and 10 percent to the first four finishers, respectively, if only four horses finish;
- (c) 60 percent, 30 percent, and 10 percent to the first three finishers, respectively, if only three horses finish;
- (d) 65 percent and 35 percent to the first two finishers, respectively, if only two horses finish; or
- (e) 65 percent to the finisher and 35 percent remains with the gait, if only one horse finishes.
- (2) Unless the Commission eliminates the races for one of the gaits in accordance with §K of this regulation, the purse monies shall be divided equally between races for trotters and races for pacers.
- S. With the advice of the Advisory Committee, the Commission may allow the entire Sires Stakes Program for 4 and 5-Year-Olds races to be held at any race track in Maryland.

- B(2). Office of Health Care Quality. Any new hospice programs approved by the Commission would need to be licensed by the Office of Health Care Quality (OHCQ). Since there is only a moderate increase in overall capacity projected, this will have a minimal impact on the number of licensing and certification surveys currently conducted by OHCQ staff and thus can be accommodated within their budget. There are policies and goals articulated within the chapter that involve the Commission working with OHCQ, and this is consistent with the policy direction of OHCQ and the Commission.
- C. Local Government. Since local governments are not direct providers of hospice services, there will not be an impact on local government providers. The Commission plans to work on outreach to underserved populations, which should benefit local governments.

.01 Purpose.

The purpose of this chapter is to:

- A. Establish a Maryland Department of Transportation Public-Private Partnership Program ("Program") to enhance the State's transportation systems, assets, services, and infrastructure; and
- B. Describe and provide a process for the development, solicitation, evaluation, award, and delivery of public-private partnerships in the Department's Program.

.02 Scope.

- A. In accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, \$10A-101(g)(2), Annotated Code of Maryland, the Department is a reporting agency that may establish public-private partnerships and execute public-private partnership agreements in connection with any public infrastructure assets for which it is responsible.
- B. Within the Department, the Office of the Secretary shall be responsible for administering the Program on behalf of its Modal Administrations.
- C. In accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, \$\$10A-101(g)(2) and (3), Annotated Code of Maryland, the Maryland Transportation Authority is a separate reporting agency and its public-private partnership program is not included in this chapter.

.03 Definitions.

- A. In this chapter, the following terms have the meanings indicated.
 - B. Terms Defined.
- (1) "Budget Committees" has the meaning stated in State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A -101, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (2) "Department" means the Maryland Department of Transportation.
- (3) "Industry forum" means a presolicitation information gathering event that may include public and private sector participants.
- (4) "Industry review meeting" means a meeting during the solicitation process with shortlisted private entities.
- (5) "Modal Administrations" means the State Highway Administration, the Maryland Transit Administration, the Maryland Aviation Administration, the Maryland Port Administration, and the Maryland Motor Vehicle Administration.
- (6) "Multi-step solicitation process" means a public-private partnership solicitation process that includes some or all of the following steps:
 - (a) Issuance of a request for qualifications;
- (b) Preproposal conference; issuance of a draft request for proposals;
 - (c) Industry review meetings; and
 - (d) Issuance of a final request for proposals.
- (7) "Private entity" has the meaning stated in State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A -101, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (8) "Program" means the structure, process, methodology and terms and conditions applicable to the Department's development, solicitation, evaluation, award, and delivery of transportation public

infrastructure assets for which it is responsible in accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A -101, Annotated Code of Maryland.

- (9) "Public infrastructure asset" has the meaning stated in State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A -101, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (10) "Public notice of solicitation" has the meaning stated in State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A -101, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (11) "Public-private partnership" has the meaning stated in State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A -101, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (12) "Public-private partnership candidate concept application" means the documentation that must be submitted to the Steering Committee to initiate and inform a high-level review of a public-private partnership concept generated from within the Department.
- (13) "Reporting agency" has the meaning stated in State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A -101, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (14) "Responsibility determination" has the meaning stated in State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A -101, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (15) "Secretary" means the Secretary of the Maryland Department of Transportation.
- (16) "Shortlisted private entity" means a private entity that has been both qualified based on its response to a request for qualifications and selected as one of the highest qualified private entities, allowing them to continue in the solicitation process.
- (17) "Steering Committee" is the Transportation Public-Private Partnerships Steering Committee established to advise the Secretary on the structure and implementation of the Department's Program and comprised of Department and other State employees identified by the Secretary.

.04 Transportation Public-Private Partnerships Steering Committee.

- A. The Steering Committee is established to advise the Secretary on the structure and implementation of the Department's Program, including, but not limited to, the following:
- (1) Identification of potential public-private partnership opportunities for screening;
- (2) Screening of public-private partnership opportunities, including both high-level and detailed-level;
- (3) Prioritization of public-private partnership opportunities for solicitation;
- (4) Developing presolicitation and solicitation plans and processes for public-private partnerships;
 - (5) Ongoing monitoring of public-private partnerships; and
- (6) Communication and coordination with other State reporting agencies.
- B. The Steering Committee shall be comprised of Department and other State employees as identified by the Secretary.
- C. The Steering Committee shall be chaired by a Department employee, as identified by the Secretary, and referred to as the Steering Committee chair.

.05 Identification Process.

- A. Public-private partnership concepts and opportunities identified within the Department and its Modal Administrations and through other state, regional, local, and municipal processes.
- (1) Potential public-private partnership concepts and opportunities may be identified through periodic transportation planning, communication, and evaluation processes that are carried out within the Department and its Modal Administrations and

through other state, regional, local, and municipal processes, including but not limited to:

- (a) Consolidated transportation program;
- (b) Statewide transportation improvement program;
- (c) Long-range transportation plans developed by metropolitan planning organizations; and
 - (d) County priority project lists.
 - (2) Public-Private Partnership Candidate Concept Application.
- (a) To initiate a high-level review, screening, and policy analysis of a proposed public-private partnership concept or opportunity, a Public-Private Partnership Candidate Concept Application shall be submitted to the Steering Committee chair by an internal sponsor, either:
 - (i) A Modal Administration planning office; or
 - (ii) The Department's planning staff.
- (b) A Public-Private Partnership Candidate Concept Application may be submitted at any time, and may be supplemented with additional information as needed.
- (c) Relevant supporting information or documentation shall be included in the submission of the Public-Private Partnership Candidate Concept Application, and to the extent such information is available, including but not limited to:
- (i) Preliminary ideas of public-private partnership scope, schedule, and project lifecycle considerations;
- (ii) Preliminary qualitative evaluation of relevant benefits and cost;
 - (iii) Preliminary description of financial concepts;
- (iv) Rationale for a public-private partnership delivery method relative to a conventional project delivery approach; and
- (v) Additional information, as necessary, to support a high-level screening process, as outlined in COMAR 11.01.17.06C (1)
- (d) The format and required contents of the Public-Private Partnership Candidate Concept Application shall be:
 - (i) Developed by the Steering Committee;
 - (ii) Approved by the Secretary; and
 - (iii) Updated by the Steering Committee as needed.
 - B. Unsolicited Proposals.
- (1) In accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-301, Annotated Code of Maryland, the Department shall be permitted to accept, reject, or evaluate unsolicited proposals for public-private partnerships that will assist the Department in implementing its functions in a manner consistent with State policy.
- (2) Assets defined as transportation facilities projects under Transportation Article, §4-101(h), Annotated Code of Maryland:
 - (a) Are not the direct responsibility of the Department;
- (b) Are the direct responsibility of the Maryland Transportation Authority; and
- (c) Should not be included in unsolicited proposals submitted to the Department.
 - (3) An unsolicited proposal may be submitted at any time.
 - (4) An unsolicited proposal shall:
- (a) Be delivered to the Secretary's Office to the attention of the Steering Committee chair;
 - (b) Consist of five hard copies and one electronic copy; and
- (c) Be sealed in a mailing envelope or package bearing the private entity's name, address, and the words "Public-Private Partnership Unsolicited Proposal" clearly on the outside.
 - (5) Unsolicited Informational Meetings.
- (a) Private entities may request meetings with the Department to discuss potential unsolicited proposals prior to submission.
- (b) Requests for unsolicited informational meetings shall be submitted to the Steering Committee chair.

- (c) The Department may not be required to grant meetings in response to a request.
- (d) During unsolicited informational meetings, the Department may provide informal feedback and comments to the private entity.
- (e) The primary purpose of unsolicited informational meetings shall be to avoid private entities spending unnecessary time and resources on the development of unsolicited proposals that do not directly meet the State's transportation needs.
- (f) A formal review and screening of an unsolicited proposal shall be undertaken only after a private entity completes the formal submission process.
- (6) An unsolicited proposal shall be conceptual, containing only the information required for the Steering Committee to conduct a high-level review and screening of the proposed public-private partnership concept.
- (7) An unsolicited proposal shall include, at a minimum, the following:
- (a) An executive summary of the major elements of the unsolicited proposal, including:
 - (i) The title of the proposed concept;
- (ii) A brief description and justification of the proposed concept;
- (iii) The name and address of the public-private partnership private entity; and
- (iv) A signature of an individual authorized to act on behalf of and bind the private entity, along with the individual's telephone number and email address.
- (b) Summary of the experience, expertise, technical and financial competence, and professional qualifications of the private entity.
 - (c) A summary narrative that describes:
- (i) The key components of the proposed public-private partnership concept;
- (ii) Preliminary ideas of public-private partnership scope, schedule, and project lifecycle considerations;
- (iii) Preliminary qualitative evaluation of relevant benefits and cost;
 - (iv) Preliminary description of financial concepts;
- (v) The relevance of the public-private concept to other transportation facilities or other public infrastructure assets; and
- (vi) A statement of the public-private partnership concept's consistency with existing governmental transportation planning or project documents and governing law.
 - (d) A high-level description of financial feasibility:
- (i) Identifying amounts and sources of any public funding that may be required;
- (ii) Showing how estimated funding from all relevant sources would be sufficient to support all asset delivery activities, including design, property and equipment acquisition, construction, long term capital replacement activities, financing, operations, and maintenance; and
- (iii) Showing how estimated funding from all relevant sources would be sufficient to provide for contingencies to meet public infrastructure asset handback requirements at the end of the public-private partnership agreement.
- (e) Rationale for a public-private partnership delivery method relative to a conventional project delivery approach.
- (f) Clear indication of any proprietary information that should be protected in accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-301(d)(2), Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (g) Additional information, as necessary, to support a high-level screening process, as outlined in COMAR 11.01.17.06C (1).

- (8) Unsolicited Proposal Fee.
- (a) Each unsolicited proposal that addresses a project already in the Consolidated Transportation Plan, shall be accompanied by a check in the amount of \$10,000 made payable to the Maryland Department of Transportation.
- (b) Each unsolicited proposal that does not address a project already in the Consolidated Transportation Plan shall be accompanied by a check in the amount of \$25,000 made payable to the Maryland Department of Transportation.
- (c) The Department reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to determine whether submitted alternates and variations of proposals shall be considered separate proposals that require separate proposal fees.
 - (d) Unsolicited proposal fees are non-refundable.

.06 Screening Process.

- A. The purpose of screening is to assist the Department in determining the appropriateness, viability, and effectiveness of delivering a public infrastructure asset for which it is responsible using a public-private partnership methodology.
- B. The screening methodology is a means to systematically apply uniform and consistent factors to both internally generated public-private partnership concepts and unsolicited public-private partnership concepts.
 - C. The screening process shall be organized in two phases.
 - (1) High-Level Screening Phase.
- (a) Factors to be considered during the high-level screening may include, but are not limited to:
- (i) Ability to meet State transportation, socioeconomic development, workforce, and environmental goals;
 - (ii) Technical implementation considerations;
- (iii) Potential need for coordination with other State agencies, including but not limited to the Maryland Transportation Authority;
- (iv) Opportunities to accelerate asset delivery implementation;
- (v) Ability to allocate and share risks in a cost effective manner that shall be consistent with State law and in the best interests of the State;
- (vi) Opportunities to reduce reliance on public funds or finance, or both;
 - (vii) Public affordability considerations; and
- (viii) Potential for increased revenue generation and revenue sharing with the Department.
- (b) For internally generated public-private partnership concepts, the high level screening shall be conducted based on the Public-Private Partnership Candidate Concept Application and supporting information provided by the internal sponsor.
- (c) For unsolicited public-private partnership concepts, the high-level screening shall be conducted based on information provided by the private entity in an unsolicited proposal and any supplementary information available within the Department.
- (d) Based on the findings of the high level screening, the Steering Committee may recommend to the Secretary that specific public-private partnership concepts be advanced or not be advanced to the detailed-level screening.
- (e) The Secretary's written approval shall be required to advance or not advance a public-private partnership concept to the detailed-level screening phase.
- (f) Within 45 days after receipt of a Public-Private Partnership Candidate Concept Application or an unsolicited proposal, the Steering Committee shall:
- (i) Notify the internal sponsor or private entity that the concept has been advanced or not advanced to detailed-level screening; or

- (ii) Request additional information from the internal sponsor or private entity.
 - (2) Detailed-Level Screening Phase.
- (a) The detailed-level screening phase shall be more comprehensive than the high-level screening phase.
- (b) In addition to the findings of the high-level screening phase, analyses and documentation during the detailed-level screening phase may include some or all of the following categories:
 - (i) Scope, design concepts, and phasing schedules;
- (ii) Compliance with federal and State environmental and transportation planning requirements;
 - (iii) Technical and financial feasibility analyses;
- (iv) Evaluation of operations and maintenance requirements;
 - (v) Asset lifecycle costs and revenue estimates;
 - (vi) Risk assessment of key asset delivery elements; and
- (vii) Other analyses determined to be necessary to determine the appropriateness, viability, and effectiveness of a public-private partnership delivery method.
- (c) The types of analyses and resources committed to a detailed-level screening phase will be determined by the Steering Committee and the Secretary, on a case-specific basis.
- (d) Based on the findings of the detailed-level screening, the Steering Committee shall make recommendations to the Secretary which public-private partnership concepts should be advanced and which should not be advanced to submission of a presolicitation report.
- (e) The Secretary's written approval shall be required to advance or not advance a public-private partnership concept to submission of a presolicitation report.
- (f) Within 45 days after advancement of a public-private partnership concept to the detailed-level screening analysis, the Steering Committee shall:
- (i) Notify the internal sponsor or private entity that the concept is or is not under development for possible submission of a presolicitation report; or
- (ii) Request additional information from the internal sponsor or private entity.

.07 Presolicitation.

- A. Presolicitation Report Development.
- (1) The development of a presolicitation report for submission involves a broad range of activities that may run concurrent to the high-level and detailed-level screening phases.
- (2) In consultation with the Steering Committee, the Secretary shall determine:
- (a) The tasks required for the development of a presolicitation report; and
 - (b) The responsible parties within the Department.
- (3) The development of a presolicitation report containing all elements required in State Finance and Procurement Article, \$10A-201(b)(1), Annotated Code of Maryland may entail a variety of tasks, including but not limited to:
- (a) Analyses and documentation, including some or all of the following categories:
 - (i) Scope, design concepts, and phasing schedules;
- (ii) Compliance with federal and State environmental and transportation planning requirements;
 - (iii) Technical and financial feasibility analyses;
- (iv) Evaluation of operations and maintenance requirements;
 - (v) Asset lifecycle costs and revenue estimates;
 - (vi) Risk assessment of key asset delivery elements; and

- (vii) Other analyses determined to be necessary to determine the appropriateness, viability, and effectiveness of a public-private partnership delivery method;
- (b) Issuing public requests for information to obtain additional information that may help the Department confirm or refine key assumptions; and
- (c) Organizing public industry forums to obtain additional information that may help the Department confirm or refine key assumptions.
- B. The Department may not issue a public notice of solicitation for a public-private partnership until:
- (1) A presolicitation report concerning the proposed publicprivate partnership is submitted to the Comptroller, the State Treasurer, the budget committees, and the Department of Legislative Services in accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-201(a), Annotated Code of Maryland that contains the information required by State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-201(b)(1), Annotated Code of Maryland; and
 - (2) The Department has sought and received:
- (a) The official designation of the Board of Public Works of the public infrastructure asset as a public-private partnership; and
- (b) The approval of the Board of Public Works of the method of solicitation.

.08 Solicitation Process.

- A. The solicitation process for public-private partnerships shall be competitive, regardless of whether the public-private partnership concept originated internal to the Department or from an unsolicited proposal.
- B. Solicitations Relating to Concepts Described in Unsolicited Proposals.
- (1) The competitive solicitation process shall protect any proprietary information that is identified as such and included in the unsolicited proposal in accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-301(d)(2), Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (2) An individual or firm that has submitted an unsolicited proposal may participate in any subsequent competitive solicitation process, in accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, \$10A-301(e), Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (3) The private entity shall be responsive to all components of the subsequent competitive solicitation process even if certain information requested by the subsequent competitive solicitation process has already been submitted as part of the unsolicited proposal.
- (4) The Department reserves the right to issue a public notice of solicitation relating to a concept described in an unsolicited proposal after the rejection or termination of the evaluation of the unsolicited proposal or any competing proposals.
 - C. Multi-Step Solicitation Process.
- (1) The Department may use a multi-step solicitation process that includes, but is not limited to, some or all of the following steps:
 - (a) Issuance of a request for qualifications;
 - (b) Preproposal conference;
 - (c) Issuance of a draft request for proposals;
 - (d) Industry review meetings; and
 - (e) Issuance of a final request for proposals.
- (2) The determination to utilize some or all of the solicitation steps shall be case-specific.
- (3) The Department may include additional solicitation steps on a case-specific basis as set forth in the public notice of solicitation.
- (4) For each private entity that responds to a public notice of solicitation, the Department shall make a responsibility determination in accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-202(c), Annotated Code of Maryland.

- (5) Request for Qualifications.
 - (a) The purpose of a request for qualifications is to:
- (i) Identify private entities that qualify as participants in the solicitation process.
- (ii) Identify a shortlist of the highest qualified candidates for continuing in the solicitation process.
- (b) Based on the responses to the request for qualifications, the Department may:
 - (i) Identify one or more private entities as qualified; and
- (ii) Develop a shortlist of one or more of the highest qualified candidates for continuing in the solicitation process.
- (c) Only candidates that have been selected to continue in the solicitation process as shortlisted private entities are eligible to:
 - (i) Participate in industry review meetings;
 - (ii) Receive drafts of the request for proposals;
- (iii) Submit comments on drafts of the request for proposals;
 - (iv) Receive the final request for proposals; and
- (v) Submit a written proposal in response to the final request for proposals.
 - (6) Preproposal Conference.
- (a) The purpose of a preproposal conference is to facilitate better understanding of solicitation requirements and processes.
- (b) A preproposal conference may be scheduled by the Department after the initial public notice of solicitation for a public-private partnership.
- (c) Preproposal conferences are open to all interested private entities.
 - (7) Draft Request for Proposals.
- (a) As part of a multi-step solicitation process, the Department may issue one or more draft requests for proposals to qualified candidates selected to continue in the solicitation process as shortlisted private entities.
- (b) Draft requests for proposals may include, but are not limited to:
- (i) Instructions to private entities for responding to the request for proposals;
 - (ii) Technical provisions;
 - (iii) Scope of work; and
- (iv) Public-private partnership agreement key terms and components.
- (c) Only shortlisted private entities may submit written or verbal comments and questions concerning the draft request for proposals to the Department to the extent permitted by the solicitation process.
- (d) The Department may use comments and questions from shortlisted private entities for subsequent revisions to the draft request for proposals.
 - (8) Industry Review Meetings.
- (a) The Department may conduct industry review meetings as part of a multi-step solicitation process.
 - (b) The purpose of industry review meetings is to:
- (i) Obtain comments and make revisions to the draft request for proposals;
 - (ii) Obtain the best value for the State;
- (iii) Facilitate the full understanding regarding the requirements of the State for the public-private partnership concept;
- (iv) Facilitate the full understanding of the contents of the proposals required to be submitted by shortlisted private entities; and
 (v) Finalize the requirements for the request for
- (v) Finalize the requirements for the request for proposals.
- (c) Agreement negotiations may not be conducted during industry review meetings.

- (d) Industry review meetings are restricted to candidates that have been selected to continue in the solicitation process as shortlisted private entities.
 - (e) Industry review meetings may be:
- (i) Joint workshops with all shortlisted private entities invited to participate; or
- (ii) One-on-one meetings between the Department and individual shortlisted private entities.
- (f) The Department may use comments and questions obtained from shortlisted private entities through industry review meetings for subsequent revisions to the draft request for proposals.
 - (9) Final Request for Proposals.
- (a) In a solicitation process involving a request for qualifications phase, a final request for proposals shall be issued to shortlisted private entities selected to continue in the solicitation process.
- (b) The contents of the final request for proposals may be based on information gathered during earlier solicitation phases, including but not limited to:
 - (i) Preproposal conference;
 - (ii) Request for qualifications; and
 - (iii) Industry review meetings.
- (c) The Department may issue a final request for proposals without previously:
 - (i) Issuing a request for qualifications;
 - (ii) Issuing a draft request for proposals; or
 - (iii) Conducting industry review meetings.
 - (10) Information Availability During Solicitation.
- (a) The Department may make relevant technical and financial information available to private entities through an electronic data room.
- (b) The Department may respond to relevant additional information requests by private entities in support of due diligence reviews, including requests for site inspections.
- (c) Information or site access provided to individual private entities pursuant to an additional information request must also be made available to all other interested private entities if a shortlist of private entities has not yet been established.
- (d) Information or site access provided to individual private entities pursuant to an additional information request must also be made available to all other shortlisted private entities if a shortlist of private entities has been established.
- (e) Private entities may be required to sign confidentiality agreements prior to release of information deemed confidential.
 - D. Reimbursement.
- (1) The Department may reimburse a private entity in accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-202(f), Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (2) If the Department elects to reimburse a private entity, the specific terms, conditions, method, and timing for reimbursing a private entity shall be described in the public notice of solicitation associated with the specific public-private partnership.
- (3) The reimbursement terms and conditions may include the requirement for the private entity to execute a stipend agreement and to transfer rights to use the work product produced by the private entity during the solicitation process to the Department as a condition to receiving reimbursement.
- (4) The Department shall only consider reimbursement for shortlisted private entities.
 - (5) Maximum Reimbursement Amount.
- (a) The Department shall not provide a reimbursement in excess of \$3,000,000 to an individual private entity for costs incurred in response to the solicitation of a public-private partnership.
- (b) The Department may establish a reimbursement less than the maximum prescribed herein on a case-specific basis.

(6) Except as set forth in the solicitation documents, should the solicitation process or negotiations be suspended, discontinued, or terminated, the private entity shall have no rights of recourse, including reimbursement of the private entity's unsolicited proposal review fees or costs associated, directly or indirectly, with the solicited proposal developments.

E. Reservation of Rights.

- (1) The Department reserves all rights available by law and in equity in its public-private partnership solicitation process, including without limitation, the right to:
- (a) Reject any and all submittals, responses, qualifications, and proposals, whether solicited or unsolicited, at any time or for any reason:
- (b) Issue addenda, supplements, and modifications to a public notice of solicitation;
- (c) Cancel a solicitation in whole or in part at any time prior to the execution of a public-private partnership agreement, subject to any agreed upon compensation to proposers set forth in the solicitation documents or pursuant to State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-202(f), Annotated Code of Maryland;
- (d) Issue a new public notice of solicitation after withdrawal of a public notice of solicitation;
- (e) Establish protocols for private entities to remedy minor deficiencies in responses to requests for qualifications or proposals within a specified period of time;
- (f) Disqualify any private entity at any point during a solicitation process for violating any rules or requirements of the solicitation set forth in the public notice of solicitation, in any communication from the Department, or as otherwise set forth in applicable law;
- (g) Determine whether to pursue federal credit assistance on behalf of the private entities;
- (h) Publically disclose information received during the solicitation process as governed by law and by the public notice of solicitation, pursuant to State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-203(b), Annotated Code of Maryland;.
- (i) Exercise any other rights reserved or afforded to the Department under applicable law and the public notice of solicitation; or
- (j) Disqualify any private entity for any conflict of interest or other conduct manifesting a lack of responsibility.
- F. Additional reservations of Department rights may be included in the solicitation documents for a public-private partnership.

.09 Evaluation, Negotiation, and Award.

- A. The Department shall conduct evaluations of submitted responses to requests for qualifications and evaluations of submitted proposals to requests for proposals using the information submitted by the private entity.
- (1) Submitted information shall be evaluated against the requirements of the solicitation and the evaluation criteria that the Department specified in the solicitation for the particular public-private partnership opportunity.
- (2) The objective of this evaluation process is to select the private entity that provides the best value solution for the State.
- (3) The Department's evaluation criteria shall be clearly set forth in each request for solicitation, issued with a ranking of such criteria from more important to less important.
- (4) A failure to provide all requested information may result in the Department eliminating a response or proposal from further consideration.
- B. The processes for evaluating submitted responses to request for qualifications and for evaluating submitted proposals to requests for proposals shall be described and submitted to the Board of Public

Works as part of the presolicitation process the Board of Public Works shall approve.

- C. The Secretary shall establish one or more evaluation committees on a case-specific basis that may:
 - (1) Be comprised of:
 - (a) Secretary's Office employees;
 - (b) Modal Administration employees; and
 - (c) Other State employees;
 - (2) Review statements of qualifications;
 - (3) Review proposals; and
- (4) Seek advice from the Department, other State agencies and State employees, and outside experts and consultants during the evaluation process.
 - D. Best and Final Offers.
- (1) After the evaluation of all responsive proposals, the Secretary may request best and final offers from private entities determined by the evaluation committees to be eligible to submit best and final offers.
- (2) The Secretary may request multiple iterations of best and final offers.
 - (3) A best and final offer process is not required.
- E. After an apparent best value private entity has been selected by the evaluation committees, in consultation with the Secretary, the Department may enter into negotiations with that private entity.
- F. The Secretary may determine that negotiations be completed by a negotiations committee either comprised of members of the case-specific evaluation committees or established separately from the evaluation committee that may:
 - (1) Be comprised of:
 - (a) Secretary's Office employees;
 - (b) Modal Administration employees; and
 - (c) Other State employees;
- (2) Review the apparent best value private entity's response to the request for proposals;
- (3) Review the apparent best value private entity's best and final offer, if any; and
- (4) Receive assistance from outside experts and consultants during the evaluation process.
- G. The Department, in its sole discretion, may initiate negotiations with a private entity other than the apparent best value private entity if:
- (1) Negotiations with the apparent best value private entity are unsuccessful; or
- (2) The apparent best value private entity does not provide sufficient information or timely feedback to finalize the agreement in accordance with the Department's schedule for the public-private partnership solicitation.
- H. After completion of successful negotiations, the negotiations committee shall recommend a best value private entity to the Secretary for review and approval.
- I. After the Secretary provides written approval of the best value private entity, the Department shall:
- (1) Finalize and prepare the public-private partnership agreement for execution, in coordination with the best value private entity; and
- (2) Commence the final agreement review process in accordance with State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-203, Annotated Code of Maryland.
 - J. Final Agreement Review.
- (1) The Secretary shall comply with the final agreement review process established in State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A-203, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (2) A final agreement report shall accompany a final agreement submitted under State Finance and Procurement Article,

- §10A-203, Annotated Code of Maryland, containing the following items, if relevant:
- (a) The financial plan, including annual cash flows, for any public-private partnership including:
 - (i) State contributions;
 - (ii) Federal loans or credit assistance;
 - (iii) Private investment;
 - (iv) Local contributions; and
 - (v) Other funding contributions;
- (b) The ongoing financial costs and increases associated with any operating and maintenance contracts;
- (c) The impact any public private partnership agreement may have on the State's debt affordability measures;
- (d) The authority a private entity may have to recover its investment through tolls or other fees, including how future increases in tolls or other fees may increase;
- (e) An analysis of why the proposed agreement is more advantageous than a conventional project delivery;
- (f) A description, including the estimated value, of any land, buildings, or other structures or assets that are transferred or exchanged with a private entity as part of the public private partnership;
- (g) A summary of the performance measures included in the ongoing operation of the public private partnership;
- (h) A summary of the penalties associated with nonperformance relating to the ongoing maintenance and operation; and
- (i) A plan for how the long-term operating and maintenance contract will be overseen by the agency.

.10 Delivery.

Procedures for Public-Private Partnership Agreements. In the development of a public-private partnership agreement, the Secretary shall comply with the provisions established in State Finance and Procurement Article, §10A -401, Annotated Code of Maryland.

Notice of Proposed Action

The Executive Secretary of the Maryland Transportation Authority (MDTA) proposes to repeal existing Regulations .01—.06 and adopt new Regulations .01—.09 under COMAR 11.07.07 Electronic Toll Collection and Toll Violation Enforcement. This action was considered by the Chairman and members of the Maryland Transportation Authority at an open meeting held on March 28, 2013, notice of which was given through placement on the MDTA website (www.mdta.maryland.gov).

Statement of Purpose

The purpose of this action is to repeal existing regulations and adopt new regulations to clarify the process of electronic toll collection and toll violation enforcement pursuant to House Bill 420, Chapter 113, Acts of 2013.

Comparison to Federal Standards

There is no corresponding federal standard to this proposed action.

Estimate of Economic Impact

I. Summary of Economic Impact. The MDTA will expend funds to establish the computer program needed to implement the new video toll enforcement process. The proposed process will allow the effective collection of unpaid tolls due to the MDTA. If vehicle owners disregard notice of toll due ("NOTD") an increase in funds may be realized as a result of the addition of the \$50 civil penalty.

- (1) "Agreement" means the application and its corresponding terms and conditions to establish an E-ZPass account which sets out the terms and conditions, and instructions for use of the Authority's electronic toll collection system.
- (2) "Authority" means the Maryland Transportation Authority and its designated agents.
- (3) "Authority highway" has the meaning stated in Transportation Article, §21-1401, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (4) "CCU" means the Maryland Department of Budget and Management Central Collection Unit.
- (5) "Citation" means a notice of a toll violation and related civil penalties sent by the Authority, pursuant to Transportation Article, §21-1414, Annotated Code of Maryland, to a person who is required to and fails to pay a video toll established by the Authority.
- (6) "Electronic toll collection" has the meaning stated in Transportation Article, §21-1414, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (7) "E-ZPass account" means a financial relationship between the Authority and a person who agrees to abide by the Agreement established for the electronic collection of tolls.
- (8) "E-ZPass account maintenance fee" means any monetary charge that may be assessed to offset the cost of electronic toll collection accounts and is set in accordance with Chapter .05 of this subtitle.
- (9) "Final notice" means a written administrative notice from the Authority of outstanding amounts due to the Authority when preparing to refer amounts due through a notice of referral to the CCU in accordance with Regulation .08C of this chapter.
- (10) "Final toll violation" means the total amount due as a result of a toll violation where a citation has been issued, is not paid and:
- (a) A person fails to request a hearing within the time permitted pursuant to Transportation Article, § 21-1414(d)(6), Annotated Code of Maryland;
- (b) A person fails to appear for a trial requested in District Court and has exhausted all appeals; or
- (c) A person is adjudicated to be liable for the toll violation by the District Court and has exhausted all appeals.
- (11) "Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA)" means the Motor Vehicle Administration of the Department of Transportation.
- (12) "Notice of toll due" or "NOTD" means an administrative notice of a video toll transaction.
- (13) "Past due notice" means a written administrative notice from the Authority, sent when payment for a toll violation remains due through a notice of referral to the MVA in accordance with Regulations .08A or .08B of this chapter.
- (14) "Pay" means the Authority receives the payment of a toll by:
 - (*a*) *Cash*;
- (b) Permitting a charge against an E-ZPass account with a balance sufficient to pay the toll due; or
 - (c) Another means of payment approved by the Authority.

- (15) "Person alleged to be liable" means:
- (a) The registered owner of a motor vehicle involved in a video toll transaction; or
- (b) A person to whom a registered owner of a motor vehicle has transferred liability for a video toll transaction in accordance with Transportation Article, §21-1414, Annotated Code of Maryland and this chapter.
- (16) "Posted speed limit" means the speed limit posted in an electronic toll collection lane.
- (17) "Recorded image" has the meaning stated in Transportation Article, §21-1414, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (18) "Registered owner" means, with respect to a vehicle, the person or persons designated as the registered owner in the records of the state agency that is responsible for vehicle registration.
- (19) "Speed violation" means a violation of the posted speed limit in an electronic toll collection lane.
- (20) "State" means any state of the United States, the District of Columbia, a possession of the United States, or a province or territory of Canada.
- (21) "Toll" means the amount of money due as established by the Authority for passage of a vehicle on an Authority highway.
- (22) "Toll collection facility" has the meaning stated in Transportation Article, §21-1414, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (23) "Toll violation" means the failure to pay a video toll within the time prescribed by the Authority in a notice of toll due and as otherwise provided in a response from the MDTA regarding a denial of a transfer of liability.
- (24) "Transponder" means a device which is designed to transmit information used to collect tolls and is associated with a particular toll collection account.
- (25) "Trip" means one passage of a vehicle on an Authority highway where a toll is normally collected.
- (26) "Vehicle" means a motor vehicle as defined by Transportation Article, §11-135, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (27) "Video monitoring system" has the meaning stated in Transportation Article, §21-1414, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (28) "Video toll" means the amount assessed by the Authority when a video toll transaction occurs.
- (29) "Video toll transaction" means any transaction in which a vehicle does not or did not pay a toll at the time of passage through a toll collection facility with a video monitoring system.

.03 E-ZPass Application Process.

- A. A person who applies to establish an E-ZPass account with the Authority shall complete an online, voice, or written application, or register a retail-purchased transponder, and provide the requested information to the Authority.
- B. The Authority may, in its discretion, deny the E-ZPass application of a person for prior toll violations, in Maryland or any other state; prior speed violations; or for other reasons related to the use of electronic toll collection.
- C. A person establishing an E-ZPass account shall agree to comply with the Agreement.
- D. A person establishing an E-ZPass account shall purchase at least one transponder or have a pre-owned Maryland transponder.
- E. Any payment to an E-ZPass account shall be made by any approved payment method in accordance with the Agreement.
 - F. E-ZPass Accounts.
- (1) The Authority may establish different E-ZPass account types to be selected by the applicant during the E-ZPass application process.
- (2) The specific conditions for each E-ZPass account type shall be included in the Agreement.

.04 Terms and Conditions for E-ZPass Account Holders.

- A. An E-ZPass account holder acknowledges and agrees to comply with the Agreement when opening an E-ZPass account.
 - B. Discount Toll Programs.
- (1) The Authority may establish different types of discount toll programs.
 - (2) 2-axle Vehicle Discount Toll Programs.
- (a) E-ZPass account holders may purchase approved discount toll programs that have a number of trips which are valid for a specified period of time.
- (b) Trips not used within the period of time specified in the applicable discount toll program are no longer valid.
 - (c) Refunds or credits may not be issued for unused trips.
 - (3) Multi-Axle Vehicle Discount Toll Programs.
- (a) An E-ZPass account holder may receive a toll discount based on the volume of use by vehicles included on their E-ZPass account.
- C. An E-ZPass account holder shall maintain sufficient funds within the E-ZPass account in accordance with the Agreement.
- D. If at any time an E-ZPass account balance is insufficient to pay tolls due, an E-ZPass account holder remains liable for the toll and the Authority shall:
- (1) Send a NOTD in accordance with Regulation .06 of this chapter;
- (2) Issue a Citation after failure to pay a NOTD in accordance with Regulation .07 of this chapter; and
- (3) Collect the toll due and any civil penalties that accrue in accordance with Regulation .08 of this chapter.
- E. An E-ZPass account holder remains responsible for updating account information with the Authority in accordance with the Agreement. Failure to keep the E-ZPass account information current does not relieve the account holder of liability for tolls due.
- F. The use of the transponder is transferable between vehicles listed on an E-ZPass account.
 - $G.\ Speed\ Violations Procedures.$
- (1) A speed violation notice shall be sent per E-ZPass account for E-ZPass private accounts and per transponder for E-ZPass business accounts.
- (2) Notice of Warning for a Speed Violation. A warning notice shall be sent for the first speed violation in a toll lane and the notice shall include the consequences for receiving a second violation.
- (3) Notice of E-ZPass Account Suspension for a Speed Violation.
- (a) E-ZPass account suspension for a speed violation is the temporary invalidation by the Authority of an E-ZPass account holder's privilege to use a transponder or an established E-ZPass account for toll collection in all states where E-ZPass is accepted.
- (b) An E-ZPass account suspension notice shall be sent for a second speed violation in a toll lane occurring within 180 days of the first speed violation for which notice has been given by the Authority.
- (c) An E-ZPass account suspension notice shall notify the E-ZPass account holder that their E-ZPass account privileges are being suspended for 60 days, and shall include the beginning date and ending date of the E-ZPass account suspension of privileges.
- (d) An E-ZPass account suspension notice shall include the consequences of any speed violation or attempt to use the E-ZPass account while under suspension.
 - (4) Notice of E-ZPass Account Closure for a Speed Violation.
- (a) An E-ZPass account closure notice shall be sent for the third speed violation in a toll lane occurring within 180 days of the first speed violation for which notice has been given by the Authority.
- (b) An E-ZPass account closure notice shall notify the E-ZPass account holder that their E-ZPass account privileges are being terminated, and shall specify the effective date of the E-ZPass account closure.

- (c) An E-ZPass account closure notice shall include the consequences of any attempt to use the E-ZPass account once closed.
- (5) The Authority may issue speed violation notices by first class U.S. mail.

.05 Suspension or Termination of E-ZPass Account Privileges.

- A. The Authority may suspend or terminate an E-ZPass account holder's privileges for violation of electronic toll collection laws, this chapter, or the Agreement.
- B. The Authority shall notify an E-ZPass account holder as soon as practicable of a suspension or termination of E-ZPass account privileges.
- C. If E-ZPass account privileges are suspended or terminated, the Authority shall return to an E-ZPass account holder within 60 days any unencumbered funds remaining in an E-ZPass account. Unused discount toll program trips remaining on an E-ZPass account may not be refunded or credited.

.06 Video Toll Transactions.

- A. Notice of Toll Due (NOTD).
- (1) The Authority shall send the person alleged to be liable that was involved in a video toll transaction a NOTD containing:
- (a) The name and address of the person alleged to be liable under this chapter;
- (b) The license plate number and state of registration of the vehicle involved in the video toll transaction;
 - (c) The location where the video toll transaction took place;
 - (d) The date and time of the video toll transaction;
 - (e) The amount of the video toll;
 - (f) The date by which the video toll must be paid;
 - (g) A copy of the recorded image;
- (h) The statutory defenses described in Transportation Article, §21-1414(g), Annotated Code of Maryland to transfer liability to another person;
- (i) A warning that failure to pay the video toll, request a transfer of liability in the manner and time prescribed or the late payment of the video toll, will result in a Toll Violation with issuance of a citation and civil penalty, in the amount set forth in Regulation .09 of this chapter, and that continued failure to pay may lead to refusal or suspension of the motor vehicle registration and referral to the CCU;
- (j) A warning that payment of the video toll, whether timely or late is an admission of liability of the video toll transaction; and
- (k) Instructions on how to pay the video toll or request a transfer of liability of the video toll transaction to another person.
- (2) Except as provided in §B of this regulation, the person alleged to be liable for the video toll transaction shall pay the amount due within 30 days from the mailing date of the NOTD.
- (3) Except as provided for in §B of this regulation, failure of the person alleged to be liable to pay the video toll by the NOTD payment due date shall constitute a toll violation subject to a citation and civil penalty, in the amount set forth in Regulation .09 of this chapter.
- (4) If a transfer of liability is requested, the person alleged to be liable shall send the request to the Authority, which must be received by the Authority on or before the NOTD payment due date.
 - B. Transfer of Liability.
- (1) The person alleged to be liable may request a transfer of liability of the video toll transaction from the Authority by asserting any of the statutory defenses described in Transportation Article, §21-1414(g), Annotated Code of Maryland, which includes providing the additional documentation required by statute.
- (2) The Authority shall receive the request for a transfer of liability, including all supporting documentation by the NOTD payment due date.

- (3) If the Authority does not receive payment of the video toll or a request for a transfer of liability by the NOTD payment due date a toll violation shall result and the Authority shall issue a citation for a toll violation as set forth in Regulation .07 of this chapter.
- (4) A request for transfer of liability received by the Authority on or before the NOTD payment due date shall be reviewed by the Authority to determine whether liability for the video toll transaction may be transferred from the person alleged to be liable to another person.
- (5) If the Authority accepts the request for transfer of liability as described in this regulation:
- (a) The Authority shall send the person alleged to be liable a determination of the request for transfer of liability indicating it is accepted;
- (b) The person alleged to be liable shall not be responsible for the video toll transaction; and
- (c) The Authority shall send a new NOTD to the person to whom liability was transferred in accordance with Transportation Article, § 21-1414(g), Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (6) If the Authority denies the request for transfer of liability as described in this regulation:
- (a) The person alleged to be liable shall receive a determination of a request for transfer of liability from the Authority indicating it is denied;
- (b) The person alleged to be liable shall pay the video toll by the NOTD payment due date or within 10 days from the mailing date on the denial notification, whichever is later; and
- (c) If payment is not received in accordance with \$B(6)(b) of this regulation, a toll violation will result with a date relating back to the day after the original NOTD payment due date and the Authority shall issue a citation for a toll violation as set forth in Regulation .07 of this chapter.

.07 Toll Violation Enforcement.

A. Citation.

- (1) Within 60 days of a toll violation, the Authority shall issue a citation, as provided in Transportation Article, §21-1414, Annotated Code of Maryland, to the person alleged to be liable who has previously been issued an NOTD.
- (2) The citation shall contain information required in Transportation Article, §21-1414(d)(3), Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (3) Within 30 days of the mailing date of the citation a person alleged to be liable may:
- (a) Pay the video toll and civil penalty, in the amount set forth in Regulation .09 of this chapter, to the Authority; or
- (b) Contest the citation by electing to stand trial in the District Court of Maryland.

B. Final Toll Violation.

- (1) A citation may result in a final toll violation.
- (2) For any citation that results in a final toll violation and remains unpaid, the Authority may do one or more of the following:
- (a) Request the MVA to refuse the vehicle registration for a vehicle that has incurred at least one unpaid final toll violation as set forth in Regulation .08 of this chapter;
- (b) Send a request to the MVA for suspension of the vehicle registration if a vehicle has incurred at least \$1,000 in unpaid final toll violations as set forth in Regulation .08 of this chapter;
- (c) Refer any amounts due as a result of the unpaid final toll violation to the CCU as set forth in Regulation .08 of this chapter; and
- (d) Collect the amount due by any other means as provided by law.

.08 Collection and Suspension.

- A. Notice of Referral to the MVA for Refusal.
- (1) The Authority may send to the registered vehicle owner in Maryland or any state with which the Authority has entered into a reciprocal agreement in accordance with Transportation Article, §21-1415, Annotated Code of Maryland, a past due notice indicating that failure to pay will result in refusal of the vehicle registration for any vehicle incurring at least one unpaid final toll violation, under the provisions of Transportation Article, §27-110, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (a) If full payment is not received by the Authority within 15 days of the mailing date on the past due notice the Authority shall notify the MVA to refuse to renew or transfer the vehicle registration in accordance with COMAR 11.15.28.03.
- (b) The Authority shall notify the MVA to permit the renewal or transfer of the vehicle registration:
- (i) When payment is made in full for any outstanding unpaid final toll violations, including those that may have occurred after the referral to MVA, whether collection is being sought through the CCU or directly at the Authority and payment is made to the MVA in accordance with \$A(2)(e) of this regulation; or
- (ii) If amounts have been referred to the CCU, the registered owner of the vehicle enters into a confessed judgment with the CCU to pay the amount due to the Authority and payment is made to the MVA in accordance with A(2)(e) of this regulation.
- (c) If the registered owner of the vehicle defaults on the confessed judgment entered into with the CCU as provided in \$A(1)(b)(ii) of this regulation, the Authority shall notify the MVA to refuse to renew or transfer the vehicle registration in accordance with COMAR 11.15.28.03.
 - (2) A past due notice shall:
- (a) Advise the registered owner of the total amount due to the Authority for each unpaid final toll violation upon which the referral is based;
- (b) Inform the recipient that failure to pay will result in referral to the MVA for refusal of the vehicle registration;
- (c) Identify to whom payment shall be made for the various unpaid final toll violations that are included in the referral in the case where portions of the amount due have already been referred to the CCU for collection in accordance with §C of this regulation;
- (d) Advise the registered owner that payment of the outstanding unpaid final toll violations due to the Authority by the payment due date may avoid referral and that failure to pay will result in referral to the MVA for refusal of the vehicle registration; and
- (e) Advise the registered owner of additional fees that may be imposed by the MVA.
- (3) Additional unpaid final toll violations that accrue after the final toll violation that leads to referral to MVA shall be added to the total amount due and are to be paid in accordance with A(1)(b) of this regulation.
 - B. Notice of Referral to the MVA for Suspension.
- (1) The Authority may send to the registered owner in Maryland or any state with which the Authority has entered into reciprocal agreement in accordance with Transportation Article, §21-1415, Annotated Code of Maryland, a past due notice for any vehicle incurring at least \$1,000 in unpaid final toll violations, under the provisions of Transportation Article, §27-110, Annotated Code of Maryland, indicating that failure to pay will result in referral to the MVA for suspension of the vehicle registration.
- (a) The threshold dollar amount of \$1,000 for issuing a past due notice for referral to the MVA for suspension of the vehicle registration may include previous amounts due to the Authority that were referred to the CCU for collections in accordance with \$C of this regulation.

- (b) If full payment is not received by the Authority within 15 days of the mailing date on the past due notice, the Authority shall notify the MVA to suspend the vehicle registration in accordance with COMAR 11.15.28.04.
- (c) The Authority shall notify the MVA to lift suspension of the vehicle registration:
- (i) When payment is made in full for any outstanding unpaid final toll violations, including those that may have occurred after the referral to MVA, whether collection is being sought through the CCU or directly at the Authority and payment is made to the MVA in accordance with §B(2)(e) of this regulation; or
- (ii) If amounts have been referred to CCU, the registered owner of the vehicle enters into a confessed judgment with CCU to pay the amount due to the Authority and payment is made to the MVA in accordance with §B(2)(e) of this regulation.
- (d) If the registered owner of the vehicle defaults on the confessed judgment entered into with CCU as provided in \$B(1)(c)(ii) of this regulation, the Authority shall notify MVA to suspend the vehicle registration in accordance with COMAR 11.15.28.04.
 - (2) A past due notice shall:
- (a) Advise the registered owner of the total amount due to the Authority for each unpaid final toll violation upon which the referral is based;
- (b) Inform the recipient that failure to pay will result in referral to the MVA for suspension of the vehicle registration;
- (c) Identify to whom payment shall be made for the various unpaid final toll violations that are included in the referral in the case where portions of the amount due have already been referred to the CCU for collection in accordance with §C of this regulation;
- (d) advise the registered owner that payment of the outstanding unpaid final toll violations due to the Authority by the payment due date shall avoid referral and that failure to pay will result in referral to the MVA for refusal of the vehicle registration; and
- (e) Advise the registered owner of the additional fees that may be imposed by the MVA.
- (3) Additional unpaid final toll violations that accrue after the referral to MVA shall be added to the total amount due and are to be paid in accordance with \$B(1)(c) of this regulation.
 - C. Final Notice—Referral to the CCU.
- (1) The Authority may send to a person that has incurred unpaid final toll violations that total the amount established by the CCU, a final notice of possible referral to the CCU. The CCU shall act as the authorized agent for any civil action instituted for the collection of unpaid Final Toll Violations pursuant to Transportation Article, $\S 21-1414(d)(6)(i)$, Annotated Code of Maryland.
- (a) The amounts referred to the CCU for unpaid final toll violations may be included by the Authority to reach the threshold dollar amount of \$1,000 for referral to the MVA of a vehicle registration for suspension in accordance with \$B of this regulation.
- (b) If full payment is not received by the Authority within 15 days of the mailing date on the final notice to avoid referral to the CCU, the Authority will refer those final toll violations to the CCU.
- (2) A final notice of possible referral to the CCU shall advise the person of the total amount due to the Authority for each unpaid final toll violation that is included in the referral.
- (3) A final notice of possible referral to the CCU shall advise the person that payment of the outstanding unpaid final toll violations due to the Authority by the payment due date may avoid referral.
- (4) A final notice of possible referral to the CCU shall advise the person of the additional fees that may be imposed by the CCU.

.09 Fees.

- A. General Provisions. The Authority shall enforce this chapter in accordance with law and may charge fees related to the collection of unpaid tolls.
 - B. Fees established by the Authority are as follows.
- (1) Civil Penalty. The civil penalty included in a citation for a toll violation is \$50.
- (2) E-ZPass Account Maintenance Fee. The monthly E-ZPass account maintenance fee shall be set in accordance with Chapter .05 of this subtitle and will apply to applicable E-ZPass accounts.
- (3) Insufficient Funds Fee. An additional fee shall be assessed on all checks returned for insufficient funds and the person shall submit the tolls, any civil penalties due, the returned check fee, and may be subject to subsequent fees by another method of payment, as specified by the Authority.
- (4) Transponder. Any person opening an E-ZPass account must purchase a new or previously owned Maryland transponder in accordance with Regulation .03 of this chapter. Prices of transponders vary by make and model and may be found on the E-ZPass application.

13A.02.02 Emergency Plans

Authority: Education Article, §§2-205, and 8-702, Annotated Code of Maryland; Federal Statutory Reference: 20 U.S.C. 7114

Notice of Proposed Action

[13-205-P-I]

The Maryland State Board of Education proposes to amend Regulation .02, adopt new Regulation .03, and amend and recodify existing Regulations .03 and .04 to be Regulations .04 and .05 under COMAR 13A.02.02 Emergency Plans. This action was considered at the Maryland State Board of Education meeting on May 21, 2013.

Statement of Purpose

The purpose of this action is to: (1) require that emergency plans for local school systems and schools must align with Maryland State Department of Education Emergency Planning Guidelines for Local School Systems and Schools (April 2013); (2) add clarity and ease of reference; and (3) expand the types of emergency drills required to be practiced by local school systems and schools.

Comparison to Federal Standards

There is a corresponding federal standard to this proposed action, but the proposed action is not more restrictive or stringent.

Estimate of Economic Impact

The proposed action has no economic impact.

Economic Impact on Small Businesses

The proposed action has minimal or no economic impact on small businesses.

Impact on Individuals with Disabilities

The proposed action has no impact on individuals with disabilities.

- (2) "School emergency plan" means a plan for each public school grounds within the local school system that addresses mitigation, prevention, preparation, response, and recovery to an emergency including responding to:
 - (a)—(b) (text unchanged)
- (3) "Central administration emergency plan" means a plan for each local school system and the SEED School that addresses mitigation, prevention, preparation, response, and recovery to an emergency including responding to:
- (a) Violent or traumatic events on school grounds during regular school hours or during school-sponsored activities; or
- (b) Events in the community that affect normal school functioning.
 - [(3)](4)—[(4)](5) (text unchanged)
- (6) "Public school grounds" means local school system owned or leased buildings, the SEED School, and the land that surrounds the school building.
- (7) "SEED School" means the residential boarding education program operated under the supervision of the Department.

.03 Incorporation by Reference.

The Maryland State Department of Education Emergency Planning Guidelines for Local School Systems and Schools (April 2013) is incorporated by reference.

[.03] .04 Emergency Plan.

A. In consultation with other health and safety officials in the local community, each local school system [school] and the SEED School shall develop an emergency plan for [each] all public school grounds

- to include maintenance, transportation, and central administration office under its jurisdiction that:
- (1) Deals with the contingencies of man-made, technological, and natural hazards; [and]
 - (2) Conforms to the requirements of this chapter;[.] and
- (3) Aligns with the Maryland State Department of Education Emergency Planning Guidelines for Local School Systems and Schools (April 2013).
- [B. Each public school emergency plan shall be on file in each public school system.]
- B. Each local school system and the SEED School shall ensure that:

- C. Each local school system and the SEED School shall develop and implement an annual schedule of drills for each school grounds within the system. In addition to fire drills, the following drills shall be conducted annually:
 - (1) Evacuation;
 - (2) Shelter in place;
 - (3) Reverse evacuation;
 - (4) Lock down;
 - (5) Drop, cover, and hold; and
 - (6) Severe weather.

[.04] .05 Annual Certification.

[Each local superintendent of schools shall certify annually in writing to the State Superintendent of Schools that the requirements of this chapter are being implemented.]

- A. By September 30 of each year, each local superintendent of schools and the Head of the SEED School shall certify to the State Superintendent that the requirements of this chapter are being implemented.
- B. By September 30 of each year, each local superintendent of schools and the Head of the SEED School shall send a copy of the local school system's central administration emergency plan to the State Superintendent of Schools, if updated from the previous year.

Under the Civil Marriage Protection Act same sex couples may now legally marry in Maryland, thus obviating the need to provide coverage for same sex domestic partners.

The Secretary of the Environment proposes to:

- (1) Amend Regulations .02 and .03 under COMAR 26.09.01 General Administrative Provisions;
- (2) Amend Regulations .02, .03, .05, .07, and .11 under COMAR 26.09.02 Applicability, Determining Compliance, and Allowance Distribution;
- (3) Amend Regulations .01, .02, .04, .05, and .09 under COMAR 26.09.03 Offset Projects; and
- (4) Adopt new Regulation .06 and recodify existing Regulations .06 .13 to be Regulations .07 .14 under COMAR 26.09.04 Auctions.

Statement of Purpose

The purpose of this action is to amend regulations under Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR) 26.09, Maryland CO₂ Budget Trading Program, with program improvements developed in conjunction with other participating states during the 2012 Comprehensive Region Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) Program Review. This proposed action includes the following revisions:

- 1. A reduction in the Maryland CO₂ emissions budget;
- 2. Adjustments to the emissions budget through 2020 to offset the large private bank of allowances to ensure a binding cap;
- 3. Adoption of a new mechanism, the Cost Containment Reserve (CCR), to reduce price volatility in the allowance market;
 - 4. The addition of an interim compliance period;
- 5. The addition of new "minimum reserve price" and "long term contract price" definitions;
- 6. Replacement of the existing afforestation offset protocol with a new, more inclusive, forest offset protocol;
 - 7. Revisions to other definitions.

The Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative

The Healthy Air Act was signed into law on April 6, 2006 and required Maryland to join the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) by July 2007. Maryland joined RGGI when Governor Martin O'Malley signed RGGI's multi-state Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) on April 20, 2007. The Department subsequently adopted COMAR 26.09.01 to .03, implementing the "Maryland CO₂ Budget Trading Program", which became effective on July 17, 2008. COMAR 26.09.04 ("Auctions") became effective as a permanent regulation on August 25, 2008.

RGGI is comprised of nine states in the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic regions. These states adopted market-based carbon dioxide (CO₂) cap and trade programs designed to reduce emissions of CO₂, a greenhouse gas, from fossil fuel-fired electricity generators with a nameplate capacity of 25 megawatts or greater. RGGI currently is comprised of Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, Rhode Island, Vermont, and Maryland. New Jersey discontinued participation after the end of the first compliance period, 2009-2011. Participating RGGI states require electricity generators to have acquired, through regional auction or secondary market transactions, one CO2 allowance for every ton of CO2 emitted over a 3-year compliance period. Auction proceeds fund a number of state programs, including energy efficiency programs that result in lower CO₂ emissions through reduced electricity demand. Further, auction proceeds fund renewable energy projects which reduce the amount of CO₂ emissions generated by fossil-fuels electricity generators.

The RGGI program has several unique features unlike other cap and trade programs in the U.S. The allowances are controlled by the states and can be allocated or sold to sources. Most states have opted to auction the allowances to sources through quarterly auctions. Proceeds from the auctions are used to fund energy efficiency programs to reduce demand for electricity and provide a means to lower CO₂ emissions. The states conducted the first quarterly regional auction in September 2008, and the program officially began in January 2009.

RGGI set a cap of 188,076,976 tons of CO_2 emissions for the region, based on average 2000 to 2002 CO2 emissions from electricity generators subject to the program. Maryland receives 37,503,983 CO_2 allowances each year through 2013. Maryland will receive 20,360,944 CO_2 allowances in 2014. Between 2015 and 2020, Maryland will annually receive 2 ½ percent fewer CO_2 allowances, as the RGGI cap reduces by 10 percent during that time. Maryland has set aside 7,388,491 allowances in 4 different set aside accounts to account for special needs or programs.

RGGI has completed its first control period, 2009-2011. The regional auctions have generated almost a billion dollars in revenue for the states. These funds were used to provide funding for energy efficiency and renewable energy programs, rebates to ratepayers, bill payment for low income ratepayers and general fund relief.

The 2012 Comprehensive Program Review Process

Each participating state's CO₂ Budget Trading Program is based on the 2008 RGGI Model Rule, which was developed to provide guidance to states as they implemented the RGGI program. RGGI participating states have completed a 2012 Program Review, which consisted of a comprehensive evaluation of program successes, program impacts, the potential for additional reductions, emissions leakage, and offsets.

Amendments to the Model Rule were developed by the RGGI state staff as part of the Program Review. This effort was supported by an extensive regional stakeholder process that engaged the regulated community, environmental non-profit and other organizations with technical expertise in the design of cap-and-trade programs.

Carbon dioxide emissions in the RGGI region have declined substantially. One factor contributing to the decrease in regional emissions has been a shift in use of natural gas over coal and oil for fuel at electricity generators due to a significant decrease in the price of natural gas. Another factor is an economic downturn that began in late 2008. As electric generating companies acquired CO₂ allowances equal to their emissions, some CO₂ allowances offered at the regional auctions were not sold. Maryland regulations allow these allowances to be offered for sale at a subsequent auction or to be retired. With demand for allowances through the auction smaller than the amount of allowances offered, the participating states held the unsold allowances until the end of the first compliance period. This allowed the states to determine whether demand exists for the allowances or whether retirement would provide the best environmental benefit. The states determined that the unsold allowances should be retired and retired 102,631,137 allowances. Maryland retired 19,794,971 unsold allowances.

Maryland Set Asides

Maryland retains four set aside accounts for special purposes. The four set aside accounts are: 1) the Limited Industrial Exemption Set Aside; 2) the Long Term Contract Set Aside; 3) the Clean Generation Set Aside; and the 4) Voluntary Renewable Set Aside. The Limited Industrial Exemption Set Aside allows the Department to retire allowances equal to the emissions of industrial sources that generate their own electricity but have been exempted from RGGI because they do not sell electricity to the grid. The Long Term Contract Set Aside allows sources with long term contracts prescribing what those sources may charge for electricity to obtain a set amount of allowances at the auction reserve price. The Clean Generation Set Aside provides allowances to new, clean fossil-fuel electric generation sources as an incentive. The incentive lasts for 6 years. The Voluntary Renewable Set Aside allows the Department to retire allowances proportional to renewable energy credits purchased voluntarily to be retired on behalf of RGGI.

In addition to some of the allowances going unsold at auction, many of the CO_2 allowances allocated to Maryland's set-aside accounts were not utilized. The Department previously reviewed the need and usage of the set asides. The Department determined the set asides served useful purposes but recognized usage could be sporadic. The process for populating the set aside accounts was revised to retain unused set aside allowances in the accounts and only add new allowances to replenish the accounts to their regulatory limit. In this manner, more current year allowances would go directly

to auction. Although some of these allowances may go unsold, this process allows a greater percentage of Maryland's allowances to enter the marketplace earlier.

Amendments to COMAR 26.09:

1. Reduction in the Maryland CO₂ Emissions Budget

The Regional Emissions Cap in 2014 will be equal to 91 million tons. The original 2.5% per year reduction to the regional RGGI cap for the years 2015 through 2020 is maintained. This change reflects the substantial drop in $\rm CO_2$ emissions since 2006 and serves to preserve these reductions. The Maryland $\rm CO_2$ emissions budgets for 2014-2020 are similarly reduced.

2. Adjustments to the Emissions Budget through 2020 to Offset the Large Private Bank of Allowances

The private bank of allowances is addressed through the following two distinct budget adjustments:

- The First Control Period Interim Adjustment for Banked Allowances (first adjustment), adjusts the budget for 100 percent of the first control period private bank of allowances (vintages 2009, 2010, & 2011) held by market participants as of the end of the first control period, that are in addition to the total quantity of first control period emissions. The first adjustment timing and algorithm is described in the regulations and is made over the 7 year period 2014-2020.
- The Second Control Period Interim Adjustment for Banked Allowances (second adjustment), adjusts the budget for 100 percent of the 2012 and 2013 vintage allowances held by market participants as of the end of 2013, that are in addition to the total quantity of 2012 and 2013 emissions. The Second Control Period adjustment timing and algorithm is described in the regulations and will be determined for the 6 year period from 2015 through 2020 based on the actual size of the 2012 and 2013 vintage private bank at the beginning of 2014. This change helps to ensure a binding cap, given the opportunity for sources to accumulate surplus low cost allowances while states implement the regulatory changes needed to establish the lower cap.
- 3. Adoption of a new mechanism, the Cost Containment Reserve (CCR), to Reduce Price Volatility in the Allowance Market

The Cost Containment Reserve

These amendments create a cost containment reserve (CCR) and specify how it will be used in order to provide flexibility and cost containment for the program. The CCR would consist of a fixed quantity of allowances, in addition to the cap, that would be held in reserve, and only made available for sale if allowance prices were to exceed predefined price levels.

- The regulations prescribe an annual CCR withdrawal limit of MD's portion of the total RGGI 5 million allowances in 2014, and an annual CCR withdrawal limit of MD's portion of the total RGGI 10 million allowances thereafter. The CCR would initially be populated in 2014, and in subsequent years would be replenished only as needed to maintain the withdrawal limit.
 - Allowances from the CCR would be fully fungible.
- The CCR allowances would be made available immediately in any auction in which demand for allowances at prices above the CCR trigger price exceeds the supply of allowances offered for sale in that auction.
- If the CCR is triggered, the CCR allowances will only be sold at or above the CCR trigger price.
- CCR Trigger Prices: \$4 in 2014, \$6 in 2015, \$8 in 2016, and \$10 in 2017. Each year after 2017, the CCR trigger price will increase by 2.5%.

Offset Trigger Mechanisms

The regulations delete the existing offset price triggers that raise the allowable percentage of offsets and that allow the use of international CO₂ emission credit retirements. The allowable offset percentage would remain at 3.3%, and only those offset credits that

satisfy all regulatory requirements for a specific project category (including any new categories added) may be used for compliance. These changes are consistent with the decision to add a CCR mechanism and address the need for cost control in a much more transparent and predictable way. These changes help to reduce price volatility through increasing supply when prices are rising quickly.

4. The addition of an Interim Compliance Period

The regulations create interim control periods that include the following components:

- The addition of new defined terms, including:
- "Interim Control Period," defined as each of the first 2 calendar years of each 3-year control period.
- "Excess Interim Emissions," defined as any emissions (above 50%) over the amount of allowances held at the end of each Interim Control Period.
- A new general requirement for sources to hold allowances to cover 50% of emissions for each Interim Control Period, subject to the existing true-up process and a March 1 deadline.
- The final compliance true-up at the end of the 3-year control period will continue to require sources to hold allowances to cover 100% of the emissions for the 3 years.
- The allowances already deducted to meet each of the two annual Interim Control Period obligations will be subtracted from the 3-year compliance true-up obligation.
- Each ton of Excess Interim Emissions will be considered a violation, subject to the ordinary existing enforcement provisions of the relevant agency on an annual basis.
- The deletion of existing offset triggers and regulatory terms related to the potential to extend the control period to 4 years. This change simplifies the program and ensures that sources are maintaining their compliance obligations.
- 5. The Addition of New "minimum reserve price" and "long term contract price" Definitions

Reserve Price

The regulations simplify the reserve price calculation. The reserve price is set at \$2.00 in 2014 and increases by 2.5 percent each year thereafter. Use of the Consumer Price Index to adjust the reserve price is eliminated, as well as the definition of "current market reserve price". The "long term contract price" is defined in the same manner as the "minimum reserve price".

6. Replacement of the Existing Afforestation Offset Protocol with a New, More Inclusive, Forest Offset Protocol

Forestry Offset

The regulations contain language that substitutes a new offset category known as "Sequestration of carbon due to reforestation, improved forest management or avoided conversion" that States may adopt in lieu of the existing Afforestation category.

A RGGI U.S. Forests Offset Protocol has been developed, based mainly on the California Air Resources Board (CARB) U.S. Forests Offset Protocol, to include:

- Improved Forest Management;
- Avoided Conversion; and
- Reforestation (which would replace the existing RGGI Afforestation category type).

Wherever possible, the Model Rule intentionally maintains consistency with the CARB protocol to leverage work done by CARB and the Climate Action Reserve (CAR).

One difference between the RGGI and CARB protocols is the approach to addressing reversals and ensuring permanence of offset projects. The RGGI protocol uses a discounting approach, instead of the buffer account approach used by CARB. Forestry projects that have generated credits in a voluntary offset program would be permitted to transfer to the RGGI program, assuming that they meet all other RGGI requirements and there is no double-counting. The general additionality requirements for existing RGGI offset

categories have not changed. This protocol provides a better option for offsets in Maryland.

Estimate of Economic Impact

I. Summary of Economic Impact. The lowering of the regional CO₂ cap to 91 million will result in positive economic benefits to the Maryland economy. The money raised from the auction of allowances will be reinvested in the Maryland economy to provide more jobs and reduce energy usage. Maryland revenues from the regional CO₂ allowance auction are deposited in the Strategic Energy Investment Fund (SEIF). The Maryland Energy Administration (MEA) administers the fund, allocating the proceeds to various purposes as directed by statute. Many agencies benefit from these proceeds, including MEA. The proceeds fund various energy efficiency, renewable energy and climate change programs, as well as low income bill payment and other low income energy assistance programs. The power sector and commercial and industrial industries will experience some additional costs as a result of the lowered cap. However, residents and the renewable energy and construction sector will benefit.

III. Assumptions. (Identified by Impact Letter and Number from Section II.)

- A. Department revenues are expected to increase as a result of higher allowance prices even though the number of CO_2 allowances Maryland will sell as a result of the lower CO_2 allowance budget will decrease.
- B. SEIF revenues are projected to increase as a result of higher allowance prices even though Maryland's CO_2 allowance budget decreases. MEA is responsible for the administration of Maryland's portion of the RGGI auction proceeds. The projected revenue is based on economic modeling of future allowance prices and the quantity of allowances available each year from 2014-2020. Increased energy efficiency and renewable energy spending resulting from the lowered CO_2 cap is projected to result in a net positive gain of jobs within Maryland, which may increase the tax revenues to the State government
- C. A number of programs funded through SEIF are specific to local governments, including several revolving loan programs and energy efficiency programs. As the fund increases more revenues can be allocated these programs.
- D(1). The power sector will be responsible for buying the allowances necessary to comply with the regulation. This will increase their operating costs. \$415.4 million is the difference between projected allowance expenditures with the 165 million ton regional cap and the new cap of 91 million tons. Additionally, there may be technology changes or improvements implemented by the generators to reduce emissions. These potential additional costs are not quantified at this time.
- D(2). The construction industry will benefit from the increased spending on energy efficiency improvements to homes, businesses and government buildings.
- D(3). Renewable energy can be purchased for credits by the energy producers subject to the RGGI regulations. As such there will be increased demand for, and increased spending on, renewable energies. Furthermore, 2.34% of the RGGI auction proceeds are reinvested in clean and renewable energy.
- E(1). Analysis provided by RGGI, Inc. projects the average yearly commercial energy bill will increase by \$27 dollars.

- E(2). Analysis provided by RGGI, Inc. projects the average yearly industrial energy bill will increase by \$154 dollars.
- F(1). Analysis provided by RGGI, Inc. projects the average yearly residential energy bill for Maryland households will decrease by \$15 dollars
- F(2). Analysis provided by RGGI, Inc. projects a net gain of employment as a result of the lower cap. This will create additional jobs within Maryland.
- F(3). There are several health benefits that will result from lowering GHG emissions in Maryland. Improved air quality will result in lower health risks to the Maryland population. A report by the Interagency Working Group on the Social Cost of Carbon, United States Government, 2010, finds that the social cost of 1 ton of carbon dioxide ranges from \$5 to \$55. As a result of the lower regional CO_2 cap, emissions in Maryland are expected to decrease by roughly 50 million tons through 2020.

Economic Impact on Small Businesses

The proposed action has minimal or no economic impact on small businesses.

Impact on Individuals with Disabilities

The proposed action has an impact on individuals with disabilities as follows:

These regulations may have a positive impact on individuals with disabilities, especially those with limited mobility, by providing low cost opportunities to weatherize their homes. Reduced energy costs allow individuals with disabilities to remain at home during extreme weather conditions. Extreme temperatures often exacerbate numerous respiratory and cardiovascular diseases.

The Department shall provide for the award of CO₂ offset allowances to project sponsors of CO₂ emissions offset projects [or CO₂ emissions credit retirements] that have demonstrated a reduction or avoidance of atmospheric loading of CO₂, CO₂ equivalent, or sequestered carbon. These requirements ensure that the awarded CO₂ offset allowances represent real, additional, verifiable, enforceable, and permanent CO₂ equivalent emission reductions or carbon sequestration. Subject to the relevant compliance deduction limitations identified in COMAR [26.09.02.03E] 26.09.02.03I, CO₂ offset allowances may be used by any CO₂ budget source for compliance purposes.

.02 General Requirements for CO₂ Emission Offset Projects.

- A. Eligible CO_2 Emissions Offset Projects. In order to qualify for the award of CO_2 offset allowances, the following offset projects shall satisfy all applicable requirements identified in this chapter [and initially commence on or after December 20, 2005]:

Offset projects that [sequester carbon through the conversion of land from a nonforested to a forested condition] involve reforestation, improved forest management, or avoided conversion shall qualify for the award of CO₂ allowances if they meet the requirements of this regulation and the forest offset protocol.
- B. Eligibility. Eligible forest offset projects shall satisfy all eligibility requirements of the forest offset protocol and this regulation.

- [(1) Eligible offset projects shall occur on land that has been in a nonforested or partially forested state for at least 10 years preceding the commencement of the offset project.
 - (2) Eligible offset projects shall be:
- (a) Managed in accordance with widely accepted environmentally sustainable forestry practices; and
- (b) Designed to promote the restoration of native forests by using mainly native species and avoiding the introduction of invasive nonnative species.
- (3) If commercial timber harvest activities are to occur, certification shall be obtained before any harvest activities at the site through the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC), Sustainable Forestry Institute (SFI), American Tree Farm System (ATFS), or other similar organizations approved by the Department.]
- C. Offset Project Description. [The project sponsor shall provide a detailed narrative of the offset project actions to be taken, including documentation that the offset project meets the eligibility requirements of §B of this regulation and the following information:] The offset project sponsor shall provide a detailed narrative of the offset project actions taken, including documentation that the offset project meets the eligibility requirements of this regulation. The offset project description must include all information identified in sections 8.1 and 9.1 of the forest offset protocol, and any other information deemed necessary by the Department.
 - [(1) Owner of the land within the offset project boundary;
- (2) Detailed map of the land within the offset project boundary and areas adjacent to the offset project boundary;
- (3) A copy of the permanent conservation easement or other documentation of permanent protection;
- (4) For offset projects located in a state or United States jurisdiction that is not a participating state, a written statement from the cooperating regulatory agency confirming the enforceability of the permanent conservation easement or other permanent protection agreement; and
- (5) Plant species to be planted or established via natural regeneration and a forest management plan.]
- D. Carbon Sequestration Baseline Determination. *Baseline onsite* carbon stocks shall be determined as required in sections 6.1.1, 6.1.2, 6.2.1, 6.2.2, 6.2.3, 6.3.1, and 6.3.2 of the forest offset protocol, as applicable.
- [(1) The existing sequestered carbon within the offset project boundary shall be calculated before commencement of the offset project. The carbon sequestration baseline shall be determined based on a sum of measurements of the carbon content of the carbon pools described in this section, made not more than 12 months before offset project commencement.
- (2) The carbon content shall be calculated for live above-ground tree biomass, live below-ground tree biomass, soil carbon, dead organic matter, and coarse woody debris, unless the baseline measurement for this carbon pool is at or near zero, in which case measurement of this carbon pool during the allocation period is optional.
- (3) The carbon content may be calculated for live above-ground nontree biomass and dead organic matter forest floor.
- (4) The carbon content shall be calculated individually for each carbon pool within the offset project boundary.
- (5) To increase the accuracy of measurement and verification, the area within the offset project boundary shall be divided into sub-populations that form relatively homogenous units. When defining sub-populations, the project sponsor shall consider:
- (a) Vegetation and tree species, including existing vegetation and trees and those to be utilized as part of the offset project activity; and
- (b) Site factors, including soil type, elevation, slope, age class, and other factors as warranted.

(6) Calculation of sequestered carbon for each carbon pool in each reporting sub-population shall be based on the following:

 CO_2 tons = [(A X C/ha)(44/12)] / 0.9072 where:

- (a) A = Area in hectares within each reporting sub-population;
- (b) C = Carbon content (metric tons of carbon for each carbon pool); and
- (c) C/ha = Mean carbon content per hectare for each carbon pool.
- (7) Total carbon contained within the offset project boundary shall be calculated as follows:

$$TC_{pb} = TC_{latb} + TC_{lbtb} + TC_{s} [+ TC_{lantb} + TC_{doff} + TC_{docwd}]$$
 where:

- (a) TC_{pb} = Total carbon content within the offset project boundary (sum of carbon content of all carbon pools in all reporting sub-populations);
- (b) $TC_{latb} = Sum$ of carbon content of live above-ground tree biomass in all reporting sub-populations;
- (c) TC_{lbtb} = Sum of carbon content of live below-ground tree biomass in all reporting sub-populations;
- (d) TC_s = Sum of carbon content of soil carbon in all reporting sub-populations;
- (e) TC_{lantb} [option] = Sum of carbon content of live above-ground non-tree biomass in all reporting sub-populations;
- (f) TC_{doff} [option] = Sum of carbon content of dead organic matter, forest floor in all reporting sub-populations; and
- (g) TC_{docwd} = Sum of carbon content of dead organic matter, coarse woody debris in all reporting sub-populations.
- (8) Each individual carbon pool to be measured shall be directly measured using a measurement protocol and sample size that achieves a demonstrated quantified accuracy for the combined carbon pool measurement such that there is 95 percent confidence that the resulting reported value is within 10 percent of the true mean. Measurement and sampling practices shall meet the following requirements:
- (a) An adequate sample size that meets the requirements; and
- (b) The minimum number of required sampling plots for each sub-population shall be determined based on the following:

 $n = (s X 1.960)/(mean X re)^2$

where:

- (i) n = Required number of sample plots for each reporting sub-population;
 - (ii) s = Standard deviation;
- $\mbox{(iii) mean} = \mbox{Mean reported carbon content for the sample population; and} \label{eq:mean}$
- (iv) re = Level of sampling error (0.08) to assure a total maximum error of 10 percent for the 95 percent confidence interval, which assumes total error due to measurement error of 0.02.
- (9) Direct measurement procedures shall be consistent with current forestry good practice and the guidance contained in U.S. Department of Energy, Office of Policy and International Affairs, Technical Guidelines, Voluntary Reporting of Greenhouse Gases (1605(b)) Program, "Section 3, Measurement Protocols for Forest Carbon Sequestration," in Chapter 1 (Emissions Inventories) Part I Appendix (Forestry).]
- E. Calculating Carbon Sequestered. Net GHG reductions and GHG removal enhancements shall be calculated as required by section 6 of the forest offset protocol. The project's risk reversal rating shall be calculated as required by Appendix D of the forest offset protocol.
- [(1) Carbon sequestration shall be determined using a base year approach, where the amount of carbon sequestered is measured as a net increase in carbon relative to the base year measurement.

- (2) Carbon sequestration shall be the amount of net additional carbon sequestered during each reporting period, based upon aggregate carbon uptake and carbon emissions for the sum of carbon pools, relative to the baseline carbon content or the carbon content as of the previous reporting period, if above the baseline carbon content, as applicable.
- (3) CO₂ offset allowances shall be issued based on the amount of net additional carbon sequestered within the offset project boundary during each reporting period, as represented in tons of CO₂.
 - (4) Stock-Change Approach.
- (a) Sequestered carbon shall be calculated using a stock-change approach as follows:

 $NCS_t = I_t - I_{t-1}$

where:

- (i) $NCS_t = Net$ carbon sequestered in reporting period t;
- (ii) I_t = Inventory of carbon stock for all carbon pools in all reporting sub-populations within the offset project boundary in reporting period t; and
- (iii) I_{t-1} = Inventory of carbon stock for all carbon pools in all reporting sub-populations within the offset project boundary in the reporting period immediately preceding reporting period t.
- (b) Each of the carbon pools that were measured as part of the baseline determination shall be remeasured using the same methodology and to the same or better quantified precision as that used for the baseline determination.
- (c) The net change in each carbon pool's carbon stock in each reporting sub-population is calculated by subtracting the baseline carbon stock, or carbon stock at the previous monitoring, if above the baseline carbon content, from the carbon stock at the time of the current monitoring.
- (d) Net carbon stock change for the offset project is the sum of the net changes in the carbon stock of all applicable pools in all reporting sub-populations within the offset project boundary, less 10 percent to account for potential losses of sequestered carbon. This 10 percent discount may not be required if the project sponsor retains long-term insurance, approved by the Department, that guarantees replacement of any lost sequestered carbon for which ${\rm CO}_2$ offset allowances were awarded.]
- F. Monitoring and Verification Requirements. [Total carbon stock within the offset project boundary shall be calculated not less than every 5 years. Monitoring and verification are as follows:] Monitoring and verification is subject to the following requirements:
- (1) [Monitoring and verification reports shall include data from direct measurement of carbon content for all plots used to determine baseline and reporting period carbon content] Monitoring and verification reports shall include all forest offset project data reports submitted to the Department, including any additional data required by section 9.2.2 of the forest offset protocol; [and]
- (2) [The consistency application shall include a monitoring and verification plan certified by the Department or an independent accredited verifier, including:] The consistency application shall include a monitoring and verification plan certified by an independent verifier accredited pursuant to Regulation .08 of this chapter, which shall consist of a forest carbon inventory program, as required by section 8.1 of the forest offset protocol; and
- [(a) Direct carbon measurement procedures, the designation of sub-populations, and the determination of the minimum number of sampling plots; and
- (b) If commercial timber harvest activities have occurred or will occur, an assessment of management practices to ensure that the offset project has been or will be managed in accordance with environmentally sustainable forestry practices consistent with the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC), Sustainable Forestry Institute (SFI), American Tree Farm System (ATFS), or other similar organizations approved by the Department.]

- (3) Monitoring and verification reports shall be submitted not less than every 6 years, except that the first monitoring and verification report for reforestation projects must be submitted within 12 years of project commencement.
- G. Forest Offset Project Data Reports. A project sponsor shall submit a forest offset Project data report to the Department for each reporting period that shall meet the following:
- (1) Each forest offset project data report must cover a single reporting period;
 - (2) Reporting periods must be contiguous; and
- (3) There must be no gaps in reporting once the first reporting period has commenced.
- H. Prior to the award of CO_2 offset allowances pursuant to Regulation .09 of this chapter, or to any surrender of allowances pursuant to §I of this regulation, any quantity expressed in metric tons, or metric tons of CO_2 equivalent, shall be converted to tons using the conversion factor specified in COMAR 26.09.01.02B(93).
- [G.] *I.* Carbon Sequestration Permanence. The offset project shall meet the following requirements to address [permanence] *reversals* of sequestered carbon:
- (1) [The project sponsor shall place the land within the offset project boundary under a legally binding permanent conservation easement, approved by the Department, that requires the land to be maintained in a forested state in perpetuity;] *Unintentional reversals.* Requirements for unintentional reversals are as follows:
- (a) The project sponsor must notify the Department of the reversal and provide an explanation for the nature of the unintentional reversal within 30 calendar days of its discovery; and
- (b) The project sponsor must submit to the Department a verified estimate of current carbon stocks within the offset project boundary within 1 year of the discovery of the unintentional reversal.
- (2) [The conservation easement shall include a requirement that the carbon density within the offset project boundary be maintained at long-term levels at or above that achieved as of the end of the CO₂ offset crediting period; and] *Intentional Reversals. Requirements for intentional reversals are as follows:*
- (a) If an intentional reversal occurs, the project sponsor shall, within 30 calendar days of the intentional reversal:
- (i) Provide notice, in writing, to the Department of the intentional reversal; and
- (ii) Provide a written description and explanation of the intentional reversal to the Department.
- (b) Within 1 year of the occurrence of an intentional reversal, the project sponsor shall submit to the Department a verified estimate of current carbon stocks within the offset project boundary.
- (c) If an intentional reversal occurs, and CO_2 offset allowances have been awarded to the offset project, within 6 months following notification by the Department, the forest owner must surrender to the Department for retirement, the number of CO_2 allowances corresponding to the quantity of CO_2 equivalent tons reversed.
- (i) Notification by the Department will occur after the verified estimate of carbon stocks has been submitted to the Department, or after 1 year has elapsed since the occurrence of the reversal if the project sponsor fails to submit the verified estimate of carbon stocks; and
- (ii) If the forest owner does not surrender valid CO_2 allowances to the Department within 6 months following notification by the Department, the forest owner will be subject to an enforcement action and each CO_2 equivalent ton of carbon sequestration reversed will constitute a separate violation of this regulation and applicable State law.

- (d) Project Termination. Requirements for project termination are as follows:
- (i) Within 6 months of project termination, the project sponsor shall surrender to the Department or its agent for retirement, a quantity of CO_2 allowances in the amount calculated pursuant to project termination provisions in the forest offset protocol; and
- (ii) If the project sponsor fails to surrender to the Department a quantity of CO₂ Allowances in the amount calculated pursuant to project termination provisions in the forest offset protocol within 6 months following project termination, the project sponsor shall be subject to enforcement action and each CO₂ offset allowance not surrendered will constitute a separate violation of this regulation and applicable State law.
- (3) [The conservation easement shall require that the land be managed in accordance with environmentally sustainable forestry practices] Disposition of Forest Sequestration Projects After a Reversal. If a reversal lowers the forest offset project's actual standing live carbon stocks below its project baseline standing live carbon stocks, the forest offset project will be terminated by the Department.
- J. Timing of Forest Offset Projects. The Department may award CO_2 offset allowances under Regulation .09 of this chapter only for forest offset projects that are initially commenced on or after January 1. 2014.
- K. Projects that Have Been Awarded Credits Under a Voluntary Greenhouse Gas Reduction Program.
- (1) For projects that have been awarded credits under a voluntary greenhouse gas reduction program, the number of CO_2 Offset Allowances will be calculated pursuant to the requirements of this regulation, without regard to the number of credits that were awarded to the project under the voluntary program.
- (2) The provisions of Regulation .02C(6) and F(2)(b) may not apply to forest projects that have been awarded credits under a voluntary greenhouse gas reduction program provided that the following conditions are satisfied:
- (a) The project satisfies all other general requirements of this chapter, including all specific requirements of this regulation, for all reporting periods for which the project has been awarded credits under a voluntary greenhouse gas program and also intends to be awarded CO_2 offset allowances pursuant to Regulation .09 of this chapter;
- (b) At the time of submittal of the consistency application for the project, the project sponsor submits forest offset data reports and a monitoring and verification report meeting all requirements of §§F and G of this regulation that covers all reporting periods for which the project has been awarded credits under a voluntary greenhouse gas program and also seeks an award of CO_2 offset allowances pursuant to Regulation .09 of this chapter; and
- (c) The voluntary greenhouse gas program has published information on its website to allow the Department to verify the information included in the consistency application, and the consistency application includes information sufficient to allow the Department to make the following determinations:
- (i) The offset project has met all legal and contractual requirements to allow it to terminate its relationship with the voluntary greenhouse gas program, and such termination has been completed; and
- (ii) The project sponsor or voluntary greenhouse gas program has cancelled or retired all credits that were awarded for carbon sequestration that occurred during the time periods for which the project intends to be awarded CO_2 offset allowances pursuant to Regulation .09 of this chapter, and such credits were cancelled or required for the sole purpose of allowing the project to be awarded CO_2 offset allowances pursuant to Regulation .09 of this chapter.

.09 Awarding and Recording of CO2 Offset Allowances.

A. (text unchanged)

[B. CO₂ Emissions Credit Retirement. If a project sponsor received a consistency determination, one CO₂ offset allowance shall be awarded for each ton of reduction of CO₂ or CO₂e or sequestration of CO₂, represented by the relevant credits or allowances retired.]

26.09.04 Auctions

Authority: Environment Article, §§1-101, 1-404, 2-103, and 2-1002(g), Annotated Code of Maryland

.06 Auction of CO₂ Allowances.

A. The following rules shall apply to each allowance auction. The Department may specify additional information in the auction notice for each auction. Such additional information may include the time and location of the auction, auction rules, registration deadlines, and any additional information deemed necessary or useful.

B. General Requirements.

- (1) The Department shall include the following information in the auction notice for each auction:
- (a) The number of CO₂ allowances offered for sale at the auction, not including any CO₂ CCR allowances;
- (b) The number of CO_2 CCR allowances that will be offered for sale at the auction if the condition of $\S B(2)(a)$ of this regulation is met:
 - (c) The minimum reserve price for the auction; and
 - (d) The CCR trigger price for the auction.
- (2) The Department or its agent shall follow these rules for the sale of CO₂ CCR allowances:
- (a) CO_2 CCR allowances shall only be sold at an auction in which total demand for allowances, above the CCR trigger price, exceeds the number of CO_2 allowances available for purchase at the auction, not including any CO_2 CCR allowances;
- (b) If the condition of $\S B(2)(a)$ of this regulation is met at an auction, then the number of CO_2 CCR allowances offered for sale by the Department at the auction shall be equal to the number of CO_2 CCR allowances in the Consumer Energy Efficiency Account at the time of the auction;
- (c) After all of the CO_2 CCR allowances in the Consumer Energy Efficiency Account have been sold in a given calendar year, no additional CO_2 CCR allowances will be offered for sale at any auction for the remainder of that calendar year, even if the condition of \$B(2)(a) of this regulation is met at an auction;
- (d) At an auction in which CO_2 CCR allowances are sold, the reserve price for the auction shall be the CCR trigger price; and
- (e) If the condition of \$B(2)(a) of this regulation is not satisfied, no CO_2 CCR allowances shall be offered for sale at the auction, and the reserve price for the auction shall be equal to the minimum reserve prices.
- (3) The Department shall implement the reserve price in the following manner:
- (a) No allowances shall be sold at any auction for a price below the reserve price for that auction; and
- (b) If the total demand for allowances at an auction is less than or equal to the total number of allowances made available for sale in that auction, then the auction clearing price for the auction shall be the reserve price.

Please consult the law or Firearms Bulletin 94-1, which is available from the Maryland State Police Licensing Division, for more information on assault pistols and Senate Bill 619's prohibition on certain detachable magazines with a capacity of more than 20 rounds of ammunition.

It is unlawful to manufacture for distribution or sale or to sell or offer for sale in Maryland any handgun manufactured after January 1, 1985 that is not officially on the Handgun Roster, except for the manufacture of prototype models required for design, development, testing, and approval by the Board. Neither the State of Maryland nor any agency, officer, or employee of the State assumes any liability for injuries caused by any handgun on the Handgun Roster.
