Celebrate Rockville During Hometown Holidays More than 40 Bands and Entertainers to Highlight City Festival

The 24th annual Hometown Holidays festival is shaping up to be the best destination in the region for Memorial Day weekend.

The celebration will feature a free concert by Easton Corbin, a rising country performer known for "Roll With It" and "I Can't Love You Back."

Each year more than 60,000 people descend on Rockville's downtown to celebrate the unofficial kickoff to summer.

The Hometown Holidays festival takes place Saturday, May 26, to Monday, May 28, and features two days of music, entertainment, food and crafts, and one

day dedicated to the City's annual Memorial Day Ceremony and Parade.

Saturday and Sunday, 1 to 10 p.m. festival-goers will enjoy more than 40 bands and entertainers on

The total proposed operating budget of \$107 million is a decrease of 0.2 percent from last year's budget. The General Fund budget – the fund that supports the largest portion of the operating budget - is \$65 million, a de-

May is Bike Month in Rockville

Get Out on Two Wheels in the City FREE Rockville celebrates National Bike Month in May. You can participate in Bike Month by cycling to work or just taking a stroll on Rockville's pedestrian-and bike-friendly roads. Join other cyclists for one of these upcoming

2012 events: Sunday Fun Rides: Now until September, Sundays at 1:30 p.m. Meet at Welsh Park (Mannakee and Martins Lane/Nelson) and join the Rockville Bicycle Advisory Committee (RBAC) for a 45-minute bike ride. Rain at the start cancels the ride; wet pavement does not.

Tuesday Night Rides: Now until September, Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m. Meet at King Farm Homestead Park, 1199 Grand Champion Road, for an hour-long neighborhood ride. Routes are on paved, shared-use paths, some sidewalk and short sections of quiet streets. Suitable for families; riders younger than 12 are welcome, if accompanied by parent. We ride at the pace of the slowest rider; no one gets left behind. Rain at the start cancels the ride; wet pavement does not.

Fifth Annual Ride of Silence: Wednesday, May 16,7 p.m. Starts at Rockville Memorial Library in Town Center. Join the fifth annual ride as cyclists worldwide honor those who have been injured and killed while cycling on public roadways. This will be a police-escorted ride with no fees or sponsors. Bring your helmet for a slow-paced, 10mile ride throughout the city.

The City of Rockville continues to take initiative to make sure the City's roads are safe for cyclists, pedestrians, and motorists alike. The City has utilized Accessible Pedestrian Signals (APS) and traffic calming devices to ensure bikers and pedestrians are out of harm's way.

Rockville City Police have been partnering with the community to ensure the rules of the road are followed. The recent launch of their "Rockville Reflects" campaign calls for pedestrians to wear a reflective band while walking at night or early morning hours to make sure they are noticed by drivers.





Working Pedestrians together to keep each other safe on the roads

Pedestrian Safety Tips

- Always cross the street at a signalized intersection or at a marked crosswalk
- Dress to be seen. Brightly-colored clothes and reflective material at night make it easier for drivers to see you.
- Always walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk and you have to walk in the road, always walk facing traffic, so you can see oncoming cars.
- Do not assume drivers see you. Make eye contact.
- Stop at the curb or the edge of the road.

Bicycle Safety Tips

- Always ride with traffic on the road. Use the right lane and obey traffic signals and stop signs.
- If you ride on the sidewalk, do so in a safe and courteous manner.
- Make your intentions clear to motorists and other road users.

- Slow down and obey the posted speed limit.
- Be careful when passing stopped vehicles.
- Allow 3 feet of clearance when passing bicyclists.

Street Repaving Planned Affected Residents will be Notified

The City of Rockville will be repaving more than 80 street segments in the coming months as part of ongoing efforts to maintain and improve the community's infrastructure. The projects should be complete by the end of October.

The streets affected are located near the Rockville Civic Center Park, in New Mark Commons, near industrial areas south of Gude Drive, and in other neighborhoods throughout the city. To see a complete list of streets to be repaved this summer, visit www.rockvillemd.gov/ residents/repaving.

Residents who live on or near roads that will be repaved will receive

a neighborhood advisory in the mail from the City prior to the work.

Roads may be closed for five to 10 minutes at a time during the paving while crews shift equipment. Signs will be placed on major roads to notify drivers of potential traffic impacts and closures when necessary. Temporary no parking signs will also be posted along affected streets.

The City repaves each street on average every 12 years in order to improve drivability and preserve the integrity of the road.

City Makes GIS Data Available to the Public

For businesses and citizens who work with GIS (Geographic Information System) applications, there's a new reason to check out the City's website. The City has recently added GIS data downloads to the website for use by the public.

A wide range of data is available, including bicycle routes, parks, planning areas, property, streets and sidewalks and zoning districts and overlays.


Some GIS data will still not be made public for reasons including where the data is regarded as sensitive or where the original source of the data is such that the City does not have the authority to distribute it further.

The use and mapping of

GIS data has become more commonplace as the technology has become more accessible to the general public. Concurrently, the movement towards open government and e-government has seen data sharing become a recent trend. Making data readily available on the City's website is not only a convenience and a value to the general public but also represents a measure of efficiency for City staff.

Watermain Flushing Program to Begin



A systematic citywide flushing program to remove accumulated fine sediment from the City water system takes place every spring. The City is divided into 33 districts, but not all districts undergo the flushing operation every year.

Flushing will take place from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Some parking restrictions may occur to allow for access to water valves. Should this need arise, signs will be posted 48 hours in advance.

As flushing takes place, some temporary discoloration of water may occur. Refrain from laundering clothes during periods of discoloration, usually two or three hours. Following the flushing, run cold water for a few minutes to clear any discoloration in the water.

Community Input Needed for Horizon Hill Stormwater Improvement Plans

Residents and community members are invited to attend an informational meeting and design discussion about potential changes to the Horizon Hill park and stormwater management plans. The meeting has not been scheduled, but is expected in mid-June.

The project will restore and protect the stream valley, enhance water quality and stormwater management, repair and prevent erosion, and protect park amenities.

The redesign and modification of the park and stormwater management system is part of the City's **Capital Improvements** Program (CIP).

Construction is expected to begin in Spring 2013.

The City's consultant has prepared a conceptual plan that outlines the anticipated changes to the stormwater management facility. These changes include the conversion of the upper and lower dry ponds to wet ponds which will have permanent, year-round water surfaces. Additional changes include the widening and

stabilization of portions of the stream connecting the middle and lower ponds.

East Rockville Art Installed

Rockville's History on Display in New Work

Featuring local heroes, Pint Isreal and William Gibbs, a new statue designed by renowned Los Angeles sculptor Wayne Healy will now welcome visitors to the historic East Rockville neighborhood.

It stands at the corner of Park Road and South Stonestreet Avenue as a welcome to East Rockville. After a nationwide search and approval by the Cultural Arts Commission and the Mayor and Council, the \$30,000 project was installed in early April.

Wayne Healy used to be an engineer, but now creates murals and sculptures in his native Los Angeles, he describes the 12-foot tall structure as origami made of steel.

With a steel blossom dome and colored tiles, the artwork stands out from the main road near the metro but, Healy says the most important part of the project was that all the inspiration came from the residents.

The artwork includes images of Lincoln Park, Pint Isreal and William Gibbs along with a map of the area.



College Gardens Park Stormwater Project Nationally Recognized

Rockville's College Gardens Park Stormwater project was recently honored by the U.S. **Environmental Protection** Agency (EPA) and the American Public Works Association (APWA).

Shawn Garvin, Region 8 EPA administrator, toured the park with members of the Mayor and Council and City staff in April while the APWA named the project as a 2012 Public Works Project

of the Year. The revamped park successfully blends attractive amenities and functional stormwater management.

The stormwater project included the evaluation, redesign and reconstruction of the College Gardens park and pond, and 500 feet of stream restoration below the pond. The pond was expanded to better capture runoff within the Watts Branch watershed, is spanned by a new bridge and circled by a walking path and benches, and features extensive landscaping, a fountain and two overlook decks. The park includes a

new picnic shelter, basketball courts and bathrooms.

The project grew out of a 2001 Watts Branch watershed study. College Gardens Park serves as the focal point for the neighborhood. A cooperative effort



by City staff, consultants and residents helped forge consensus on the right course for the aging park.
