Mayor's Message by Dennis J. Scheessele

It is legislative time in Maryland and the 2013 Session of the Maryland Legislature started January 9, 2013 and is well underway. As in past years, thousands of bills have been submitted to the Legislature for consideration and more will come. Some are favorable to municipalities and others have adverse impacts on cities and towns and their citizens. Again this year, municipalities' priorities are to restore state shared revenues for Highway User Revenues (HURs) and State Aid for Police Protection. This year there is substantial progress, the Governor's FY14 budget bill includes restoration of municipal HURs to 50% of full funding compared to 15% of full funding for FY13. The Governor's FY14 budget bill also restores full funding for State Aid for Police Protection.

I am serving on the Maryland Municipal League (MML) Legislative Committee again this year. The Legislative Committee is comprised of municipal officials from across the State and works with MML staff to evaluate bills submitted to the Maryland Senate and House of Delegates to identify those that are helpful to municipalities and to develop positions to support the adoption of favorable bills. Conversely, we also identify those that have adverse impacts on municipalities and develop strategies to oppose them.

The Legislative Committee also reviews legislative proposals from municipalities to choose the top legislative priorities for cities and towns across Maryland. This year we chose three priorities, first to restore state shared Highway User Revenues (HURs) with municipalities, second to fully restore State Aid for Police Protection to municipalities, and third to enact legislation to permit municipalities to post legal notices on their websites rather than purchase expensive legal ads in newspapers.

Cities and Towns use HURs (gas taxes) to fund repairs and reconstruction to your roads and sidewalks. HURs are also used to overlay the roads when the pavement wears out, becomes cracked and flaky. In FY 2008, the state allocated the Town of Indian Head approximately \$220,000, which was able to fund snow plowing and salt spreading on the roads in the winter and the required annual overlay paving of rotating areas of roads to keep our overall road system in good repair. In the last four years, our HUR allocations have been repeatedly reduced: FY 2009: \$173,180, FY 2010: \$34,840, FY 2011: \$11,000, FY 2012: \$25,670, and FY13: \$17,000. Next year (FY14), our HUR allocation is projected to be \$100,000. As you can see, substantial progress is being made toward full restoration of HURs. The HUR (gas tax) was originally established to fund road construction

and repair and for decades was dedicated to that purpose. For the last five years, the state has repeatedly diverted these funds to the General Fund for other purposes to the detriment of our roads. Our town streets are continuing to deteriorate while the state diverts HUR to other purposes. This year there are several legislative proposals being made to prohibit the Governor and/or Legislature from diverting HURs from road repairs and construction to other unrelated purposes. These proposals are being nicknamed "Lockbox" legislation because they are intended to prevent ("Lock") HURs from being used for anything other than streets and sidewalks. Cities and Towns will vigorously support these bills.

Cities and Towns use State Aid for Police Protection to provide police protection in our communities. Similar to the reduction in Highway User Revenues, the state has been cutting the State Aid for Police Protection by 35% for the last 4 or 5 years and diverting the funds to other unrelated purposes. State Aid for Police Protection is funded by the fines levied through traffic tickets, police citations for other violations, and court levied fines for traffic and other violations. Traffic tickets and police citations are issued largely by local police officers (more so than State Police) in the course of their daily activities to protect the safety of the people who live and work in our communities. Court fines are only levied after a police citation has

been issued and the issuing officer has gone to court to testify to the circumstances surrounding the issuance of the traffic tickets and citations for other violations. So, as you can see, the state revenue, in this case, is derived from the work of local police officers. Yet, the state has repeatedly diverted State Aid for Police Protection (SAPP) funds. If SAPP funding isn't restored, the loss will eventually necessitate a tax increase or a reduction in police protection, resulting in an erosion of safety in our communities. Fortunately the Governor's FY14 budget bill fully restores State Aid for Police Protection.

The third legislative priority involves adjusting methods of providing services to reflect changes in the way people access information. People more often use their computers, tablets, or cell phones to get information today than read newspapers for it. So it seems to make sense to post legal notices electronically on municipal websites rather than purchase expensive legal ads in newspapers. For those people who don't have computers, tablets, or cell phones to access electronic media, alternatives will be provided.

The Mayor, Council and staff of the Town of Indian Head are working to provide you with a full program of services effectively and efficiently.

Spring into Fire Safety: Chief Jeff Williams

As spring approaches and we get ready to say goodbye to Ole Man Winter our thoughts turn to warmer temperatures and cleaning up from the long winter. In an effort to help keep your “Spring Cleaning” project a fire safe time for all, the Indian Head Volunteer Fire Department would like to remind everyone of the following safety tips.

Inside your home:

- Smoke alarms increase your chances of surviving a home fire by 50% so be sure to check these devices for proper operation and be sure to clean them by vacuuming them as part of your cleaning.
- Never borrow smoke alarm batteries for other devices such as toys, clocks or other equipment, many times people forget to replace the batteries leaving the devices inoperable.
- Check the age of the smoke alarms, they should be replaced every ten years according to the manufacturers of the devices.
- When you change your clocks, you should also take the time to clean and change the batteries in your smoke detectors.
- If you have a fire extinguisher in your home this is a good time to check it and replace if necessary. If you have an ABC Dry Powder extinguisher it needs to be replaced every 12 years.
- This is a good time to check all electrical equipment and appliances for damaged or frayed cords and replace them if necessary.
- Be sure to check your electrical outlets to ensure that they’re not overloaded or damaged.
- Remove lint buildup from your dryer vents.
- Clean your oven and stove making sure you get all the grease

Outside Your Home:

- Be sure to remove all outdoor debris and dead vegetation away from home to help reduce the potential of a fire starting in your yard and extending to your home.
- **As a reminder, there is no outdoor burning permitted within in the Town limits.**
- Be sure your address number is in good condition and visible for all Emergency Services to see in the event of an emergency and if needed replace the numbers with new ones.
- All fuels for lawn and garden equipment should be stored in an approved container and never stored in your home or attached garage.
- Barbeque gas grills (including gas hoses) and propane tanks should be inspected prior to use.
- As Part of our Spring Cleaning, now is the time that many of us get rid of may of the old and/or unwanted household chemicals. As a reminder these chemicals should be sorted in their original containers and property disposed of at the Charles County landfill at no cost to you.

Here are a few examples of these types of products:

- Pesticides, fertilizers and weed killers
- Pool chemicals
- Paint and thinners
- Gasoline or other flammable/combustible liquids
- **NEVER** dispose of these types of products in the trash as they could leaks causing a chemical reaction and possibly start a fire.

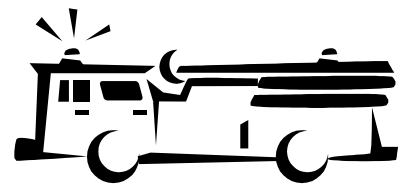
Review and practice your Family Escape Plan:

In lieu of the tragic nightclub fire in Brazil that claimed the lives of 243 people, the department would like to remind everyone of the importance of developing and practicing a Family Escape Plan. This vital part of your home safety plan could make the difference when seconds count.

- Check all doors and windows to ensure they work properly and open in case they are needed to be used as an exit.
- Establish a family meeting place for your family to meet once outside.
- Ensure your family members know more than one way out of your home as this could make the difference as well.

By following these simple safety tips you can greatly improve your family’s safety and reduce your chances of a fire in your home during this annual event.

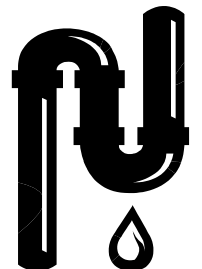

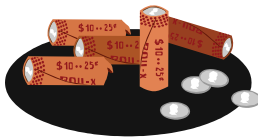

Town of Indian Head Useful Information

Holiday Closings

Town Hall, Public Works and the Community Affairs Office will be closed on the following days this quarter in observance of the holidays listed:

If you have a water or sewer emergency after hours, call 301-743-2222 to report your emergency. On-call Town personnel will be contacted and the problem will be handled accordingly.

After hours non-emergency type problems can be reported by leaving a message on the Town Hall office number 301-743-5511. Be prepared to furnish your name, address, phone number and brief, but detailed description of the type of problem. Water cut-offs for non-payment are not considered emergencies and are only handled during Public Works regular business hours.

Town Codes

- **Burning**—No burning is allowed within the Town limits.
- **Animal Control**—Dogs must be kept on the owner's property unless properly restrained. The Charles County Animal Control provides animal enforcement within the Town. Call 301-932-1713 if you have a problem.
- **Abandoned or Inoperative Vehicles** are prohibited within the Town and may not be kept on the street for more than 24 hours or on private property, with certain exceptions. Call Code Enforcement at 301-743-5511 ext. 101 with any questions.
- **Property Maintenance**—Every dwelling and lot shall be kept free from trash and garbage. Weeds and grass must be cut and kept shorter than 10 inches.
- **Building Code**—The Town has an adopted building code. Any new construction or remodeling, including, but not limited to porches, fences, sheds and garages, requires inspection and a building permit from the Town.

Share the Road

Please be aware of bicyclists and share the road.

Recycling/Yard Waste

Solid waste products such as glass jars and bottles, newspapers, plastic bottles and metal cans will be picked up at the curb every Wednesday within the Town of Indian Head. Place these items in your recycling bin - no need to separate them. Have them curbside by 7:00am.

Yard waste will be collected on Wednesdays, year-round, weather permitting. Grass clippings and leaves must be placed in brown paper bags or in a trash container marked "Yard Waste" and placed at curbside. Brush must be bundled and must not be any longer than four feet (4') in length. Individual pieces of brush must not be any larger than six inches (6") in diameter.

Bulk trash can now be scheduled year-round on Wednesdays. Fee of \$50 (cash or money order **ONLY**) per scheduled pick-up must be paid in advance at time of scheduling at Town Hall. All items must be curbside by 7:00am on the prescheduled pick-up day but not earlier than 48 hours prior to pick-up day.

Utility Rates

The Town bills for utilities on a quarterly basis. Please make note that you will be receiving a bill four times a year (July, October, January and April). **You are encouraged to make an estimated payment monthly toward your quarterly bill.** For more information you can call Town Hall at 301-743-5511
