LETTER FROM THE MAYOR



Dear Residents:

Thank you for the vote of confidence in re-electing me to the Office of Mayor of the City of Westminster. Council Member Chiavacci was also re-elected and Council Member Suzanne Albert will be returning to the Council. We will continue to serve the residents of the City, provide a solid financial foundation and revitalize downtown.

The following budget actions have been approved by the Common Council:

- A one-cent reduction in the General Fund Property Tax from .57 cents to .56 cents. This commitment to reduce the tax increase as capital improvement projects were completed was made by the Mayor and Council when the increase was adopted in 2009.
- No increase in water or sewer rates.
- Place the one-time highway user revenue in the Capital Project Reserve account to use for emergency or one-time only projects since there is no commitment for continuing this revenue source beyond this year.
- Included a 3% cost of living increase for our employees who have exhibited their commitment and dedication to our residents during the recession and who have not received an increase in five years.
- Added two emergency projects to the Priority One projects funded by the tax increase: replacement of the furnaces in the Police Department and partial replacement of the Skateboard Park. The other priority capital projects include vehicle and equipment replacement, street overlay and sidewalk replacement projects, repairs to City Hall and the Longwell Armory and replacement of the SAN network.
- The budget is available for your review on our web site www.westminstermd.gov.

Arbor Day April 25, 2013

Every year the City celebrates Arbor Day. The beauty of our trees is obvious. Our "collection" of Heritage Trees is impressive by any measure. This year we celebrated Arbor Day with two special events.

The official ceremony was our 1st celebration. This year's ceremony was held with the students and faculty of East Middle. With members of the Westminster Tree Commission also in attendance we held the traditional Arbor Day Memorial Tree Planting – Mayor Utz presented the 2013 Arbor Day Proclamation and then the East Middle team provided the memorial dedication. Student representatives then proceeded with the tree planting. Typically the event takes no longer than 30 – 45 minutes.

Our sincere thanks to some 30 students from East Middle, members of the Jobe Mikalauskas Stream Club and the Westminster Tree Commission.

Restoring our many stream buffers will be a major effort of our community for the next several years. Our stream restoration projects are part of the 'Save The Bay' efforts and are part of the City's Watershed Improvement Program.

GRASSCYCLING

If you are bagging lawn clippings, you are wasting a valuable resource. Clippings contain valuable nutrients that provide organic matter to the soil. Leaving grass clippings on the lawn reduces the need for commercial fertilizer. This is called "grasscycling." Grasscycling saves you money and time, improves the appearance of your lawn and does not cause thatch. Simply follow these steps:

- ♦ Set sharp mower blade to keep grass 2 1/2 –3" high
- ♦ Mow as needed and when grass is dry
- Avoid over fertilizing your lawn; this encourages overgrowth that contributes to thatch
- Water only during extended dry spells; one inch of water every five to seven days is best

COMPOSTING

Composting is the natural process of decomposition of organic materials into a humus rich soil known as compost. For details on how to compost, visit www.recyclecarroll.org and click on the "Smart Choices" link.

Yard trimmings are banned from being deposited in the landfill cell or transferred to other disposal facilities. Acceptable yard trimmings can be delivered to the designated site at the County's landfills at no charge in Kraft (paper) bags, plastic bags are prohibited at the yard trim area as they damage the equipment.

Yard trimmings are collected every Wednesday from City residents in bushel-sized containers or paper bags ONLY.

Westminster Approves Residential Rental Housing License Program

On January 28, 2013, the Mayor and Common Council of Westminster approved Ordinance No. 839 that creates a Rental Housing License Program in the City of Westminster ("City"). A dwelling, dwelling unit or portion thereof, including a rooming/boarding house, is considered to be a rental unit by the Rental Housing License Program if it is occupied by any person other than the property owner in exchange for any compensation or monetary remuneration.

The City's Rental Housing License Program becomes effective June 1, 2013. Property owners who rent residential rental properties in Westminster must apply for and obtain a license from the City for each residential unit before it can be rented.

- The annual license fee is \$20 per unit and licenses are valid for one year only.
- The annual license period for the first year of the program runs from June 1, 2013 to May 31, 2014.
- The normal timely filing period for applications is 30 days. Ordinance No. 839 contains language that extends the timely filing period from 30 to 60 days for the first year of the program. If the City receives a completed application with the required fees by July 31, 2013, the annual licensing fee would be \$20 per unit. However, applications filed after that date would include an increased license fee for each unit based on the lateness of the filing. Notwithstanding the effective date of the program, property owners may submit Rental Housing License Applications and pay the required fees prior to June 1, 2013 if they so desire.

The Rental Licensing Program includes a "complaint driven" inspection process. You may file a complaint in by telephone at 410-848-9000; mail or in person at the City offices located at 56 W. Main Street in downtown Westminster; or email through the City's website at www.westminstermd.gov under Online Services - Client Services Request. Upon receipt of a complaint, the City will investigate the complaint after seeking permission from the tenant or property owner to enter the rental unit. If a violation is found, the Code Enforcement Inspector will provide the property owner with a notice of violation and a timeframe to correct the violation. If the issue is resolved, the matter is closed. If not, then the Code Enforcement Inspector will issue a citation and request a court date. The City may also revoke and/or deny the license, abate the violation and bill the property owner and reserves the option to seek a court injunction to gain compliance.

Ordinance No. 839 includes a "Habitual Offender" provision. A "Habitual Offender" is a person owning a residential rental unit, who has paid a fine or has been found guilty of violating provisions of the City's Property Maintenance Code on three (3) separate occasions within a 12 month period. If an owner of a residential dwelling unit becomes a "Habitual Offender", all fines levied by the City would be tripled and the annual rental license fee for a rental dwelling unit that is the subject of the "Habitual Offender" designation would be \$500 per unit.

During the month of February 2013, the City mailed information and a Rental Housing License Application to over 600 property owners of record that may be potentially affected by this new program. Additionally, a fillable PDF version of the Rental Housing License Application may be found on the City's webpage by clicking on "Online Services" and going to "Forms and Applications." Then go to the category "Rental Licensing Program" and click on the form "Rental Housing Licensing Application." There is also a form titled "Rental Housing License Application Continuation Sheet" if a property owner that has four (4) or more rental units at the same address.

Please also note that based on a case (McDaniel vs. Baranowski) that was decided by the Maryland Court of Appeals in 2010, a landlords in jurisdictions with rental licensing programs that may only evict a tenant if the rental unit is property licensed prior to the eviction action. A landlord "must affirmatively plead and demonstrate that he is licensed at the time of the filing of the complaint for summary ejectment in order to initiate the summary ejectment process". Based on the adoption of Ordinance No.839, this case will affect residential rental properties in Westminster effective June 1, 2013.

City staff held four public information meetings at Westminster City Hall, located at 1838 Emerald Hill Lane, so property owners and others could have the opportunity to ask questions and obtain information. They were scheduled for Tuesday, March 12th at 7:00 pm; Thursday, March 14th at 9:30 am; Monday, March 18th at 7:00 pm; and Wednesday, March 20th at 2:00 pm. These sessions were scheduled at different times on different days to maximize the potential for participation.

Gallery: Images of the Civil War


The exhibit will be on view in the Tevis Gallery from June 13 through August 16, 2013.

The Civil War conjures up strong sentiments on politics, slavery, women and children, uniforms, portraits and much more. What's changed? What remains? How does this War's legacy impact us today?

"We are anxious to see this story told through the eyes of artists," says Visual Arts Coordinator, Susan Williamson. "So many programs and activities strive to educate people about the Civil War in a factual manner with accuracy and authenticity, and rightly so. However, this exhibit will be an opportunity to express how America's bloodiest conflict affects today's society on an emotional and spiritual level. We hope to see some powerful works dealing with racial differences, the concept of neighbor against neighbor, the commercialization of Gettysburg, the trauma over the number of lives lost and the heroic actions of so many during the Civil War. Without a doubt, we hope this will be more than an exhibit featuring photographs of weathered battlefield monuments. We hope to inspire thought, reflection and conversation."
