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Governor O'Malley Applauds Agreement Supporting Maryland's Racing Industry

December 14th, 2012

ANNAPOLIS, MD - Governor Martin O'Malley today thanked the Maryland Jockey Club (MJC), the Maryland Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association (MTHA), the Maryland Horse Breeders Association (MHBA), and the Maryland Racing Commission for their work to reach a 10-year agreement for sustained racing at Pimlico Race Course and Laurel Park.

"Today is a great day for Maryland's racing industry. When my office helped broker a deal in 2010 that would temporarily sustain the industry, I was confident that all the parties would continue to work hard to reach an agreement that would preserve Maryland's racing heritage and industry," said Governor O'Malley. "I applaud the incredible work of all the parties in reaching a deal that retains racing industry jobs and preserves the future of racing in Maryland for years to come."

The 2013 racing season will feature 146 days of live racing days at the major Maryland tracks, the same number as in 2010, 2011 and 2012. The Maryland Jockey Club will guarantee a minimum of 100 days a year for the balance of the agreement. There are provisions in the contract for the horsemen to race additional days through a revenue-sharing program.

The deal also calls for Pimlico and Laurel Park to remain open for year-round racing, training and stabling for the balance of the contract. Maryland Jockey Club president Tom Chuckas indicated Pimlico and Laurel would maintain a minimum of 1,900 stalls.

"I am very pleased with the agreement," said Stronach Group chairman Frank Stronach, who owns Pimlico and Laurel. "This shows our commitment to Maryland racing and the long-term future of the industry. It is our vision to encourage people to invest in Maryland racing."

"We created a plan that benefits everyone and develops a sustainable model for the future," said Tom Chuckas, president of the Maryland Jockey Club. "I would like to thank Governor Martin O'Malley for his continued support of the industry. We appreciate his involvement two years ago which set-up the framework for this deal. We appreciate Maryland Racing Commissioners John McDaniel and Bruce Quade for their commitment as well as the leadership from the MTHA and MBHA for working with us to make this happen."

"This is an historic moment for the Maryland racing community and the dawn of a new era," said MTHA General Counsel Alan Foreman. "The years of uncertainty and strife are over. The racing industry owes a debt of gratitude to Tom Chuckas, Mike Rogers, Richard Hoffberger, Dale Capuano, Wayne Wright, Tom Bowman, Bruce Quade and John McDaniel for their dedication and hard work over the past 11 months to bring this to fruition. Most importantly, I want to thank Frank Stronach for his commitment to the future of Maryland racing and his willingness to work with us to find constructive solutions to our complicated issues. Since he assumed ownership of the Maryland tracks, Frank has sought a business model that would allow him to profit here while preserving and enhancing Maryland's historic racing industry. In partnership with him, we can now achieve that goal."

"It was an honor to be involved in this historic accomplishment," said MHBA president Tom Bowman. "A special acknowledgement needs to be given to the Maryland Racing Commission for providing both the impetus and guidance to see this process completed. Hats off to everyone involved."

"For our loyal horsemen and the thousands of workers throughout the state who have supported Maryland racing during the difficult past decade, we will now have long-term stability, year-round racing and stabling, an attractive purse structure, promise for the breeding industry and a strong foundation to restore Maryland racing to its pre-eminence in North American racing," added Foreman. "For those who left Maryland for greener pastures, I think you will find that Maryland will soon become the centerpiece of racing in the Mid-Atlantic."

Chuckas said the deal "allows the Maryland Jockey Club to invest in capital improvements at both facilities and we plan on submitting a plan to the Maryland Racing Commission and Maryland Department of Budget and Management in February."

The parties will ask the Maryland Racing Commission to approve the 2013 racing dates at their monthly meeting on Tuesday, December 18th. The meeting begins at 12:30 PM in Laurel Park's Ruffian room.

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

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Governor Martin O'Malley Appoints Dominick Murray Secretary of Economic Development

December 19th, 2012

Secretary Christian S. Johansson leaving public service to join private sector education organization

ANNAPOLIS, MD – Governor Martin O'Malley today announced Dominick Murray as Maryland's Secretary of Business & Economic Development (DBED), following the decision by current Secretary Christian S. Johansson to leave public service to join Maryland-based Laureate Education to head a new group focused on university partnerships in the U.S. Succeeding Murray as Deputy Secretary will be Robert Walker, who previously served as the Department's Chief Operating Officer and Assistant Secretary for Business and Enterprise Development, as well as Maryland's Secretary of Agriculture. The changes will be effective mid-January.

"We are fortunate to have someone with Dominick's knowledge and extensive background in economic development take the helm at DBED. Maryland is recovering jobs at the 7th fastest rate in the nation and we have great confidence that Dominick will continue that progress," said Governor O'Malley. "I want to thank Christian for his work in creating an economic development strategy centered on creating jobs not just for today, but creating jobs for generations to come. Under Christian's leadership, we put in place a number of key programs to put Maryland at the forefront of entrepreneurship and innovation, including the largest venture capital program in State history – *Invest*Maryland. I could not have asked for a more engaged or visionary person to help me move Maryland's economy forward and I wish him well in his new endeavors."

Murray has served as DBED's Deputy Secretary since 2007, and has been an integral part of Governor O'Malley's business development and job growth team for more than 10 years, leading Baltimore City's economic development efforts during the Governor's tenure as Mayor of Baltimore. In that role, Murray streamlined the City's development and permitting processes, facilitated inter-agency communication on development issues and acted as a business community ombudsman for the Mayor's office.

His advocacy for Maryland's businesses continued during his tenure at DBED, where he has led the agency's regional development team and offered critical assistance to Maryland's local economic development offices and businesses. Murray also designed and implemented DBED's participation in the Governor's Delivery Unit, which works with agencies to help them align state and federal resources around 15 strategic and visionary goals the Governor has outlined to improve the quality of life in Maryland. He has served on critical technology and business development boards, including the Greater Baltimore Committee's Technology Council, the Maryland Aviation Administration board, the Marcellus Shale Advisory Commission and the Governor's Workforce Investment board.

A Michigan native who earned a BA from the University of Detroit, Murray also brings to the position

significant private sector experience and perspective, after working in sales and marketing and senior management at large corporations like Chrysler, Westinghouse, GE Capital and CBS Radio, as well as in small companies like O/E Mid-Atlantic, G1440 and ARIS Corp. His public service also includes serving on the boards of the Johns Hopkins Diabetes Center and the UMBC Cooperative Education Office.

Johansson, who joined DBED at the height of the economic downturn in 2009, developed a number of successful initiatives to spur the State's innovation economy, connect small businesses with credit and build on core industries like life sciences and cyber security.

Among many accomplishments, Johansson worked with the Governor's office to develop InvestMaryland, which has \$84 million raised through an online tax credit auction to invest in the State's early stage companies. While other states have similar programs, InvestMaryland is unique in that if investments are successful, 100 percent of the principal and 80 percent of the profits are returned to the State's general fund. To date, nearly \$2 million has been deployed through the program since making its first investment in September. Earlier this year, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce cited/nvest/Maryland and other programs focused on innovation as the key reason they ranked Maryland #1 in Entrepreneurship and Innovation. Johansson was also instrumental in helping to pass the Maryland Innovation Initiative, which is a first-ever partnership between the State and five qualifying universities to advance cutting-edge research to the commercial marketplace and foster collaboration between the universities and federal laboratories.

To address the credit crunch, Johansson worked with the Governor's office and federal partners to craft the State Small Business Credit Initiative, part of the Small Business Jobs Act of 2010. Under the program, Maryland and 33 other states and U.S. territories received federal funds to provide statebacked loan guarantees to small businesses that were unable to access traditional bank financing. To date, the program has helped create 887 jobs and leverage more than \$74 million in private sector loans and investments.

In addition, he also advocated for streamlining regulations for Maryland businesses through the State's Maryland Made Easy program; worked to bring businesses to the table through the creation and revitalization of a number of boards and commissions, including the Maryland Economic Development Commission and the Maryland Advisory Commission on Manufacturing Competitiveness; and he oversaw two successful economic development missions to China, South Korea, Vietnam and India, which netted a total of \$145 million in trade and investment deals for the State.

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Governor O'Malley Signs Executive Order Helping State Prepare for Climate Change and Extreme Weather

December 28th, 2012

ANNAPOLIS, MD – Governor Martin O'Malley has signed a landmark initiative to increase the State's long term resiliency to storm related flooding and sea level rise. He signed the Climate Change and Coast Smart Construction Executive Order, directing that all new and reconstructed state structures, as well as other infrastructure improvements, be planned and constructed to avoid or minimize future flood damage.

"As storms such as Hurricane Sandy have shown, it is vital that we commit our resources and expertise to create a ready and resilient Maryland, by taking the necessary steps to adapt to the rising sea and unpredictable weather," said Governor O'Malley. "In studying and planning for storms and climate change, we can ensure that our land, infrastructure, and most importantly our citizens are safe and prepared."

The Executive Order enacts a number of policy directives, including directing all State agencies to consider the risk of coastal flooding and sea level rise when they design capital budget projects and charging the Department of General Services with updating its architecture and engineering guidelines to require new and rebuilt State structures to be elevated two or more feet above the 100-year base flood level.

"Over the past three decades, Maryland's climate has become hotter and water levels within the Chesapeake Bay have continued to rise," said Zoe Johnson, DNR's Program Manager for Climate Change Policy. "The region's recent extreme storms and weather have demonstrated just how vulnerable our natural resources and infrastructure can be to such events. The Executive Order will be instrumental in reshaping how we build along Maryland's coasts."

The Executive Order also charges the Maryland Department of Natural Resources to work with the Maryland Commission on Climate Change, local governments and other parties as appropriate, to develop additional Coast Smart guidelines within nine months, for the siting and construction of new and rebuilt State structures, as well as other infrastructure improvements such as roads, bridges, sewer and water systems, and other essential public utilities. Recommendations for applying the new construction guidelines to non-state infrastructure projects that are partially or fully funded in the State's capital budget will also be developed.

Additionally, the Executive Order tasks the Scientific and Technical Working Group of the Maryland Commission on Climate Change with providing updated sea level rise projections for Maryland. In 2008, the Scientific and Technical Working Group published sea level rise projections for Maryland, with a high end range of 3.4 feet by the year 2100. However, considerable new research on sea level rise has since been published requiring the updating of these projections, according to Dr. Donald Boesch, President of University of Maryland Center for Environmental Science, and chair of the Working Group.

For example, a study by the U.S. Geological Survey published this summer in the

journal Nature Climate Change demonstrated that the 1,000 kilometer stretch of coast running from Cape Hatteras to north of Boston is a "hot spot" of sea level rise. The study found that since 1990, sea levels along this stretch, which includes Maryland, are rising at an annual rate three to four times faster than the global average. Dr. Boesch pointed out "the State should be using the most up-to-date sea level rise projections in order to ensure that state infrastructure is sited and designed in a manner that will avoid or minimize future loss or damages." Revised sea level rise projections are to be issued by end of June 2013.

To assist local governments, DNR's CoastSmart Communities Program will continue to provide on-the-ground sea level rise planning expertise, training, and technical mapping tools. Launched by Governor O'Malley in April 2009, Maryland's CoastSmart Communities program has awarded more than a half-million dollars to coastal communities to help prepare for the anticipated impacts of climate change. In partnership with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the State provides grants ranging from \$10,000 to \$75,000 to coastal communities to support the planning and preparation. ANNAPOLIS, MD — Governor Martin O'Malley today announced the appointment of Douglas R. M. Nazarian to serve on the Court of Special Appeals for the 2nd Appellate Circuit. To the Circuit Court for Baltimore City, Governor O'Malley appointed Philip Senan Jackson, Judge Christopher Louis Panos, Melissa Marie Phinn, and Julie Rebecca Rubin. To the District Court for Baltimore County, Governor O'Malley appointed Michael Thurston Pate and Kimberly Michelle Thomas. Additionally, to the District Court for Carroll County, Governor O'Malley selected Brian David Green. These appointees bring a diverse array of legal experiences to their new jobs. They also represent the ethnic and gender diversity of Maryland.

Over the last several months, Governor O'Malley has conducted numerous interviews with candidates recommended to him by the appellate courts nominating commission and the trial court judicial nominating commissions. All of the judges selected to serve in Maryland's judiciary were recommended to him by the commissions.

For the Court of Special Appeals, Governor O'Malley appointed Douglas R. M. Nazarian, who presently serves as Chairman of the Maryland Public Service Commission, a position he has held since 2008. "As leader of the Public Service Commission, Chairman Nazarian has demonstrated his ability to handle complex issues in a fair and thorough way," said Governor O'Malley. "I am confident that he has the intellect and organizational skills necessary to meet the needs of the Court of Special Appeals and to render well-reasoned decisions."

Prior to his appointment as Chairman of the Public Service Commission, Mr. Nazarian served the Commission as its general counsel. Before entering public service, Mr. Nazarian was a partner in the Litigation Practice Group of Hogan & Hartson, LLC (now known as Hogan Lovells USA LLP). He also taught for several years as an adjunct professor at the University of Maryland Francis King Carey School of Law. Since 2004, Mr. Nazarian has served as Dean of the CollegeBound Foundation, a program in Baltimore City public schools that is designed to assist students in their transition from high school to college to work.

Mr. Nazarian has impeccable academic credentials. He graduated cum laude from Yale College in 1988 and received his law degree from Duke University School of Law in 1991, where he also graduated with honors. Following law school, Mr. Nazarian clerked for the Honorable James B. Loken on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit. Mr. Nazarian currently resides in Baltimore County. He fills a vacancy created by the retirement of the Honorable James R. Eyler, who served on the 2nd Appellate Circuit of the Court of Special

Appeals (which is comprised of Baltimore and Harford Counties) for 16 years.

In the Circuit Court for Baltimore City, Governor O'Malley has appointed four individuals to serve as trial court judges.

Philip Senan Jackson has served for the past 19 years as an assistant United States attorney for the District of Maryland. At various times, he served as deputy chief of the Narcotics Division, the attorney coordinator for the Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force, and the international matters coordinator. Prior to joining the U.S. Attorney's Office, Mr. Jackson spent seven years as an assistant state's attorney for Baltimore County. He graduated from the University of Baltimore School of Law in 1984 and from the University of Maryland at College Park in 1979.

Governor O'Malley elevated Judge Christopher Louis Panos to the Circuit Court after six years of service on the District Court for Baltimore City. On the District Court, Judge Panos presided over more than 56,000 cases. Prior to his appointment to the bench by Governor Robert L. Ehrlich in 2006, Judge Panos served as a special master for the Family Division of the Circuit Court for Baltimore City and worked in private practice, where he focused on family law issues. He received a law degree from the University of Baltimore School of Law in 1989, a Master's Degree from the University of Baltimore in 1984, and an undergraduate degree from the University of Maryland at College Park in 1980.

Melissa Marie Phinn is an experienced litigator with 20 years of trial experience. She currently is a solo practitioner specializing in criminal defense and personal injury cases. Previously, she served as an assistant public defender for Baltimore City for nine years, as an associate at the Law Office of Stanley H. Needleman, and as a law clerk to then-Baltimore City Circuit Court Judge Ellen L. Hollander. She graduated from the University of Maryland Francis King Carey School of Law in 1992 and from Towson University in 1976.

Julie Rebecca Rubin is currently a complex business litigation attorney with the Baltimore-based firm of Astrachan Gunst Thomas Rubin. She has served as the firm's vice president since 2008 and has been a principal since 2005. Ms. Rubin is a lifelong Marylander and serves on numerous local commissions and boards, including the Maryland Commission on Judicial Disabilities and the Baltimore-based CollegeBound Foundation. 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
