The Quest for Independence: Tyrell Johnson is On His Way

Tyrell Johnson strode across The Maryland School for the Blind graduation stage in June. The air vibrated with the sound of applause. Like all graduations, the moment marked an ending as well as a beginning. But his experience was different. He had already conquered challenges most students never have to face. And in the process, he built a strong, independent character, and skills that will serve him throughout his life.

It wasn't easy. But he wasn't alone.

The teachers at The Maryland School for the Blind collaborated with teachers and counselors at Parkville High School to support Tyrell to ensure he was successful academically. "My job was to get it done, whatever it took," he said. "They were there for me all the way."

Tyrell was born with Stickler syndrome, a genetic condition that can affect vision, hearing, and physical abilities. He also had cataracts, strabismus, and glaucoma.

But thanks, in part, to his mother's untiring advocacy and his extended family at MSB, he got the support he needed. He never used his disability as an excuse. English, government, biology, and algebra exams can be difficult subjects. He put in a lot of hard work and it paid off.

Today, when people think of Tyrell, they think of someone who always does his best. If he doesn't immediately succeed, he keeps at it. "I was proud to get my picture taken with Tyrell. He overcame steep challenges. He had a strong advocate in his mother, Cecelia — someone who saw his potential, who believed in him, who gave her full support, not only to him, but to our staff. Both Tyrell and his mom were key in the success achieved.

Tyrell set high expectations for himself. He showed up and did the work, and didn't let anything get in his way. He's a success story that is an inspiration to me, and I know he is to others here, as well."




2014 Financials

The Maryland School for the Blind is a private, 501(c)(3) school under Internal Revenue Service regulations. The School's fiscal year ends June 30th. Funding is provided primarily through grants from the Maryland State Department of Education and payments from local school districts. Contributions are received from individuals, corporations, foundations and community groups. Total expenses approximated \$26.6 million.
