I look forward to building on this momentum in my year as chair and working alongside you on these initiatives.




#### **Region United**

In 2022, COG pulled together its recent priorities—regional housing targets, a regional greenhouse gas emissions reduction goal, and new transit and equity planning concepts—into an overarching framework for 2030, known as *Region United*. The framework shows how the priorities interrelate and promotes grants, technical assistance, and planning tools available to COG members and partners to advance these shared regional goals.

#### Visualize 2045

The Transportation Planning Board at COG approved a major update to *Visualize 2045*, the region's federally mandated, long-range transportation plan. The multimodal plan consists of highway, transit, and bicycle/pedestrian projects totaling \$233 billion that the region expects to fund through 2045. The 2022 update highlights progress in expanding travel choices, considers how our investments advance equity and opportunity, and takes steps to include climate goals and strategies into the plan.

### Climate Milestone

A COG emissions inventory revealed the region surpassed its goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 20 percent below 2005 levels by 2020 due to a cleaner electrical grid, decreased driving, federal fuel efficiency standards, and less intense use of commercial energy. In addition to the regional inventory, COG published summaries for all 24 local jurisdictions.

#### **Equity Emphasis Areas (EEAs)**

A growing number of organizations, including COG member governments, the Greater Washington Community Foundation, and WMATA, are using EEAs, a planning concept endorsed by the COG Board and incorporated into the *Region United* framework, to inform their decision-making. COG staff updated its mapping tool with the latest data, and now 364 Census tracts with high concentrations of traditionally underserved communities qualify as EEAs.

#### **Housing Grants**

The new Housing Affordability Planning Program (HAPP), administered by COG and backed by the Amazon Housing Equity Fund, approved its first set of grants for more than \$650,000. The 10 local planning initiatives and development projects awarded funding will support efforts to meet the regional housing targets to produce more units, affordable to those with lower incomes and near transit.





#### **Food Security**

Strategies for expanding the use of Medicaid reimbursement for nutritious food, providing flexible forms of cash assistance, and other innovative policies are featured in a comprehensive, new publication, the *Healthy Food Access Policy Compendium for Metropolitan Washington*. The publication, a product of COG's Food and Agriculture Regional Member (FARM) Policy Committee, aims to improve policymaking to strengthen food security.

#### **Commuting Trends**

COG has continued to track work and travel trends since the start of COVID, and results from a 2022 survey drew a great deal of attention. Telework has significantly increased from pre-pandemic levels in the region and more commuters shifted away from driving alone and transit, according to the triennial State of the Commute Survey by COG's Commuter Connections program.

#### **Preparedness**

COG continued to help area leaders prepare and train for a wide array of threats and emergencies, including coordinating and communicating during cyber attacks. COG partnered with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) to conduct two major exercises involving city and county managers, emergency management, and information technology officials.

#### **Water Supply**

Area leaders have been advancing a long-established priority to improve security and resiliency in the water system, which currently depends on the Potomac River for 78 percent of the region's water supply. COG has been working closely with area water utilities and government leaders to rally support for a federal feasibility study to identify and analyze water supply alternatives, which Congress authorized in December 2022.

#### **Roadway Safety**

The Transportation Planning Board and its members have been doubling down on initiatives to improve roadway safety. The TPB coordinated spring and fall Street Smart public awareness campaigns and awarded \$250,000 through its Regional Roadway Safety Program to support local planning or preliminary engineering projects. The TPB also hosted a special roundtable for state departments of transportation to share information about their recent safety efforts.



#### **Air Quality**

Metropolitan Washington experienced just three "Code Orange" unhealthy air days in 2022, a decrease from eight days in 2021, according to data collected as part of COG's Ozone Season Summary for the Metropolitan Washington Air Quality Committee. The region recorded its best three-year period (2020–2022) for air quality since COG began tracking air pollution in the 1970s.
