Dear Governor Hogan, County Executive Olszewski, Dr. Williams, Ms. Sexton, and Ms. Lee:

In accordance with Chapter 496 (House Bill 1600), please find herein the Baltimore County Anti-Bullying Task Force's system-level report for the 2019-2020 school year.

Due to the ransomware attack on November 24, 2020, Baltimore County Public Schools does not currently have access to individual school data. However, attached is the Maryland State Department of Education Bullying, Harassment, and Intimidation Report, which provides system-level data. This data was retrieved prior to the ransomware attack.

Please note that, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Task Force has been unable to meet since March 2020. Furthermore, Board Member Lily Rowe, has resigned as chair of the Task Force.

Raising the bar, Closing gaps, Preparing for our future

Through action enacted by the Maryland General Assembly during the 2019 regular session, Baltimore County Public Schools (BCPS) was required to convene an Anti-Bullying Task Force chaired by a member of the Board of Education. Ms. Lillie Rowe served as the chairperson and therefore submits the following report.

Data Requirements

Requirement

For the 2018-2019 school year, to the extent consistent with State and federal law, compile data on the number of incidents of bullying, cyberbullying, harassment, and intimidation in each public school in Baltimore County and the disposition of each incident.

Response

BCPS staff submitted the required school year 2018-2019 bullying, harassment, and intimidation data in June 2019.

Requirement

For the 2019-2020 school year, to the extent consistent with State and federal law, compile data on the number of incidents of bullying, cyberbullying, harassment, and intimidation in each public school in Baltimore County and the disposition of each incident.

Response

Due to the ransomware attack on November 24, 2020, staff does not currently have access to individual school data. The required Maryland State Department of Education Bullying, Harassment, and Intimidation Report is attached which provides system level data. It was retrieved prior to the ransomware attack.

Other Requirements

Study the range of possible disciplinary actions for students found responsible for violations of the Baltimore County Public Schools bullying policy at the middle school and high school levels. and make recommendations regarding:

Requirement

Whether Baltimore County Public Schools should prescribe a countywide disciplinary action for violations of the Baltimore County Public Schools bullying policy.

Response

Interventions, supports, and disciplinary consequences for acts of bullying and harassment are outlined in BCPS Board of Education Policy 5550 and Superintendent's Rule 5550: Student Behavior Code.

Requirement

Whether community service should be prescribed as a possible disciplinary action for students found responsible for violations of the Baltimore County Public Schools bullying policy.

Response

Community service is one of the disciplinary options available to school as indicated on the MSDE Bullying, Harassment, or Intimidation Reporting Form.

Requirement

Antibullying strategies and antibullying programming, including the development of a countywide antibullying campaign.

Response

BCPS has implemented a countywide anti-bullying campaign for more than seven years. It went from a one-day observance to a one-week observance with related activities occurring throughout the year.

Requirement

Options for victims of bullying who feel that their safety is threatened if they continue to attend their current school.

Response

School staff have been provided a template for the development of a safety plan if students feel threatened by bullying. Parents can request a special transfer which is reviewed by staff.

Requirement

A procedure for providing immediate notification, consistent with State and federal law, to the parent of a victim of bullying or harassment and the parent of a perpetrator of an act of bullying or harassment in Baltimore County Public Schools.

Response

Superintendent's Rule 5580, Bullying, Harassment, or Intimidation requires notification to parents.

"The school administrator shall notify a parent/guardian of the alleged victim within 3 business days after the date the act is reported.

The school administrator shall notify a parent/guardian of the alleged perpetrator within 5 business days after the date the act is reported."

Requirement

A procedure for reporting to the parent of a victim of bullying the actions taken to protect the victim in Baltimore County Public Schools.

Response

Superintendent's Rule 5580, Bullying, Harassment or Intimidation requires this notification.

"The school administrator will notify the parent/guardian of the victim and the offender in writing the resolution of cases involving bullying, cyberbullying, harassment or intimidation, including, if applicable, that corrective action has been taken. In accordance with federal and state law and regulation, the specific disciplinary corrective measures taken against a student offender may not be disclosed.

Requirement

A process for anonymous reporting by students to protect students from retaliation.

Response

Students, parents, staff, and others can notify anonymously through an electronic reporting system per Superintendent's Rule 5580, *Bullying Harassment or Intimidation*

"The school administrator will designate a location in the school where students may anonymously complete and submit a Bullying, Harassment or Intimidation Reporting Form."

Requirement

Resources that Baltimore County Public Schools should make available to students who have been the target of bullying and to parents of those students.

Resources

BCPS provides a comprehensive continuum of social emotional support services to students and their families, including but not limited to, individual counseling, group counseling, restorative practices, conflict mediation and use of mentors. These supports are offered and delivered by instructional personnel, school counselors, school psychologist's, school social workers, school nurses and community mental health partners and organizations.

Requirement

Electronic learning as an option for students found responsible for violations of the Baltimore County Public Schools bullying policy and whose presence in school would be disruptive; and

Response

Board of Education Policy 5560; Suspension and Expulsion allows suspension or expulsion from the regular academic program may be necessary in order to modify student behavior, when the student's presence in school causes a disruption to the normal educational functions of the school or when the student poses a threat to the safety of other students or to staff. The Superintendent/designee may place a student in an alternative education program (inclusive of e-learning) when such placement provides the student with comparable education services and appropriate behavioral support services.

Requirement

Any other findings of the Task Force.

Response

The Mind Over Matters Campaign was implemented as a year-round campaign to address concerns of students sometimes related to bullying such as suicide prevention, mental health, substance abuse prevention.

The Discipline Workgroup was created to focus concerted efforts on school climate, one of the district's top priorities. This important workgroup is charged with examining student discipline as outlined in the Student Handbook, Board of Education Policies and Superintendent's Rules. This intensive examination of student discipline has been made through the collective voice of school system professionals, with a visionary lens of how student discipline relates to school climate.
