Dear President Miller and Speaker Busch:

Please see the attached report concerning *Drunk and Drugged Driving by Juveniles*, which was written in response to language set forth in Senate Bill 371, Chapter 55, Acts of 1991. This statute directs the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) to:

- "(1) Regularly compile and analyze statistics on drunk and drugged driving by juveniles and young adults;
- (2) Work with the Department of Juvenile Services, the Administrative Office of the Courts, the Maryland State Police, and other law enforcement agencies to monitor the effects of Chapter 254 of the Acts of 1988 and Chapters 438 and 551 of the Acts of 1989 (requiring the imposition of an alcohol restriction on the license of a driver under the age of 21), and Chapter 284 of the Acts of 1989 ("administrative per se" law) on juvenile and young adult offenders;
- (3) Annually report, subject to § 2-1312 of the State Government Article, to the General Assembly regarding the information collected under paragraphs (1) and (2) of this section; and
- (4) Publicize recent legislative enactments concerning drunk and drugged driving by juveniles and young adults."

Drunk and Drugged Driving by Juveniles (Senate Bill 371, Chapter 55, Acts of 1991)

This report is written in response to language contained in Senate Bill 371, Section 6, Chapter 55, Acts of 1991, which calls on the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) to:

- "(1) Regularly compile and analyze statistics on drunk and drugged driving by juveniles and young adults;
- (2) Work with the Department of Juvenile Services, the Administrative Office of the Courts, the Maryland State Police, and other law enforcement agencies to monitor the effects of Chapter 254 of the Acts of 1988 and Chapters 438 and 551 of the Acts of 1989 (requiring the imposition of an alcohol restriction on the license of a driver under the age of 21), and Chapter 284 of the Acts of 1989 ("administrative per se" law) on juvenile and young adult offenders;
- (3) Annually report, subject to § 2-1312 of the State Government Article to the General Assembly regarding the information collected under paragraphs (1) and (2) of this section; and
- (4) Publicize recent legislative enactments concerning drunk and drugged driving by juveniles and young adults."

The District Court provides the MVA with an annual summary of juveniles charged. The most recent information provided by the Court indicates that 2,423 drivers under 21 Statewide were charged in FY 2014. The following chart provides data on the number of drivers under 21 charged with Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol and/or Drugs (TR § 21-902) for the past three fiscal years:

The Maryland Department of Transportation (MDOT) initiated new activities, while continuing to build upon on-going efforts, to strengthen public awareness on the hazards and consequences of drinking and driving. Activities undertaken by the MVA, often working in concert with several other State and local agencies and community groups, are outlined in the following chart:

Maryland's Graduated Licensing System law (Chapter 483, Acts of 1998)	All novice drivers complete a comprehensive driver education curriculum for all driver education schools. Part of the curriculum focuses on Maryland's drunk and drugged driving laws, acquainting all with details on the various laws and their penalties. This curriculum includes Maryland's laws and sections pertaining to impaired driving.	The MVA's Driver Instructional Services Division (DISD) coordinates the approval and licensing of all businesses and individuals responsible for the delivery of the Maryland Driver Education, Motorcycle Safety, 3-Hour Alcohol & Drug, and Driver Improvement Programs. The DISD also coordinates the development and implementation of all educational curriculums used by the MVA including the Rookie Driver Program.	
The Rookie Driver Program	The Rookie Driver Program distributes a pamphlet (RD-012) outlining Maryland's laws and urges novice drivers not to drink or use drugs and drive. The pamphlet is being discontinued and the information will be incorporated in the updated Rookie Driver Skills Log /Practice Guide.	MVA's Driver Instructional Services Division	
The Maryland Driver's Manual	The Maryland Driver's Manual details Maryland's drunk driving laws, stressing not to drink and drive. The Manual includes specific information on underage drinking emphasizing the penalties and sanctions under Maryland's law, which prohibits a driver under the age of 21 from driving with any alcohol in the driver's blood (TR §16-113 (b) & (j)). The Young Driver Program	The Young Driver Program solicits a strong and ongoing parental role in driver education and calls on parents to discourage drinking and driving, or using drugs and driving. A parent-teen driving agreement is distributed to parents and others which establishes rules and privileges for vehicle use and encourages parents to establish sanctions for alcohol or drug use and driving. Continuing outreach to parents through local parent/teacher organizations and other parent groups also stresses the dangers of impaired driving.	The MVA's Central Operations and Safety Programs Division (COSP) manages the Young Driver Program and collects information on research and best practices on Maryland driver safety issues.	
The Maryland Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP)	Impaired driving is a core emphasis area in Maryland's SHSP. The Impaired Driving Emphasis Area Team (EAT) is dedicated to working on issues and incorporating key strategies and countermeasures on impaired driving across the state. The SHSP also includes young drivers as a target group that is represented within the Impaired Driving Emphasis Area Team (EAT).	The MVA's Maryland Highway Safety Office (MHSO) is responsible for leadership and coordination of the State's overall highway safety program. The MHSO supports many highway safety activities, administers a highway safety grant program in which federal traffic safety funds are provided to state agencies, local governments, and other organizations to implement statewide and local impaired and drugged driving programs.

The Regional Traffic Safety Program	On a regional level, numerous community and high school-based drinking and drugged driving program initiatives target underage drinking including: Montgomery County's "Drawing the Line on Underage Alcohol Use"; Carroll County's "Every 15 Minutes" Program; MADD's "Power of Parents" Program; Washington Regional Alcohol Program's Youth Outreach Project; Garrett County's SADD-Sponsored "Safe and Sober" Event; and Anne Arundel County's The 5th Quarter Program.	The MHSO funds and supports local and regional initiatives through the Regional Traffic Safety Program (RTSP). The RTSP Managers distribute print and social media materials in all 24 jurisdictions.	
	In addition, prevention strategies and enforcement details such as party dispersals, alcohol vendor compliance checks and "Cops in Shops" are implemented in various jurisdictions.		
Maryland Safe Teen Driving Coalition	The Maryland Safe Teen Driving Coalition focuses on young driver safety issues including impaired driving. The coalition has worked with State legislators, safety professionals and law enforcement to raise awareness of key young driver safety issues through outreach and public education. Maryland's 2011 Drunk Driving Reduction Act	MVA's Driver Wellness & Safety Division supports and implements Maryland's 2011 Drunk Driving Reduction Act. This Act requires mandatory suspensions or ignition interlock participation for alcohol offenses committed by individuals who are under the age of twenty-one.	The MVA's Driver Wellness & Safety Division is responsible for the reinstatement of revoked drivers, medical review of drivers who may pose a threat to highway safety and referring drivers to re-education programs.	
"Branded D.U.I." an innovative drunk driving film	The film was co-produced by and aired on Maryland Public Television in 2006 and was distributed to every high school in Maryland. The film showcases 11 real- life teens caught drinking and driving and interviewed as they underwent the court process resulting from their drunk driving charges. It explores the consequences from the fatalities the teens caused including their experiences in jail. The film was recognized with an <i>Enuny</i> award.
