



By the Examiner:

Q State your name, residence and occupation?

A Ignatius Marshall, 2222 Madison Avenue, Baltimore elevator operator.

Q Do you know the parties to this suit?

A Yes, sir, I am the plaintiff and my husband is the defendant.

By Mr, Evans:

Q When, where and by whom were you married?

A On March 3rd, 1919, in Baltimore, Maryland, by the Reverend Stewart.

Q When did you and your wife separate?

A On December 11th, 1923.

Q Which one of you left the other?

A I left her, her people's house.

Q Under what circumstances?

A I couldn't get along with her mother and she interfered and my wife and I made an agreement to make a home for ourselves and after I moved and got an apartment and paid rent for it and was ready to move in, she was influenced by her mother and aunt and she refused to leave her mother's home.

Q Did you furnish the apartment?

A Yes, sir, before I paid the rent she agreed to go there with me.

Q Was the place satisfactory to her then?

A Yes, sir, it was with a friend of hers and she was satisfied with the place and then after I got everything fixed up she refused to go. I tried to pursuade her to go with me until the first of the following year and tried to get her to come there and live with me and my mother and friends of ours went to her and tried to get her to come to me and she wouldn't.

Q Did you maintain that home there until after the first of 1924?

A Yes, sir, I kept it until June, 1924, and she wouldn't come.

Have you seen her since June, 1924?

A Yes, sir, half a dozen times.

Q Did you ever wpeak to her about living in the home you made for her?

A Yes, up until the first of 1924 her mother told me not to come there anymore, that she wouldn't let her daughter leave the house and then I saw her on two occasions and a friend of ours arranged a meeting for us and she said she would be there and she didn't show up and I saw her at dances several times and I danced with her and talked to her about it and she said she would stay with her mother.
