Dear Bert:

May I add a personal word in addition to what I have said of our firm in the enclosed letter?

Since I came here in 1915 to take Doug Thomas' place in the firm, we have not been given five cents' worth of State work.

During all that time we have had one of the largest, if not the largest, architectural offices in the State. We have had in our employ as many as sixteen to eighteen hardworking, sober and industrious taxpayers. We are practically all of us Democrats, and have supported you and the party with work, votes and contributions.

Although no Democratic administration has ever recognized us, either by following the principle of rotation or otherwise, we have, during this same period, been given outright two million dollars worth of work by the Republicans at the City Hall - and these appointments were not based on begging, wire-pulling or anything else but merit and our reputation for doing good work.

Honorable Albert C. Ritchie, Annapolis, Maryland.

Dear Sir:

We write to ask you to consider our firm in connection with the selection of an architect for the new Hall of Records at Annapolis, and to present our qualifications for that important work.

The designing and handling of this particular building will demand unusual qualities of the architect selected, especially in his ability to give the State a building in harmony with the beautiful Colonial architecture of Annapolis. We feel that our experience and past performance in work of this kind should justify your very serious consideration for this commission.

The first important Colonial work of this office was in the new Johns Hopkins buildings at Homewood - notably the central building, now known as Gilman Hall. A few years later, there followed the work for the Gilman School, and various buildings for the State, such as the John Hubner building at Sykesville. Among others which followed, we might mention the reproduction of Homewood at the Jamestown Exposition and, later, at San Francisco; the various buildings on the estate of Mr. Sylvester W. Labrot, near Annapolis; and a number of other residences, such as those of Mr. Gustavus Ober,Jr. and Mr. Milton Westheimer.

Beginning with the entrance of the writer into the firm, we have done a large amount of work for the University of Virginia, at Charlottesville, to wit: Peabody Hall, the new Gymnasium, the old Stadium, the Colonnade Club, Monroe Hall, the new dormitories, and quite recently, the new Stadium and the Clark Memorial Law Building. These we think important, because the University of Virginia is so famous for its Colonial architecture, dating from Jefferson's time, that it is very jealous of that reputation and very careful indeed as to whom it will consider for architectural services. In the last twenty years, the only important buildings erected there in which the writer did not have a hand were those of the Medical School, which were entrusted by the Rockefeller Foundation to a Boston firm that does all their work. Honorable Albert C. Ritchie:

The writer has also served on the Advisory Committee of Architects for the Williamsburg Restoration ever since that work was started, and in that capacity, has had rare opportunities for specialized study of the architecture of our Colonial and Early Republic periods.

As to our capacity, in general, we need only refer you to the enclosed list of some of our buildings. It is a source of pride to us that the clients represented on this list include many of the most important corporations and institutions of this and of neighboring states. We would be only too happy to have you get a confidential and independent opinion of our qualifications from any of these, and would point particularly to such operations as the Gas Building, the Mutual Life Building, the Baltimore Trust Building and to the two Federal Reserve Banks - one in Baltimore and one in Richmond.

We assume that you are anxious to avoid a competition, and believe, ourselves, that if a direct selection can be made, the results will be better for the State, since the nature of the problem demands an intimate study, carried out jointly by the architect and the building committee in a more informal spirit than would be possible were a competition program to be prepared by an outside expert.

We request an appointment at your convenience at which we may go into this matter with you more fully, and to have a brief interview with you at which we could show you photographs of our executed work and other data bearing upon our fitness for the commission requested.
