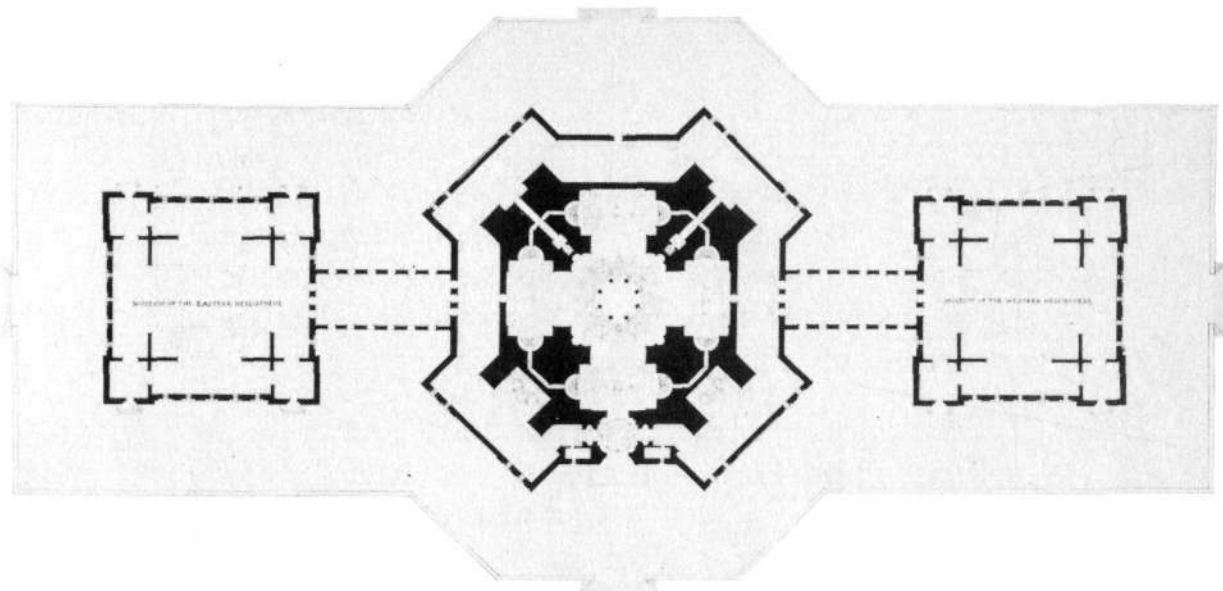

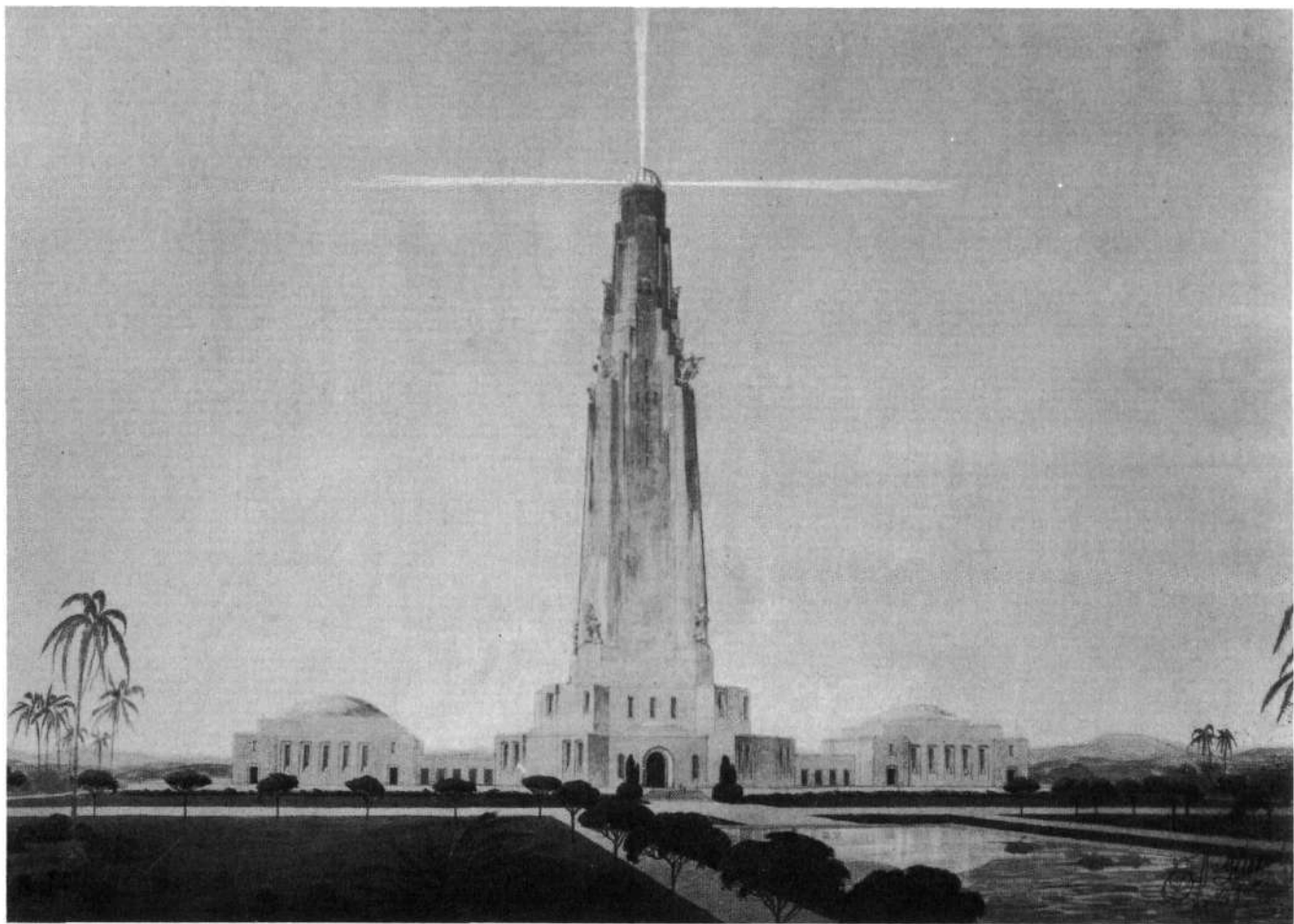

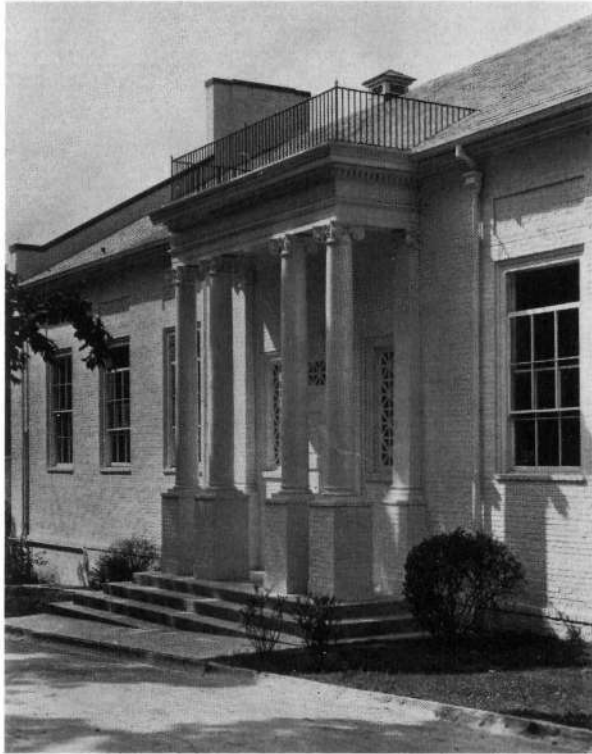

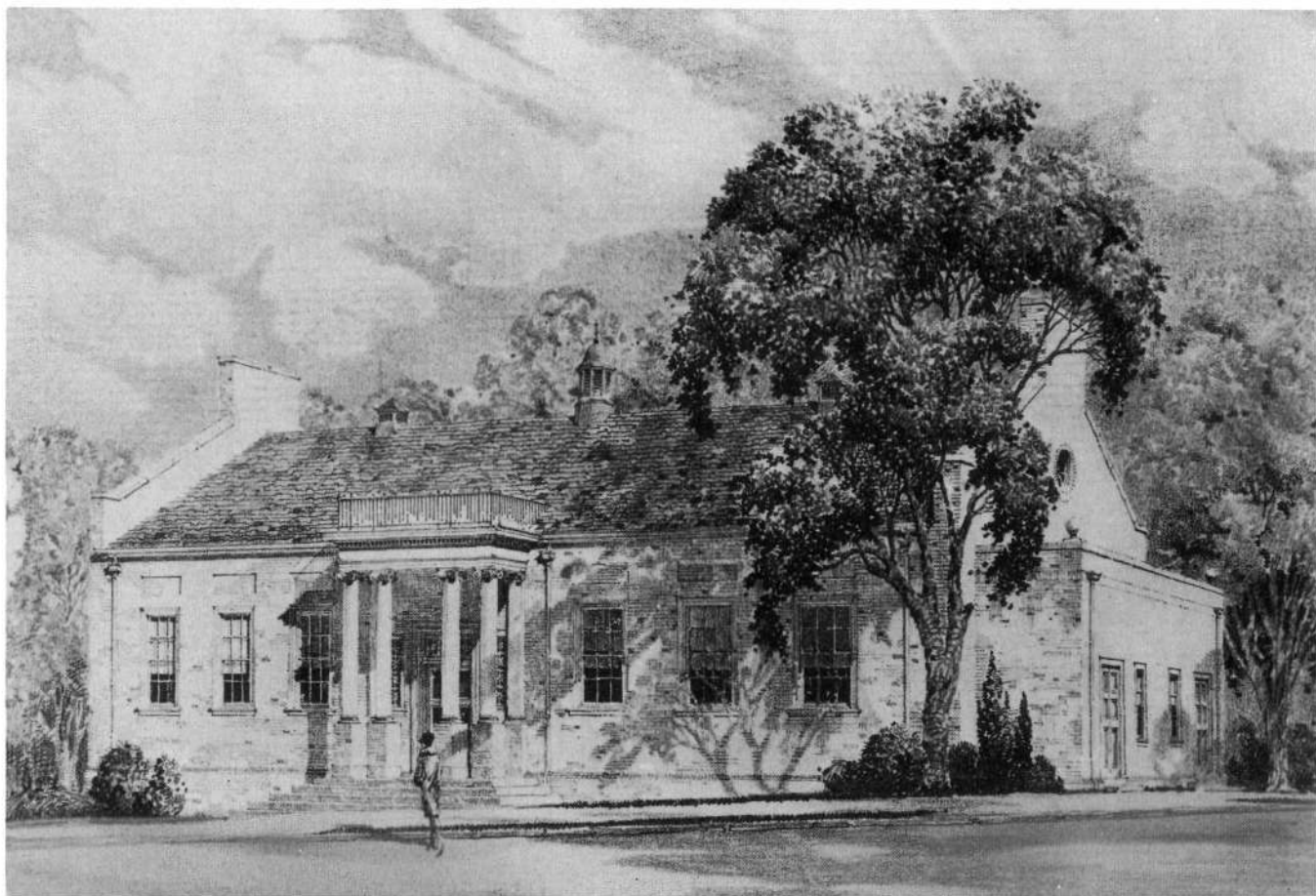
DETAIL showing the stairway and pine paneling of hall, the "Poplars," Poplar Hill, Baltimore.

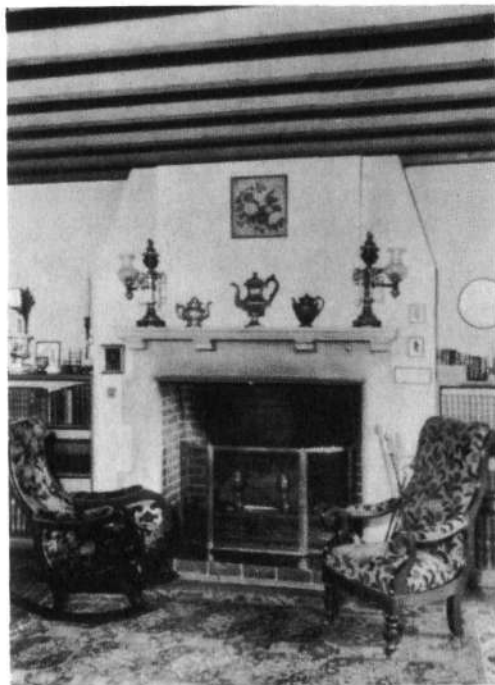

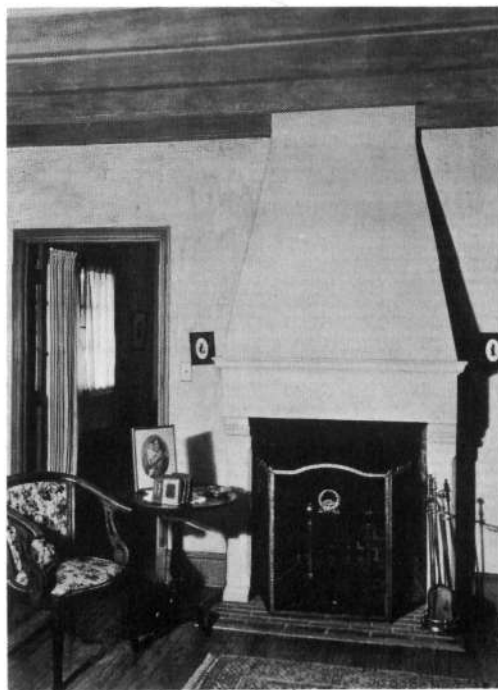

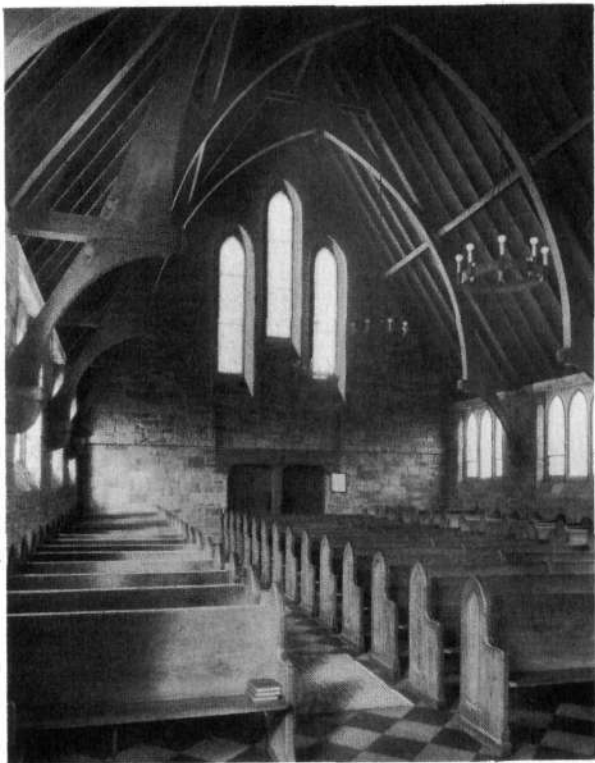

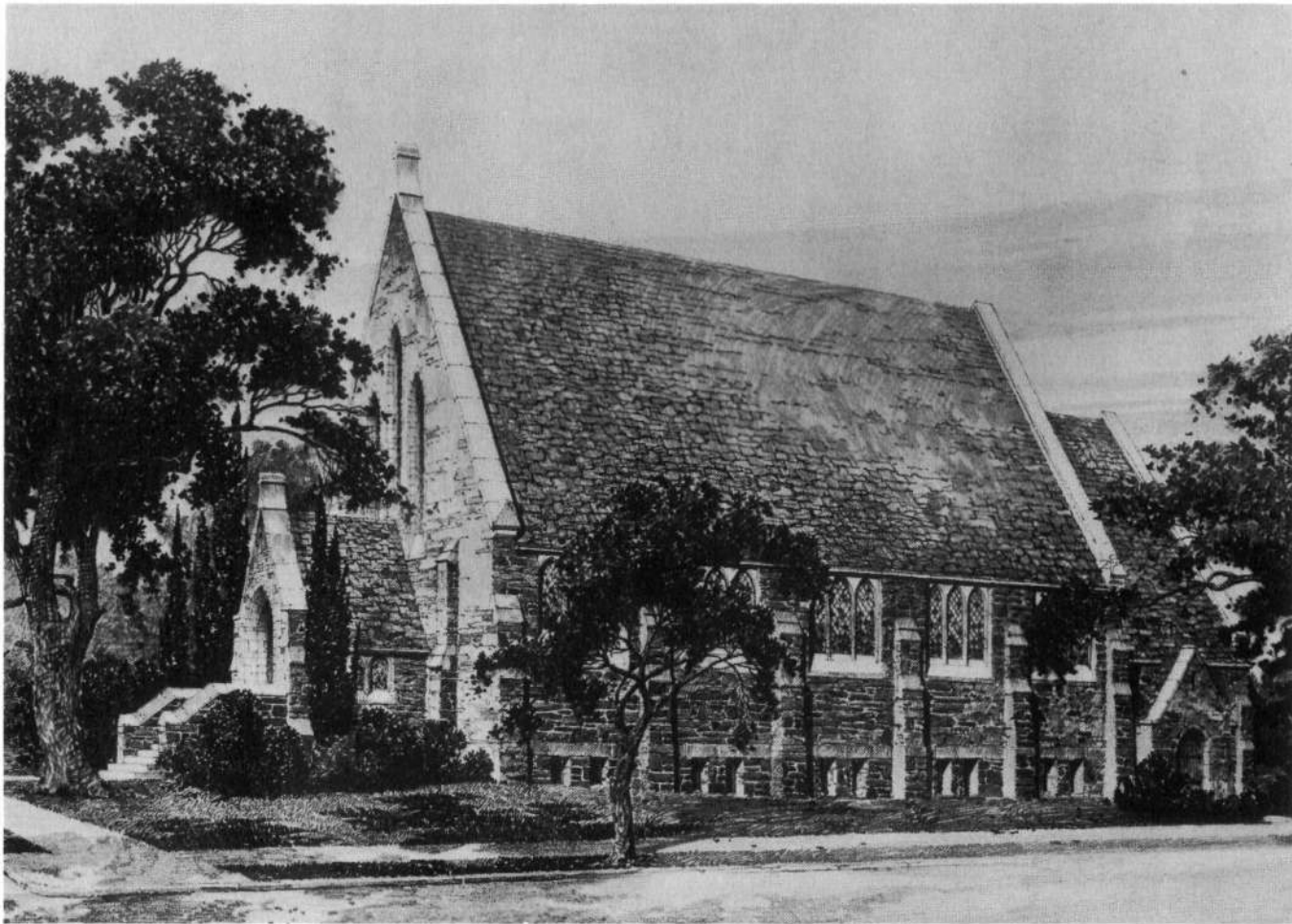

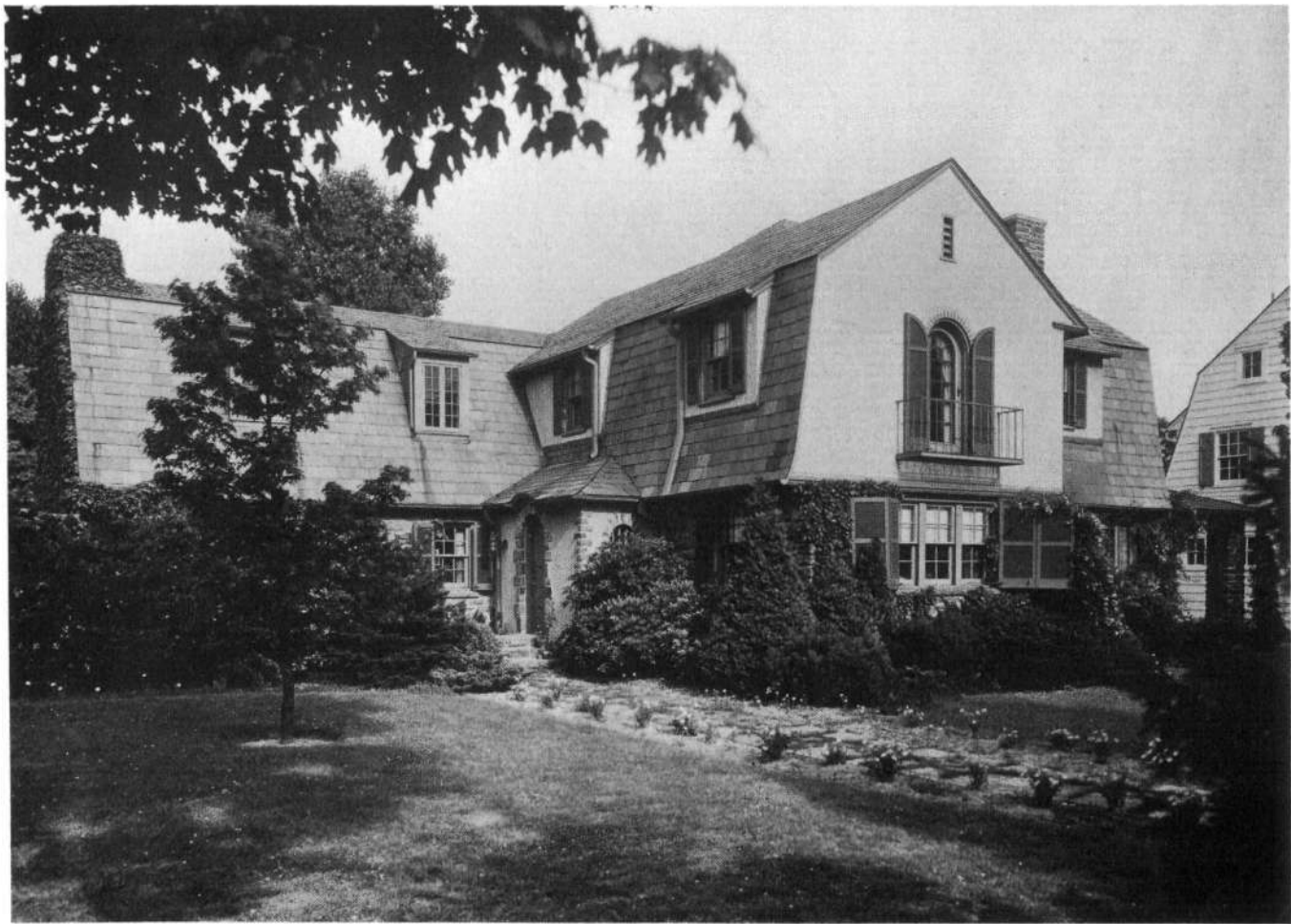

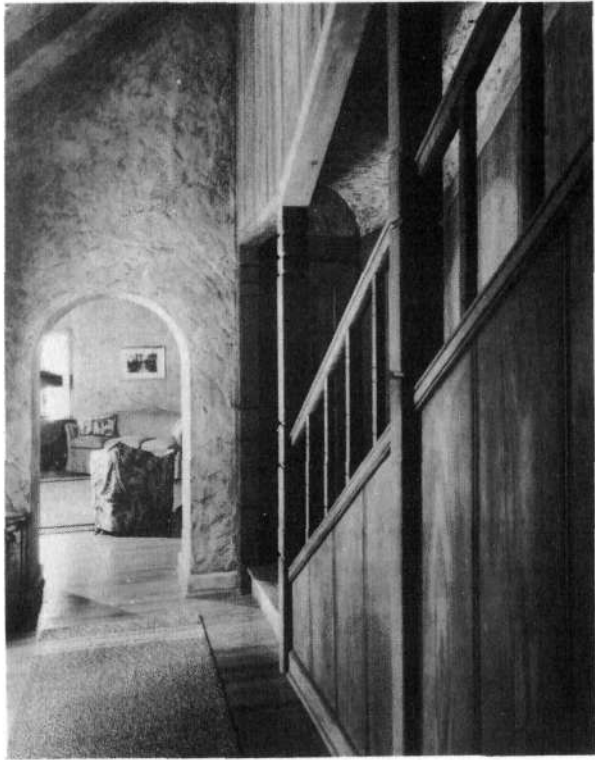

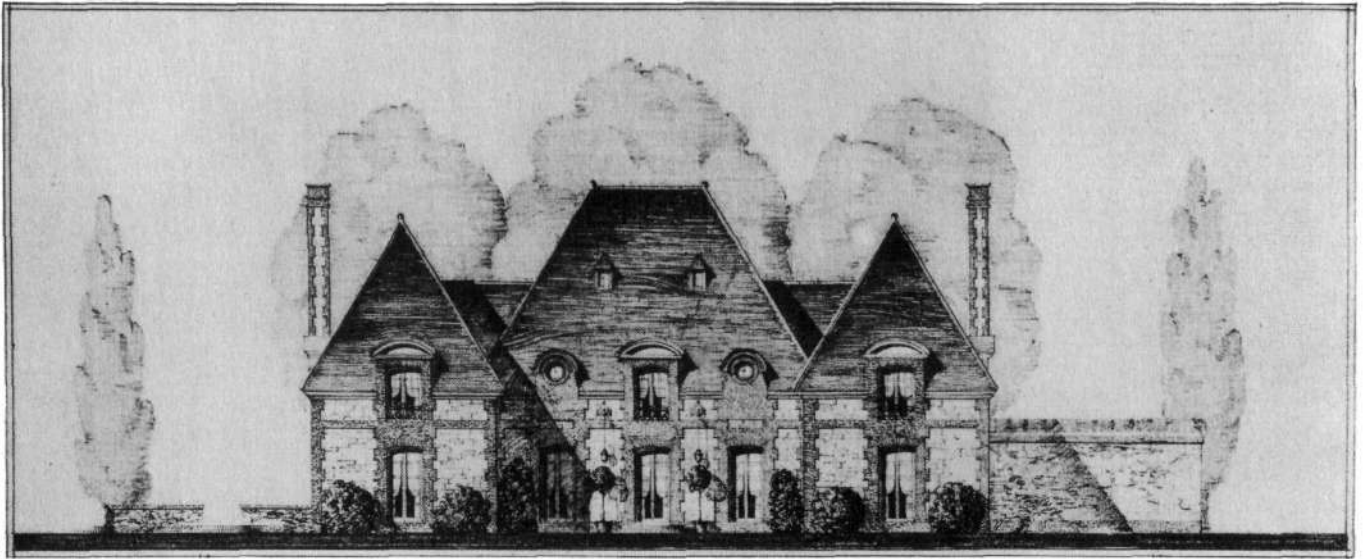

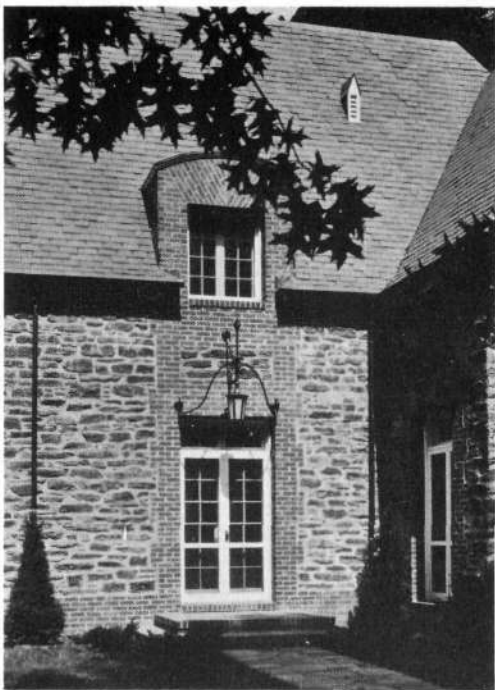

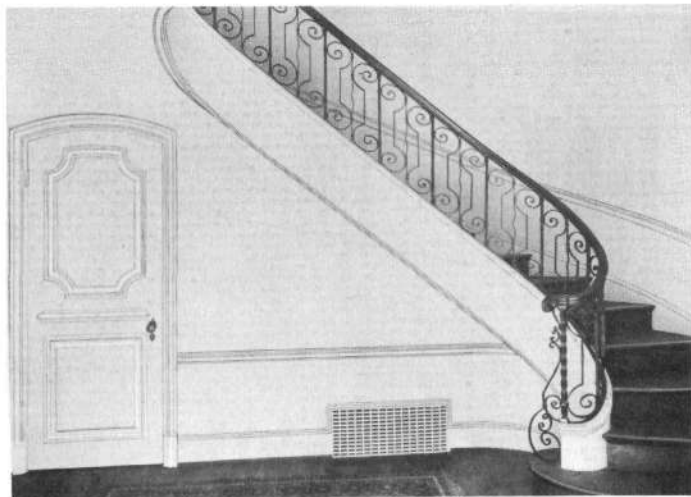

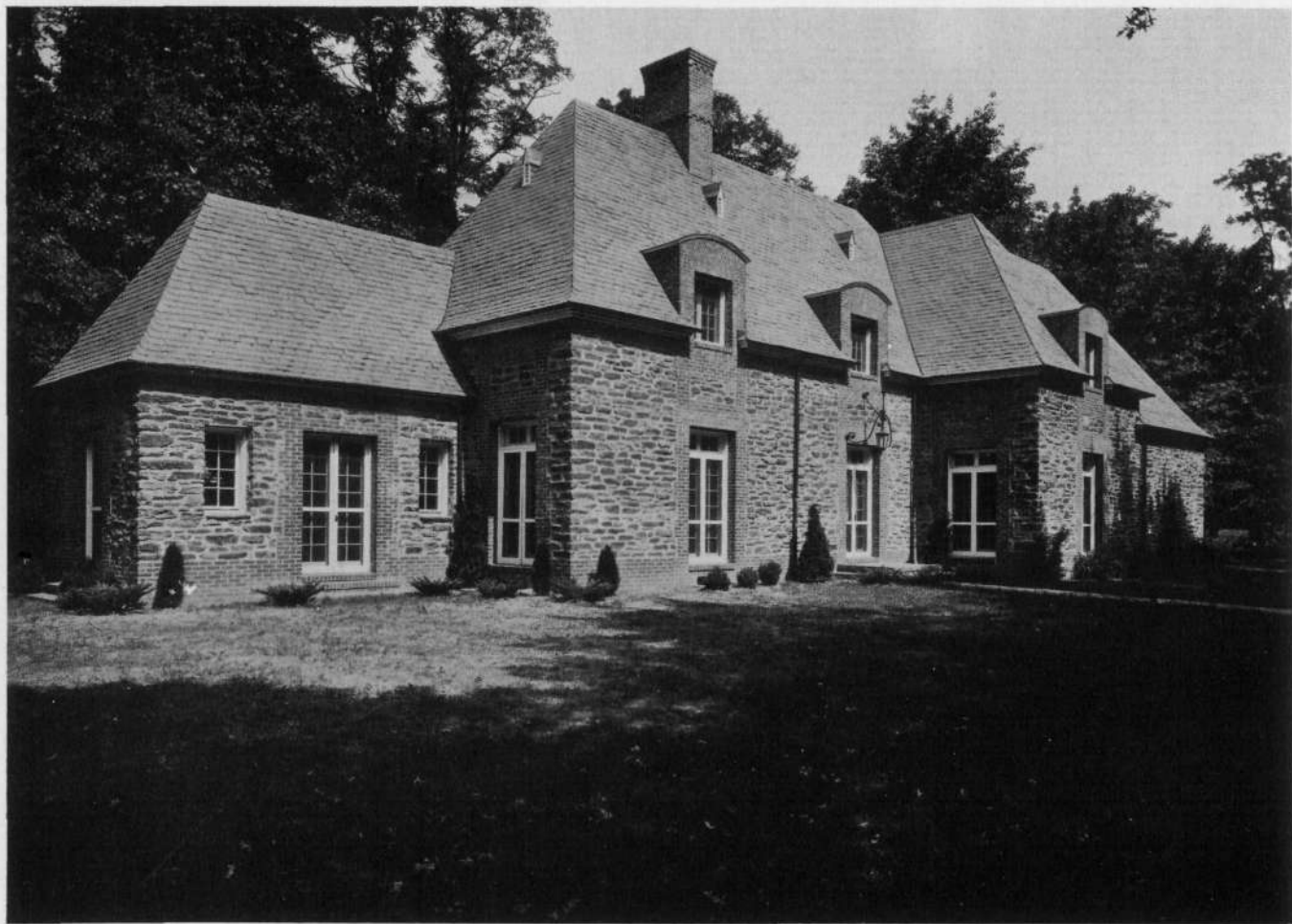

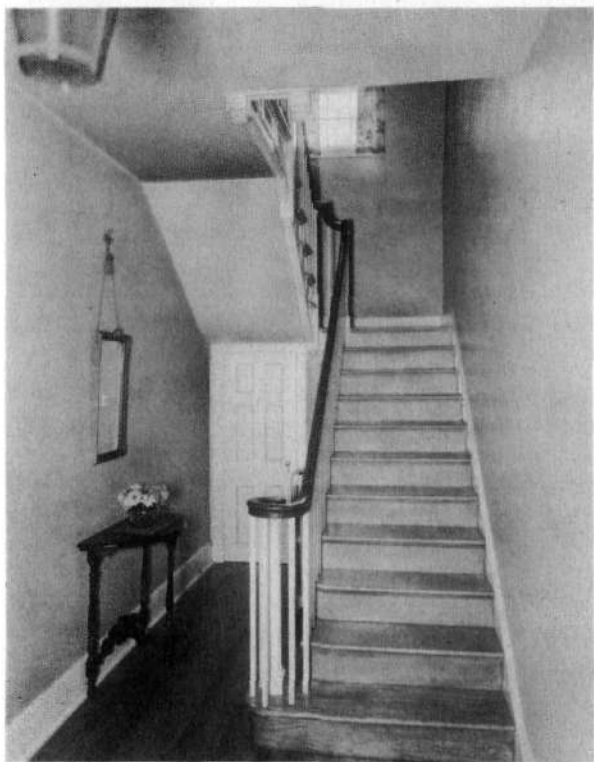

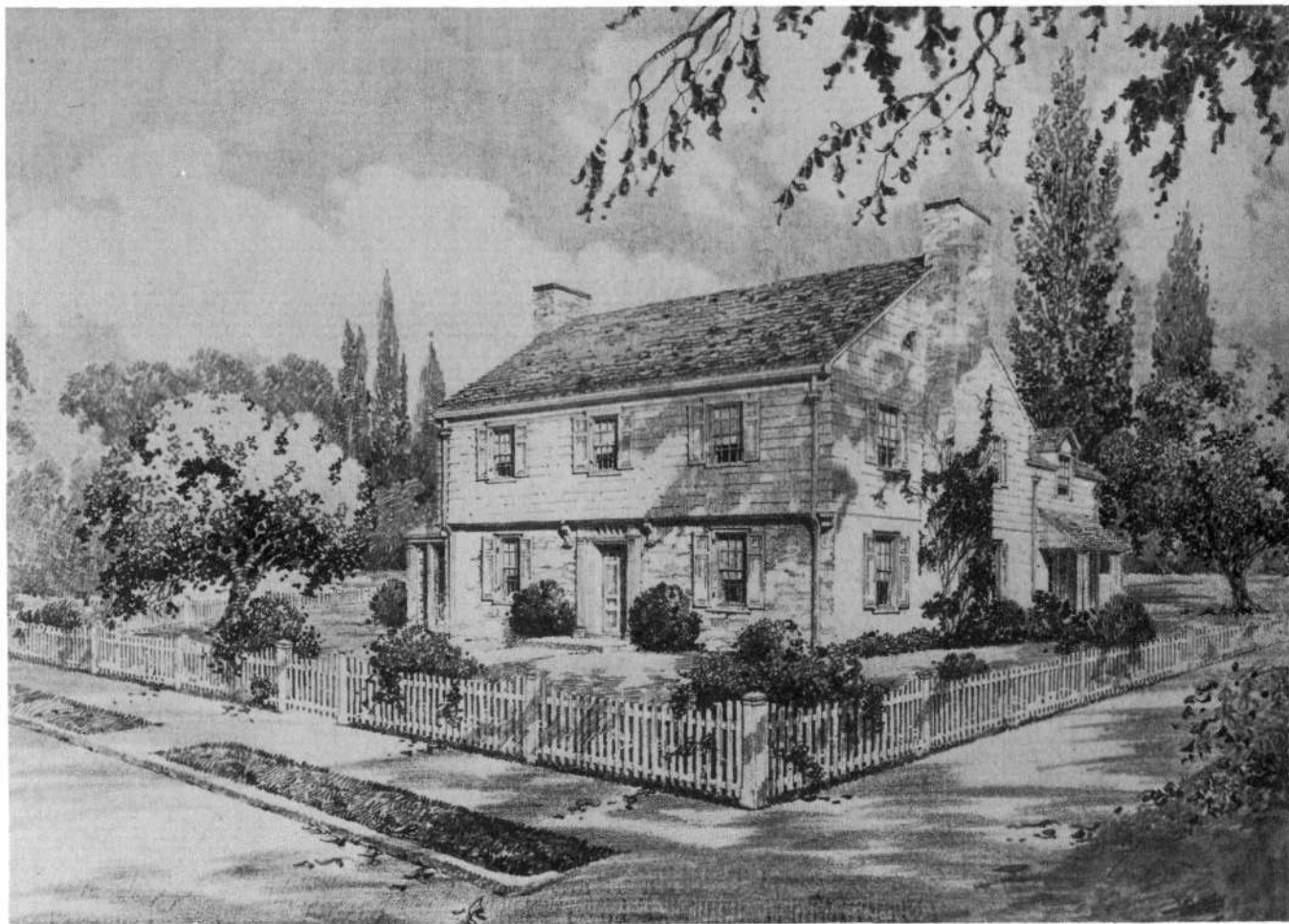

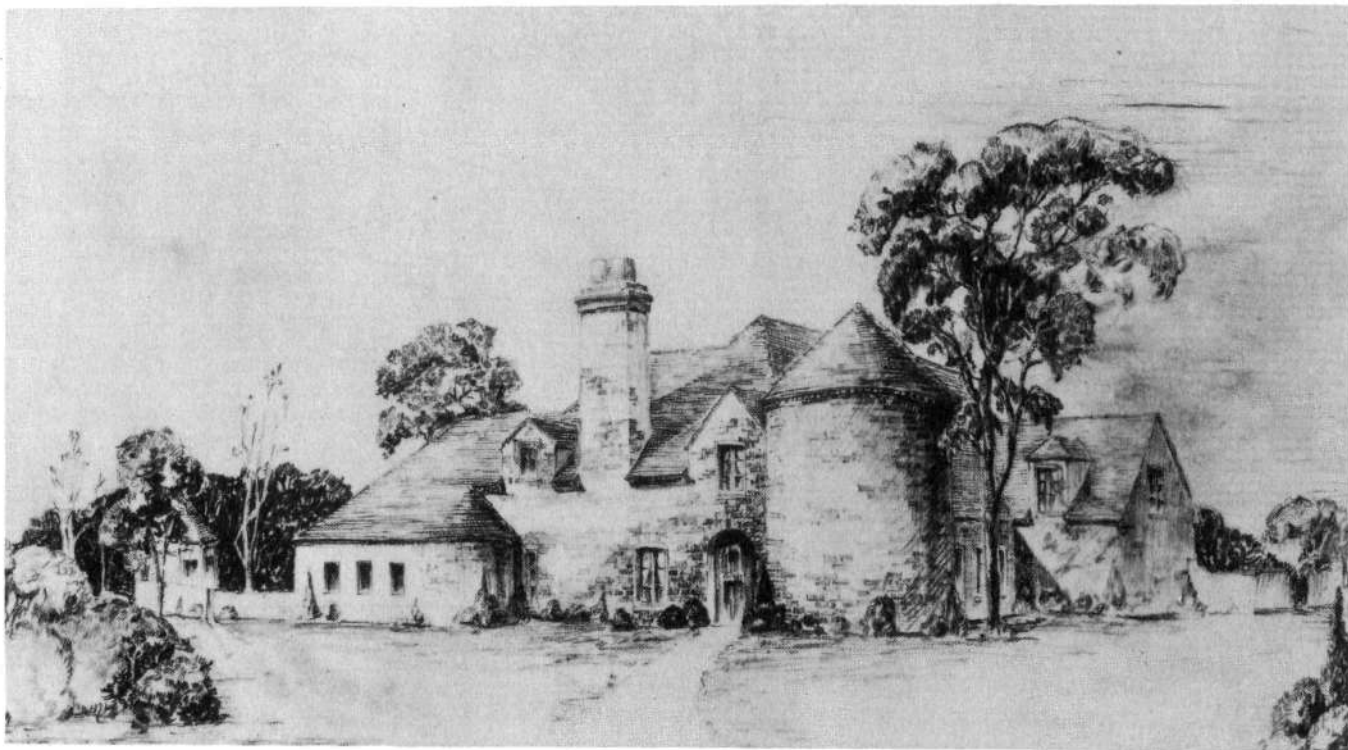

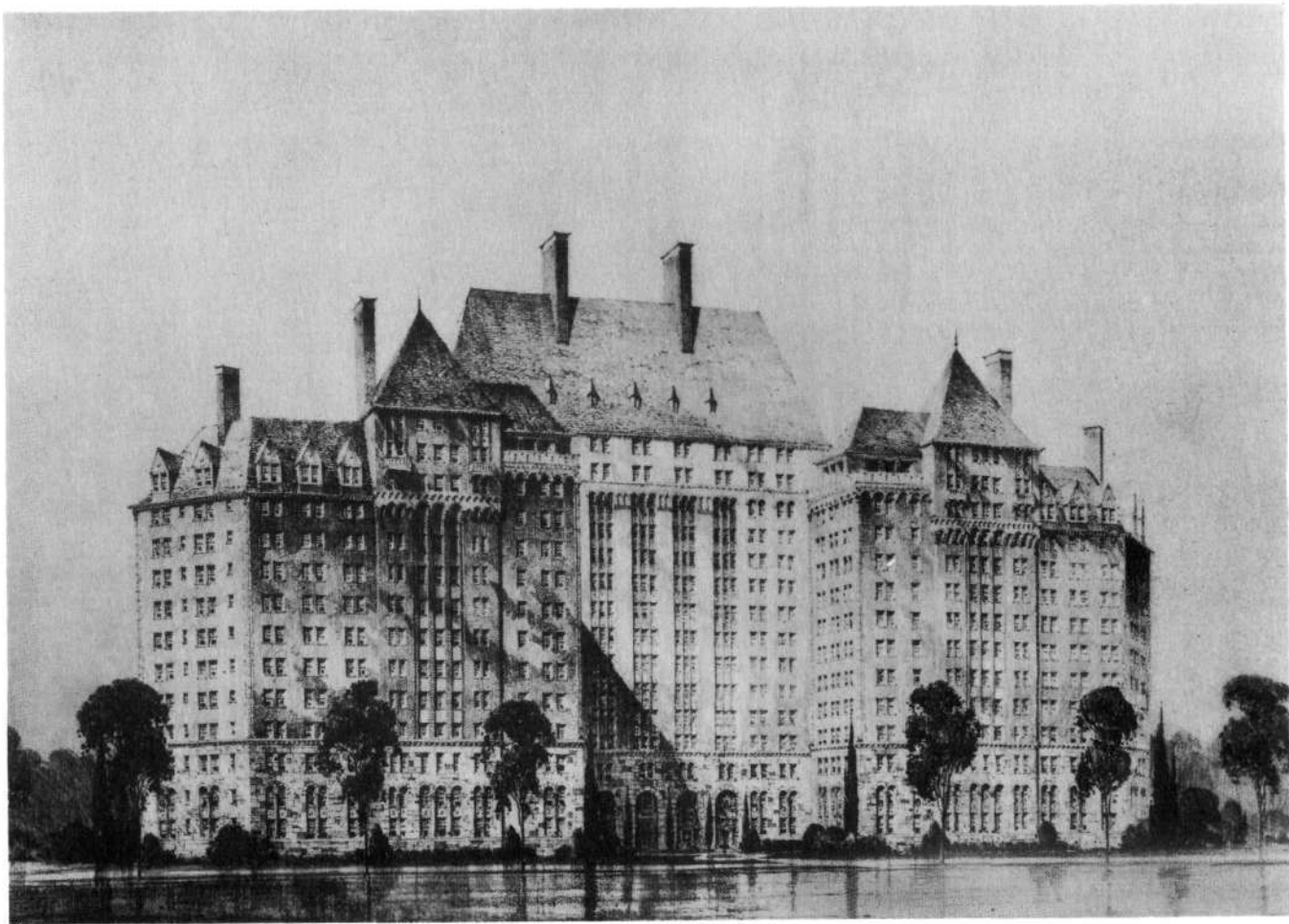

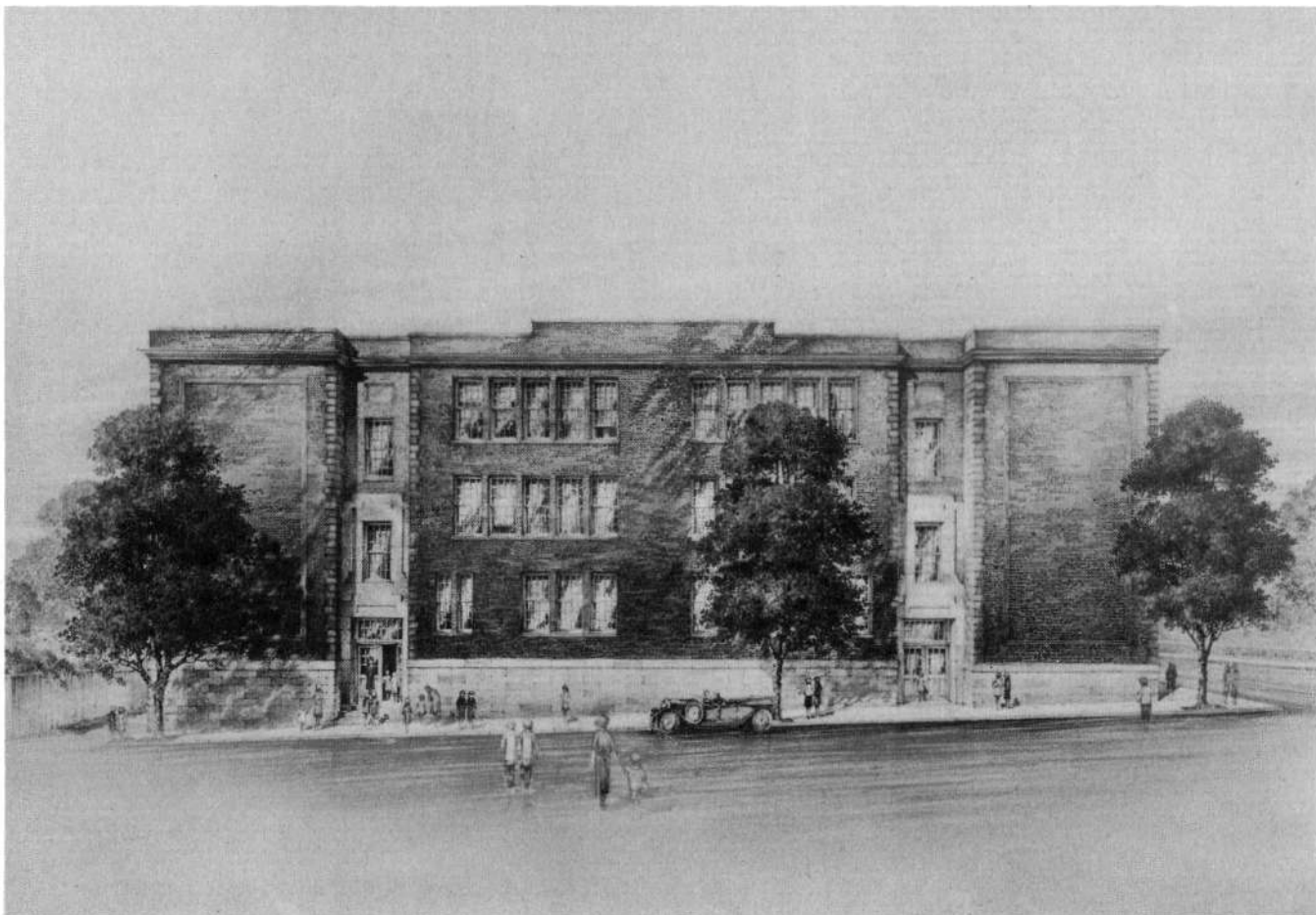

EDWARD HUGHES GLIDDEN, SENIOR

As a young man, Mr. Glidden came to Baltimore representing a Cleveland firm during the construction of the Court House. Deciding to remain in Baltimore, he severed his Cleveland connections and established offices in his adopted city. He was a pioneer in the development of the modern apartment house, designing many of the first buildings of this class erected in Baltimore.

A partial list of more than thirty apartment houses designed by Mr. Glidden, together with other works, is given below. Lack of space permits us to list but few of the more than four hundred and fifty commissions executed by Mr. Glidden during these twenty-six years that he practiced architecture in Baltimore.
