



During the Civil War Annapolis was an important port of embarkation and a concentration site for war materiel. Facilities to care for sick and wounded soldiers were also located there. The two encampments seen in the upper center are Parole Camp and Camp Richmond separated by the railroad. Below them by the flag pole is Division 2 of the U.S. General Hospital on the campus of St. John's College. At the lower left is Division 1 Hospital located on the grounds of the Naval Academy. At the far left is St. Mary's Church, and in the left center is the dome of the State House. Army transports are shown in the harbor. This hand colored lithograph, although published and copyrighted by Charles Magnus of New York, was probably drawn and lithographed by Edward Sachse of Baltimore.
