Annapolis was a major reception depot for paroled Union soldiers. The wounded and sick were cared for here at the hospital before moving to nearby Camp Parole. St. John's College was closed while the army occupied the property. The U.S. Naval Academy was also abandoned during the war in favor of a temporary location in Newport. This print was produced as some 35,000–40,000 troops in and around the city prepared to leave for points south.

The parole camp appears in the upper left corner (1); U.S. General Hospital Division 1 (2) is located at lower right foreground along the water's edge; U.S. Genl. Hospital Division 1, No. 2 (3) is at center, behind St. John's College's McDowell

Hall. The Annapolis & Elkrige Railroad passes between Camp Parole and Camp Richmond.
