



The disbarment case instituted against Maurice Braverman was tried but not decided.

The Grand Jury for the September Term was duly drawn.


All the members of the Bench were present except Judge Mason.

The case of Maurice Braverman was further considered, and it was unanimously decided that he should be disbarred from the practice of law before the Supreme Bench and his name permanently removed from the rolls thereof. A formal order was duly signed by all the judges present.

After discussion of the probable appointment and qualification of two new judges during the summer recess period, and the desirability of assigning them to particular courts as soon as the September Term begins, it was, upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried,

RESOLVED that, in view of the difficulty during the summer season of assembling all of the judges for the purpose of a meeting of the Bench to consider reports of the Central Assignment Committee and the Court House Committee, that Judges Niles, Byrnes and Warnken be and are constituted as a special committee to function in place of the Assignment and Court House Committees with respect to the assignment of such new judges and the quarters in which they shall preside.

Sixty lawyers were admitted to practice before the Supreme Bench of Baltimore City.
