I left a message on your phone and then called Mike McGuire who gave me your email address. Our current interest is being able to access mapping that shows the changing political boundaries (wards) of BC on the Sanborn maps. Is this something that your project has geo-referenced and would be accessible for web-based review? We are also interested in the long term (archival) preservation of mapping data for Maryland generally and have been slowly working towards the establishment of a permanent electronic archives for public GIS mapping data for Maryland. Our electronic archives are mirrored at UMBC and our principal image web site is http://mdlandrec.net which currently has available on line over 170,000,000 land record images.
