

The deceased, relatives of Mrs. Mattie Hunter, of 145 W. 123rd St., NYC, who ordered the removal, had figured in two cases involving mistaken graves and alleged misplaced and missing bodies since the family plot was purchased in 1930

Mrs. Hunter said she decided to end the irregularities by remov-ing the bodies to Mount Calvary Cemetery.




