DEED This Deed, Made this thirtieth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-four, by and between The Rockdale Powder Company to The Rockdale Powder Company, a corporation of the state of Delaware, party of the first part, and Title Guarantee and Trust Company, a corporation of the State of Maryland, party of the second part. (I.R.S. \$50.00)

Whereas, the directors of the said The Rockdale Powder Company have been authorized and empowered to sell, assign and transfer all of the property, rights and franchises of the said Rockdale Powder Company, situated in Baltimore and Carroll counties, state of Maryland, together with approximately three and one-quarter miles of railway leading from Hoffmansville to Rockdale Junction, by the consent in writing and pursuant to the vote of the holders of a majority of the stock issued and outstanding, at a meeting of the stock holders of the said corporation held on the second day of December, 1913, at the offices of said corporation in York, Pennsylvania.

Now, Therefore, This Deed Witnesseth; That in consideration of the sum of Five dollars, and other valuable considerations, this day paid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, the said party of the first part doth grant and convey unto the said party of the second part, its successors and assigns, all those seven tracts of land, containing in all eleven hundred and sixty acres, more or less, situate in the sixth District of Baltimore County, in the State of Maryland, near Hoffmansville, and as to a small corner thereof, situate in Carroll County, in the state aforesaid, and described as follows, that is to say: Lot No. 1. All that tract or parcel of land situate and lying partly in Baltimore County and partly in Carroll County, State of Maryland, north of the West Fork of the Great Falls of Gunpowder River, being composed of parts of the tracts called "Raccoon Harbour", "Lauriel Hill", "Friendship", "Paper Mill Hills", &c., and included within the following metes and bounds, courses and distances, viz:

Beginning at the end of the ninth line of the "Gunpowder Tract", as laid out in 1887 at or near the beginning of a tract called "Beaver Trap", and running thence north forty-seven and one-quarter degrees, west seventeen perches, south eighty-four and one-quarter degrees, east sixty-eight perches; north fifty-four and three-quarter degrees, east eight perches; to land called "Tumble Down the Hill"; thence bounding on the outline of the land sold by William H. Hoffman and James Herry, Executors, to F. Keisel, north sixty-one and one-half degrees, east forty-nine and one-tenth perches, and north eleven and one half degrees,

east thirty and four-tenths perches, thence bounding on Hiker's land, north twenty-seven and one-half degrees, east thirty-two and three-tenths perches; thence bounding on land of Alexander G. Miller, south forty-two degrees, east forty-two perches; still bounding on Miller, north sixty degrees, east forty-two and three-quarters perches, to the northwest corner of Mrs. Bressler's Woodlot; thence bounding on said Woodlot, two courses, viz; south ten and three-quarter degrees, east fifty-six perches, to a stake and stones; and north seventy-three and one-half degrees, east forty-two and one-half perches, to a stake and stone at the east corner of said Woodlot; thence bounding reversely on the land sold to Joseph Smith, three courses, to wit; north sixty and one-half degrees, east forty-four and two-tenths perches; south thirty-nine degrees, east seventy-four and one-quarter perches, and north forty-three degrees, east one and seven-tenths perches to a bounded Chestnut tree, a corner of Hoffman's and Elias Bailey's lands, and at the end of the first line of said Bailey's land; thence south forty-six and one-half degrees, east forty-six perches, and fourteen <sup>lines</sup> inches to a bounded chestnut oak tree, standing on a hill at the beginning of said Bailey's land; thence reversing the given line of Bailey's land and bounding on Huffman's land north forty-six degrees, east sixty and two-tenths perches to a stone planted at the end of the fourth line of that part of Poplar Run, which was conveyed by Peter Faze to Charles Faze by deed dated May 15th, A.D. 1831; thence reversing the fourth line of said deed as corrected for variation, south seventy-eight and one-half degrees, east nine and three-tenths perches to the stump of a chestnut tree; thence reversely, with part of the third line of said deed, south thirty-two degrees, west fifty and three-tenths perches to a stone marked with the letter "H", standing in said line; thence south eleven and one-quarter degrees, east seventy-seven perches, to a stone marked with the letter "H", standing in the sixth line of the Original Tract, called "Paper Mill Hills"; thence south, eight and three-quarter degrees, east forty-four and one-half perches; thence south seven degrees, west twenty-three and three-quarter perches; south thirty-five and one-half degrees, west six and one-quarter perches, to a Poplar tree; thence south eighty-five and one-quarter degrees, west ten and seven-tenths perches; thence north sixty-five and one-quarter degrees, west twenty-six perches; north fifty-one degrees, west forty-six perches; north thirty-nine degrees, west twelve and two-tenths perches; north fourteen and one-half degrees, west seventeen and three-quarter perches, to a stake by a marked Chestnut tree on the northeast side of the county Road; thence north fifty-eight and three-quarter degrees, west (reversing south fifty-seven and one-half degrees, east by attraction) one hundred and twenty-eight and six-tenths perches to a stake and pile of stone; thence north, seventy-eight and three-quarter degrees, west two hundred and twenty-one perches, more or less, to the beginning. Containing two hundred and forty-nine acres, three roods and thirty square perches, more or less, after excluding a lot containing seventy-three one-hundredths of an acre sold and conveyed by George W.S. Hoffman, et al, to Levi Eahn, November 24, 1890, lying within the boundaries of this tract.

Lot No. 2, (Being the "Gunpowder" Paper Mill Property) Situate and lying partly in Carroll County and partly in Baltimore County, on both sides of the West Fork of the Great Gunpowder Falls, composed of parts of the tracts called "Raccoon Harbour", "Paper Mill Hill", "Heavy Ground", "Merrymen's Rock", "Good Spring", "John, is it mine", "Poplar Run, &c.

Beginning for the same at a stone marked with the letter "H" standing on a hill side east of the stream called "Poplar Run", at the end of the south eleven and one-quarter degrees, east seventy-seven perches line of Lot No. 1, and running thence north seventy



seven perches line of Lot No. 1, and running thence north seventy and one-quarter degrees east fifty-nine and one-half perches to the beginning of the sixth line of "Paper Mill Hills," thence reversing the fifth line of said tract, south forty-one and one-quarter degrees, east eighteen and three-quarters perches to the beginning of said line, and the beginning of "Good Spring"; thence reversing the given line of "Good Spring, south twenty nine degrees, west forty-two perches, more or less, to the end of the ninth line of the tract called "Good Spring"; thence reversely with the lines thereof as corrected for variation, south sixty-eight and one-half degrees, west seventeen perches, south thirty-five degrees, east forty-one perches, and south twenty-six degrees, east nineteen and eight-tenths perches; thence bounding on the "Clipper" tract, south thirty-seven and one-half degrees, west seventy-nine and four-tenths perches, to the east corner of Mount Tabor Church Lot, then with said lot reversely, north fifty-two and one-half degrees, west eight and one-half perches, and south thirty-seven and one-half degrees, west six and sixtenths perches; thence bounding on Lot No. 3, north fifty-eight and three-quarters degrees, west one hundred and forty-six and eight-tenths perches; south eighty-five degrees, west nine ~~nine~~ perches, to a marked pine tree; thence north, sixty-eight and one-half degrees west, and four-tenths perches; north seventeen and one-half degrees, west, thirty-five and seven-tenths perches, to a marked Chestnut Oak Sappling; thence north seventy-seven and one-quarter degrees, west eleven and six-tenths perches; to a small marked Maple; thence south, sixty-nine degrees, west sixteen perches; north twenty-one degrees, east thirty-eight and six-tenths perches, north sixty-four and one-half degrees, west one hundred twenty-one and two-tenths perches, to a stake; thence south fifty-one and one-half degrees, west forty perches thence north fifty-three and one-quarter degrees, west twenty-nine perches, to a marked White Oak on the north-east side of a wood road; thence north forty-eight degrees, west ninety-eight and one-half perches, or until it intersects the north twenty-one degrees, east seventy-three and six-tenths perches line of the "Gunpowder" tract; thence north twenty-one degrees, east three and one-half perches to the end of said line; thence north thirty-four and one-quarter degrees, east ten perches, to the beginning of a tract called "Beaver Trap"; thence bounding on Lot No. 1, reversely, south seventy-eight and three-quarters degrees, east two hundred and twenty-one perches, to a stake and stones; thence south fifty ~~eight~~ <sup>seven</sup> and ~~three-quarters~~ <sup>one-half</sup> degrees, east, (reversing by local attraction north fifty-eight and three-quarters degrees, west), one hundred and twenty-eight and six-tenths perches to a stake near a marked Chestnut tree on the northeast side of the County road; thence south fourteen and one-half degrees, east seventeen and three-quarters perches to a stake; thence south thirty-nine degrees, east twelve and two-tenths perches to a stake; thence south, fifty-one degrees, east forty-six perches; south sixty-five and one-quarter degrees, east twenty-six perches; north eighty-five and one-quarter degrees, east ten and seven-tenths perches, to a Poplar tree; thence north thirty-five and one-half degrees, east six and one-quarter perches; north seven degrees, east twenty-three and three-quarters perches, and then north eight and three-quarters degrees, west forty-four and one-half perches to the place of beginning, containing two hundred and seventeen acres, two roods and thirty one square perches, more or less, exclusive of the private cemetery.

Lying partly in Carroll County and partly in Baltimore County, State of Maryland, south of the "Gunpowder Paper Mill Tract", being composed of parts of the tracts called "Raccoon Harbour", "Merryman's Rock", "Heavy Ground", "Paper Mill Hills", &c., and included within the metes and bounds, courses and distances following, to wit:

Beginning for the same at a point midway between two bounded Spanish Oaks at the end



of the Seventh line of the tract called "Merryman's Rock", thence reversing the outlines of "Merryman's Rock" as corrected for variation, &c, the two following courses; south sixty eight and one-quarter degrees, west thirty and one-half perches to a stone marked "M.N." a corner of a tract of land called "Merryman's Neighbour", a corner also of Jacob Sheerer's land; thence north sixty-four and one-quarter degrees, west thirty perches, to the beginning of land called "Raccoon Harbour" then e reversely with the outlines of said tract of land as corrected for variation, north sixty-one degrees, west fifty-two perches south sixty-eight degrees, west three perches; north thirty-five and one-half degrees, west eighteen perches to a stone between two notched Water Oags; thence south sixty and one-half degrees, west forty-three and three-tenths perches to the end of the ninth line of the tract of land called "We found the Beginning"; thence north seventeen and three-quarters degrees, west forty-two and three-quarters perches, to a stake and stones at the outlines of the land called "Kentucky"; thence north twenty-one degrees, east seventy and one-tenth perches to the southwest corner of the Gunpowder Mill lot, (No. 2); thence bounding on said lot No. 2, south forty-eight degrees, east ninety-eight and one-half perches to a marked White Oak Tree on the northeast side of a wood road; thence south fifty-three and one-quarter degrees, east twenty-nine perches; north fifty-one and one-half degrees, east forty perches; south sixty-four and one-half degrees, east one hundred twenty-one and two tenths perches; south twenty-one degrees west thirty-eight and six-tenths perches; north sixty-nine degrees, east sixteen perches; south seventy-seven and one-quarter degrees, east eleven and six-tenths perches; south sixty-eight and one-half degrees, east thirty-five and seven-tenths perches to a marked Pine Tree; thence south seventeen and one-half degrees, east nine perches; ~~north eighty-five degrees, east nine and one-half degrees, east nine perches; north eighty-five degrees, east nine and four-tenths perches;~~ south fifty-eight and three-quarters degrees, east one hundred and forty-six and eight-tenths perches to the west corner of the "Mount Gabor" Church Lot; thence bounding on said church lot, south twenty-eight degrees, east nine and three-tenths perches to the south corner of said lot; thence south thirty-seven and one-half degrees, west twenty-one links of the chain to the lot sold to E. F. D. Belt's lot; thence reversely with said Belt's lot south eighty-four and three-quarters degrees, east fourteen perches; north forty-five degrees, east twenty-two perches to the middle of the Hoffmansville and Middletown Road; thence in said road north forty-four and three-quarters degrees, west three and thirty-five one-hundredths perches to the south corner of the Mansion House lot; thence bounding thereon two courses, to wit; north forty-seven and one-half degrees, east nineteen and one-quarter perches to a stake; thence north forty-nine and one-quarter degrees, west twenty-one and one-tenth perches to the east corner of the Mount Tabor Church lot; thence bounding on lot No. 2 of the Gunpowder Tract, reversely, north thirty-seven and one-half degrees, east seventy-nine and four-tenths perches to intersect the nineteenth line of a tract of land called "Mary's Delight"; thence with said tract south twenty-five degrees, east twelve and two-tenths perches; and south forty-five and three-quarters degrees east, twenty and three-quarters perches to the end of the ninth line of the tract of land called "Grist Mill Hill"; thence reversely with said line south forty-nine degrees, east eighty-one and one-half perches to the beginning, containing one hundred and thirty-seven acres, two roods and twenty-one square perches, more or less, exclusive of the lots heretofore sold and conveyed to the School Commissioners of Baltimore County, to Jennie M. Beginning for the same at an iron bolt driven into the ground in the County road from Hoffmansville to Alesie at the end of the first line of the lot laid out for and conveyed to G. Dorsey Belt by George W. S.  east two and one-half perches) and south ten degrees west (all three of these bearings  
 affected by local attraction) six and six-tenths perches, to a stone, a corner of the  
 land of formerly William McCullough; thence bounding thereon, south sixty-seven degrees,  
 east twenty-two perches; south sixty-five and one-quarter degrees, east forty-two and one  
 quarter perches; south sixty-four and one-quarter degrees, east twelve perches; south sixty  
 degrees, east twenty-four and six-tenths perches to a stone planted; thence south twenty-  
 one and one-quarter degrees, west twenty-two and three-quarters perches; thence bounding  
 on the land of Ephraim Ebaugh, north seventy-one degrees, west thirty-one and one-quarter  
 perches, and south thirty-four degrees, west twenty-four perches; thence with the land of

 west (bearing affected by local attraction, reversing south twenty degrees, east) one hun-  
 dred and forty-two perches, more or less, to the end of a line drawn north eighty-seven  
 degrees, west twelve perches from the beginning; thence reversely with said line, south  
 eighty-seven degrees east twelve perches to the white Oak tree at the beginning, contain-  
 ing one hundred and seventy-six acres, two rods and twenty-six square perches, more or less.
