# National City Lines Founder

E. Roy Fitzgerald, 64, president of National City Lines, which operates public transportation facilities in 42 cities including Baltimore, died yesterday in St. Luke's Hospital, Chicago, after a four-week illness.

National City Lines last year conditionally bought, then refused to buy, Capital Transit Co. in Washington.

Mr. Fitzgerald, who established NCL in Chicago with his four brothers in 1936, entered the transit business on a "shoestring" in Eveleth, Minn., in 1919.
