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By referring to the papers filed by the Claimants for negroes named Monday, it will be found that the age no one agrees with the age of the negro called Monday Brown, but the one claimed by Mr James McSoley -

I should then be any defect, ^{as to form} or other proof wanting I presume you will have the goodness to advise me thereof when it shall be most convenient to yourself, and so direct me, that the person for whom I am acting as well as myself, may have an equal chance with others, to recover the value of our Flavy.

The agent submits the case of James M. Solley on the affidavits filed with his papers - & states that on the lists of negroes furnished by the British Government - there appears ~~five~~^{four} negroes named Monday to wit -

Page 5. Monday Mirley who was on board the Regular of Amelia Island on the 22 Feb. 1815 on which day he was transferred to the Diagon - for the position of the Regular on the 17 Feb. - see the Extract from her log book page 63.

Page 29 Monday Christopher who was on board the Erebus 14 & 15 day of March 1815 off Amelia Island - the position of the Erebus is shown by the note opposite the name of this negro.

Page 73. Monday Brown appears on the Halifax list. aged twenty years - the age of this negro corresponds with that of the negro claimed by Mr Solley - & is probably the same negro -

Page 82 Monday Golden - appears on the Halifax list - upon examination appears to be the property of Mrs Sarah Sedney

The printed list of claims shows five negroes named Monday to be claimed & no more - four from Maryland at pages 17. 27. 29. ~~31~~ & one from Georgia at page 102 - the pretensions of the claimants may be decided by reference to the ages of these negroes - Monday Brown is reported between the 27 April 18. & the 24 Oct. 1818 on the Halifax list as 20 years of age; the deposition of Mr Solley shows his negro was 18 in August 1814.
