On this Twenty eight day of April eighteen hundred and twenty one personally appeared before me the subscriber one of the Justices of the peace for Calvert County and made oath on the holy evangelist of Almighty God, that some time in the month of July eighteen hundred and fourteen while the British enemy layed in the Patuxant River she lost the above named negroes Ellay, Harriot, and Sidney - and they were of the names, sex, and ages described above, and that she believes they would have sold for the above described prices, and that she verily believes were taken away by the British enemy

On this twenty eight day of April eighteen hundred and ^{twenty one} personally appeared before me a Justice of the peace in and for the County aforesaid, Susanna Rawlings and made oath on the holy evangelist of Almighty God, that some time in the month of July eighteen hundred and fourteen, while the British enemy were in the Patuxant River, she the said Susanna Rawlings did lose the above named negroes Ellinty Sawney & Peter and they were of the ages, sex, and colors described above, and believes they would have sold at that time for the above described prices - and that she verily believes were taken away by the British enemy - and she was offered six hundred dollars for Sawney in the month of August eighteen hundred and fourteen

Personally appeared Colonel Brooke before me a Justice of the Peace in and for the said County, and made oath on the holy Evangelist of almighty God that in the year of 1814 Susant Newing, owned, as slaves for life, three negroes viz Mary aged 48 or 50 the wife of a negro Man called William Mitchell - Harriott aged 10 or 12 and Sidney, aged 7 or 8 years the said Harriott and Sidney being the children of the said Mary - that in the summer of the same year while the British fleet was in the waters of the Patuxent river the said negroes Mary, Harriott and Sidney, eloped from their mistress and went on board the British fleet - that said William Mitchell was the property of Mrs Ann Dore of the said County, and that he also eloped from his mistress and went to the British fleet at or about the same time that the said negroes Mary, Harriott and Sidney have been entirely lost to their said mistress

Maryland Calvert County, to wit

Personally appeared Colonel Brooke before me a Justice of the Peace in and for the said County, and made oath on the holy Evangelist of almighty God that in the year 1814 Susanna Newing owned, as slaves for life, three negroes viz Alexander or Lawsony - aged 24 or 25, Peter 14 or 15 - Minty 38 or 40 - that Alexander or Lawsony was known once went by the name of Alexander or Lawsony Lovington, that Peter being a youth claimed no Sir name positively, but at times called himself Peter Newing, (his father was known by the name Goler, or Washington) Minty was known by the name of Minty Gurney - that in the summer of the same year, while the British fleet was in the Patuxent river the said negroes as a fore mentioned eloped from their mistress and went on board the British fleet, and has been entirely lost to their said mistress

Millicent Rawlings appears as a claimant for three negroes on the definitive list at page 27 - viz Mary - Harriett & Sidney - She proves by the deposition of a witness named "Colonel Brooke" that in the year 1814 she owned as slaves for life the three above named negroes - that in the summer of the same year while the British were in the Patuxent river the said negroes eloped from their mistress & went on board the British fleet & that they have been entirely lost to the claimant - It is proved by this witness that Mary was aged about 50 years - that she was the wife of a negro man named William Mitchell who was the property of Ann Dace & that Sidney & Harriett were the children of Mary - this deponent also proves that William Mitchell eloped from his mistress & went to the British -

The Board is respectfully referred to the case of Ann Dace a Maryland claimant, for proof of the facts of the connection between William & Mary, & that they absconded to the British -

The claimant is without other proof of the time when these negroes were removed from the U States than that furnished by the Halifax list, which purports to be a list of negroes received into the province of Nova Scotia "from the U States of America" after the 27 April 1815 & consequently after the peace - on that list at page 91 is found a negro called William Mitchell in company with his wife - they are there represented to be old persons, as the proof shows the negroes of Mrs Dace & Miss Rawlings to have been - no mention is made in the list of the children, Sidney & Harriett, the presumption however is that they were not separated from their parents & that

On this 3^d day of January 1828 personally appeared Thomas Tucker before me the Subscriber a Justice of the peace in & for the County of Calvert and made Oath on the Holy Evangel of Almighty God, that he was personally acquainted with negro Pot or Potty who were generally called and known by the name of Potty Gray and her child Mary - both of said negroes he knew to be the property of John Tucker which was taken & carried away by the British whilst in the waters of the Patuxent River during the late war to the best of his knowledge
