 On this Twenty Seventh day of April in the year of
 our Lord Eighteen hundred and twenty, and personally
 appeared before me the subscriber a Justice of the Peace
 in and for Calvert County Ann Goller and made
 oath on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God that
 some time in August in the year Eighteen Hundred
 and fourteen, a party of the British Enemy (whose vessels
 were at that time at the mouth of the River Patuxent)
 came to her house and carried off the following Negroes
 the property of her the said Ann Goller, two of whom
 were taken very much against their inclination

Negro ^{man} David Armstrong ^{atfadyman} aged about 40 years, worth \$600. -
 Negro man Jacob Goler aged about 30 years - worth 500. -
 Negro Boy Hammond Goler aged about 8 years - worth 300. -
 Negro Girl Rosetta Goler aged about 6 years - worth 250. -
 \$1650

That she the said Ann Goller saw one of her said Negroes
 (man Jacob) at the mouth of said River, on board with
 a party of said Enemy, and as soon as he the said man
 Jacob saw her she went on board of one of the
 ships and that she the said Ann Goller has never seen
 either of her said Negroes since - The said Ann Goller
 further stated that a British person (as he called himself)
 asked her how many Negroes she had on board of the
 fleet and their names, and after her telling him, he
 produced a list of the Negroes, and called over the
 names of those of which were taken away from her
 by the said British Enemy

The Evidence in this case is that Jacob Golan or Goales, absconded in company with his wife and two children Hammond & Rosetta. The Halifax list at page 82 contains the name of a negro named Jacob Goales, there represented to be in company with his wife & two children - the coincidence is so striking as to leave no doubt that they are the same negroes lost by the Claimant Mr. Solley -

The negro David Armstrong I have not been able to find on either of the lists, the Evidence is sufficient to prove that he went to the English shipping, & not unlikely to some one of those ships, then in the port, of whose Books no returns have been furnished -
