Be it remembered that on this 17th day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty seven Doctor Thomas Gantt of said County personally appeared before the subscriber a Justice of the Peace of the State of Maryland in and for Calvert County aforesaid & being sworn on the Holy Evangelist of Almighty God, deponeth & saith, that as Executor of his Father the late Rev^d Edward Gantt of said County deceased, he did about the year eighteen hundred & eleven pay over to Ann Gantt one of the daughters and representatives of the said Edu^d Gantt the testator (& who afterwards intermarried with George Wilkinson of said County) as a part of the personal estate to which the said Ann Gantt was entitled - One negro Lad, by the name of Daniel & that several of said negro Daniels family, that is, several of said Daniels Brothers had assumed the surname of Maynard & that he understands that said Daniel had assumed the aforesaid surname of Maynard before he deserted to the British -

This deponent also further saith that he was well acquainted with & had known for several years a negro man the property of Benjamin A. Mackall of said County whose christian name was Harry and who he understands had assumed & taken the surname of Gross -

That the said negro Harry had for his wife a negro woman named Mary who had also constituted a part of the personal estate of deponents said testator and had been paid over to the said Ann Gantt by the deponent as Executor as aforesaid: also, that a negro child by the name of Jacob which was paid over as aforesaid to the said Ann Gantt was as this deponent heard about the time (on the day the negroes aforesaid

were taken off by the British) claimed & owned as her child
by the aforesaid negro Mary

On this Seventeenth day of May Eighteen Hundred and
Twenty one, there personally appears Samuel Nutwell
before me the Subscriber a justice of the peace for the
County and State aforesaid, deposes and saith that
he the said Samuel Nutwell did see a number of
Negro Slaves leave the Lot of Mr. George Wilkinson
in Hunting Town, under the guard of an armed
British Soldiers who conducted them to where
they joined the army at some little distance from the Town, which Negro
Slaves was said to be the property of the said George Wilkinson and I have
every reason to believe, and none to doubt they being the Negro Slaves alluded
to by the said George Wilkinson he the said Samuel Nutwell further deposes

and saith that the Negro slaves here alluded to was taken from the above
place and by the British Soldier on the sixteenth day of July
eighteen hundred and fourteen. —

Sometime in the month of July 1814 being the
day that the Tobacco warehouse in Hunting
Town was burnt by the British Troops under
the command of Capt. Nured, I met with
the British Troops accompanied by a number
of Negroes amongst whom were several of
Mr. Gray's Wilkinsons, some of which shew'd
an unwillingness to go on & halted when
I met them; they were ordered to march on by
some men who were following on wth crags
Bayonets immediately behind them, when they
went on — one of the said Negroes appear'd to
be much distressed

Calvert County & made oath that the above
Statement is just & true

On this 12th day of October 1821 personally appeared
Thomas M Harris before me the subscribed a Justice of the
peace for the County aforesaid and made oath on the Holy
Evangelist of Almighty God that on the 1st day of June
1814 the British Troops under the Command of Capt. Nurse
came to Hunting Town and after destroying the Tobacco
warehouse and committing other depredations, that when
they were about to leave that place, for the place of embar-
-cation, that some of the men went to the house of W. George
Willis in said place and fired several times in his
kitchen (as appeared to this deponent) where his negroes
were, as if with an intention to frighten them, and took
his negroes from thence with them, that when the negroes
left the place they appeared to be compelled to go by the
British forces, as they were crying so as to be heard by this
deponent who was at the distance of about one hundred
yards, that this deponent verily believes they were the
same negroes as described by W. George Willis in
his account. to the best of his knowledge and belief
