D. of Columbia appeared before me the  
the subscriber a Justice of the peace for the  
County and district aforesaid in the State of Maryland  
Prince George County in the State of Maryland  
and made oath on the holy Evangel of Almighty  
God that a certain Negro boy named Dory, and mentioned  
in the foregoing deposition of Basil Hutton was the  
property of Jeremiah DeWitt of Prince George  
County Maryland, and was about the age of  
seventeen years when, as he believes, said Dory  
went on board the British Squadron in the  
year 1814, then lying in the River Potomac  
near Fort Mifflin - and that he believes  
said Dory was worth four hundred dollars  
at that time

On this 25<sup>th</sup> day of Nov. 1824. before me  
(the subscriber a Justice of the peace in and for  
said County, appears Basil Hutton, who  
being sworn on the holy Evangel of  
a mighty God, doth and saith that  
some time late in August or the first  
of Sept. eighteen hundred and fourteen,  
he this deponent heard in Alexandria  
the British Squadron lay of there, that  
one of the Squadron were on that day to  
drop down the Potomack near Fort Washing-  
ton to receive Negroes on board, who were  
waiting in the neighbourhood of Fort  
Washington for that purpose, he this deponent  
on the next day went to Warrenton, the  
Residence of Thomas Digges late of said  
County which was adjacent to Fort  
Washington, he this deponent while there



Saw a British Schooner, lying in the Mouth  
of Swan Creek and with a Spy Glass  
he recognized a negro boy named  
Dony the Property of Jeremiah Eaden  
one of his Neer Neighbors together with  
Many other Negroes belonging to this adjacent  
Neighbourhood, and further this deponent  
saith that he is sure that said Negro  
boy Dony has never returned to his  
Master Jeremiah Eaden since, and  
further this deponent saith not

Negro boy is on board of the  
British Squadron then lying near  
Fort Washington in the Potomack river  
and that he never sold or disposed  
of him in any way, nor has heard  
of him since, and further this deponent

these presents shall come hereunto know  
ye that on the eleventh <sup>day</sup> of  
March <sup>in</sup> the year of our Lord  
one thousand eight hundred and  
twenty six — by and before me Freeman Tyler  
Register of Wills of Prince Georges County our Trustee and  
said State of Maryland duly thereto constituted and appointed  
for probate of Wills and granting administrations according  
to the directions of the act of assembly in that case made  
and provided, Administration of all and singular the goods,
