Was taken from me the Subscribers by the British
Enemy while Lying in the Patuxant River the
Following negroes
Viz -

- one Negro Man named Ben about 50 years of
age worth at that time \$150.00
 - one Negro woman Name Easter about
36 years of age worth at that time \$300.00
 - one Negro Boy about 3 or 4 years of
age name Hilary worth at that time \$100.00
- \$550

State of Maryland Calvert County & wit
on this the Third Day of May Eighteen Hundred & Twenty
Three. Personal appeared before me a Justice of
the peace in and for the county aforesaid Isaac Bowen
of Upper and makes oath on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty
God that on the Thirty first Day of August Eighteen
Hundred & fourteen while the British Enemy lay in
the Patuxant River that he the said Isaac Bowen
did lose the above negroes Ben 50 years of age worth
one Hundred & fifty Dollars and Easter 36 years of
age and worth Three Hundred Dollars and negro
Boy, ^{name Hilary} 3 or 4 years of age worth one Hundred Dollars

Sworn to before Benjamin Bowen

State of Maryland Calvert County To wit
On this the Third Day of May one thousand eight hundred
and twenty three personally appeared before me a Justice
of the peace in and for the County aforesaid John Butler
and made oath on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God
that on the Thirty first Day of August Eighteen Hundred &
fourteen while the British Enemy lay in the District
Neer that he the Deponent saw the Negroes of Mr
Geo Bowers of Jesses by the Name of Ben Easter
and Lilly and supposed they were worth five hundred
and fifty Dollars they were with the British on their way
to the Shipping and went on Board.

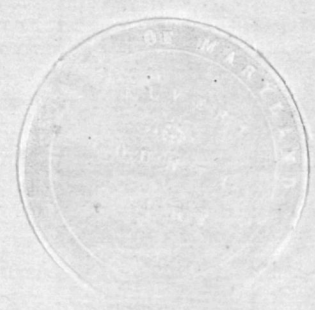
Sworn To before Peregrine Bowen

and at the same time above mentioned appeared
William Wood before me a Justice of the peace in and
for said County and made oath on the Holy Evangelists
of Almighty God that he did see the Negroes of
Geo Bowers of Jesses Ben Easter and Lilly
worth at that time five hundred & fifty Dollars and saw
them with the British on their way to their Shipping in
the Year of one thousand eight hundred & fourteen
on August the Thirty first and he saith he saw
them in the Barge going on Board so that they were
gone and never been seen since.

Be It Remembered that on this the Twentieth day of February 1828 personally appeared John M. Simmons of the County and State of aforesaid - before me a Justice of the Peace for Calvert County and State of aforesaid - and made oath on the Holy Scriptures of Almighty God that he was well acquainted with a Negro Woman, a Boy and a man - belonging to Isaac Bowen of Jersey who was carried off by the British in the late War - and that the said Woman was known and called by the name of Ester Bremer and that the boy was her son and called by the name of Lilly - and that the man was known and called by the name of Ben - & further said -

Sworn to before Benjamin Bowen

And he it Remembered that on the day and year above written appeared William Wood - before me a Justice of the Peace of aforesaid and made oath on the Holy Scriptures of Almighty God that he well knew the above Negroes and that their names was as above described and that they were then the property of Isaac Bowen of Jersey - and he further said that he saw them in company and under the protection of four Men of the British troops then with force and arms and saw them in the barge near to the fleet then lying at anchor in the Patuxent River in the year 1814 -
