Claim of J. P. Gale.

The name of one of the slaves is entered on the Definitive List, as Daniel, but by an inspection of the original papers and an attentive observation of the diagraphy, it will be seen that the true name is David, and that he was known by that, and the surname of Gale is proved by the depositions of Williams and Jones, filed in the claim of Edward Colbourn. David Gale is found on the British List page 23, entered thus - Da: Gale.

I John Done Clerk of Somerset County in the State of Maryland, do hereby certify to all whom it doth or may concern, that John Wilkins and Thomas Robertson Esquires before whom the within affidavits appear to have been taken, and whose signatures are respectively affixed thereto, were at the time of their taking and certifying the same, two of the Justices of the peace of the State aforesaid, for the County aforesaid, duly commissioned and sworn, and that full faith and credit ought to be given to all acts done by them as such, as well in Courts of Justice as in Court.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of my office this fourth day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty one.





I John P. Gale do make oath on the Holy Scriptures
of Almighty God, that on or about the month
of May in the year one thousand eight hundred
and fourteen, two Negro Men, slaves for life,
the property of my Mother since deceased, ran off
and went or board some of the British Vessels
lying in Terrier Cove and were carried away.
that I claim them in right of the Estate of my
Mother, acting for the legal heirs thereof. that
the names of the slaves so carried away were
David aged about twenty three and Nathan aged
about twenty one years, and according to the
prices current at that time they would have
sold for the sum of four hundred Dollars
each. Witness my hand and seal this 27th day
of April in the year one thousand eight
hundred and twenty one.
