This day personally appeared before me a Justice of the Peace for the county of Alexandria and District of Columbia John G. Lindsay of the county of Prince Georges & State of Maryland and made oath on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God that in the month of August 1814 when the British Squadron under the command of Capt. Gordon lay before the Town of Alexandria that he the said Lindsay being at that time a Resident of the aforesaid Town did then and there see a man slave called Stephen or Stephen Allen the property of Henry P. Dangerfield of Prince Georges County & State of Maryland in company with the officers & sailors of the aforesaid Squadron - That the said Slave was engaged in aiding the sailors in rolling barrels of Flour out of a warehouse in the town of Alexandria, that he conversed with him when thus employed and that he believes that slave Stephen or Stephen Allen disappeared with the British Squadron and has never been heard of since - The said John G. Lindsay was raised upon the Farm of the aforesaid Henry P. Dangerfield, has for many years resided in its immediate vicinity & was perfectly acquainted with slave Stephen or Stephen Allen -

Prefixed you have the Affidavit relating to one of the negroes claimed by me under the treaty of Ghent certified as you indicated in your last favour. I trust you will lay it before the board of Comm^{rs}; for as much as it may be worth. With regard to the other slave Ned Carey upon examination his family name seems to be Gray & which he may probably have adopted; but of proof that he was really taken by the British I have none other than the testimony now in your possession nor I fear the remotest chance of getting better. To the Commission under the Treaty of
Ghent for settling the Claims for the Loss of
Slaves during the last War

Washington D.C.

This day personally appeared before us two of the Justices
of the peace for the County of Prince Georges & State of Maryland J.
Henry P. Dangerfield of the aforesaid County & State and made
oath upon the holy Evangelists ^{of almighty God} that he the said Dangerfield lived
nearly opposite to the town of Alexandria District of Columbia in
August 1814 when the British Squadron under the command of
Capt. Gordon lay before that place and that at that time two
negro men belonging to him eloped in the night and he
verily believes went on board of said Squadron and
that they have never been seen or heard from since - One of
the Negro men called Nea Cary, slender make, black com-
plexion, about 30 years old and 5 feet 9 or 9 inches high. The
other called Stephen a dark mulatto, 25 years old and
about 5 feet 6 or 8 inches high - Witness our hands this
18th day of November 1824

This day personally appeared before us two of the Justices
of the peace for the county of Prince Georges & State of Maryland John
Lindsay & John Allison of the aforesaid County & State and made oath on
the holy Evangelists ^{of almighty God} that in August 1814 when the British Squadron
under the command of Capt. Gordon lay before the town of
Alexandria they were adjoining neighbours of J. H. P. Dangerfield
and that they verily believe that the two Slaves Nea Cary and
Stephen mentioned in the above certificate did then and there
make their escape on board of said Squadron and have never

been heard from since - We also further certify that we were personally
& particularly acquainted with said slaves, that we believe them
to have been worth about Four hundred dollars each - Witness
our hands this 11th day of November 1824 -
