I here by Certify that I was acquainted with negro Isaac claimed by Mr Thomas T. Simmons (and from him conveyed to Mr Levin W. Ballard) under the treaty of Gent, that Isaac was called by some of the Negroes in the neighbourhood Isaac Coates, by others Isaac Hays, the farther of Isaac I was well acquainted with, he in this early part of life went by the name of Jack Hays, but the latter part of his life he took the name of Jack Carter from the best information I have or can get, is that Isaac surname is either Coates Hays or Carter, which can not be fairly Determined

I hereby Certify, That I heard Capt. Thomas M'Pherson ^{deceased} say that in the fall of Eighteen Hundred and Fourteen, he saw my Man Isaac, with a sword hanging by his side, or in his hand, with the British Soldiers, travelling his potatoes, and after getting what potatoes they pleased he went with them to Treceys Landing Warehouse, a house for the Reception & Inspection of Tobacco situated on Henning Creek which leads into the Chesapeake Bay. The said Negro Man Isaac had left my Farm a few days prior to that time, and never afterwards returned to my service, from the Circumstances of his having a sword, and being in Company with the British Soldiers, I do verily believe he went on board of the British Ships then lying in the Chesapeake Bay and but a short distance from Treceys Landing. The above mentioned Negro Isaac I have no claim to whatever as I have sold all my right of him to Mr. Levin W. Ballard, for a valuable Consideration
