Be it Remembered that on this 16th day of
April One thousand eight hundred and Twenty eight
personally appears before me the Subscriber one of
the Justices of the Peace and for said County Ann Shulbin
-tine (a respectable white inhabitant) who deposes
and says that she was well acquainted with a
Negro Woman by the name of Betsy Jackson who
was hired to her together with her two Children
named Henry and Clarissa, the property of
Miss Margaret M. A. Carroll, late of the
County aforesaid (deceased) and that the name of
Betsy's youngest Child was Clarissa, and as I have
-scent been improperly called Calista in the def-
-initive list, in consequence of the great distance
the owner resided at; from where said Slaves liv-
-ed a distance (at the period of their going to the
British); and as far as I can learn owner had been
-misinformed of the name of this Child, this depon-
-ent further says that the said Slaves went on
board the British fleet, during the late
war, (and the same year that they were hired to her)
and that they have never returned to their owner
or owners, and further this deponent says that

Be it remembered that on this 11th day of March 1828 appeared before me the subscriber a Justice of the Peace in and for the County aforesaid, Robert Jackson, and Maketh oath that he was well acquainted with a Mulatto woman named Betty or Betsey Jackson aged about 25 or 26 years, and that he knew her to be the property of Margaret M. A. Carroll of St. Marys County and State aforesaid, and that he fully believes said slave went away with the British invading fleet during the late war. He the deponent further saith that he was well acquainted with her son a small boy named Henry about 8 years of age who accompanied his mother to the British at the period of her elopement. he knows said slaves has never returned to their owner.

Be it remembered that on this 9th - day of January in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and Twenty eight personally appeared George W. Biscoe before the subscriber one of the Justices of the Peace of the said district, and being duly sworn deposed and sayeth that in the month of September in the year one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, he went on board the British Ship of War Dragon commanded by Commodore Parry, then lying at the mouth of Patuxent River, and whilst on board said ship he saw there a Negro Boy named Henry, whom he knew to be the property of Miss Margaret M. A. Canoll of the County of Saint Marys and State of Maryland, and that on stating to the first Lieutenant of said ship that he knew said Boy and also his mother, the Lieutenant in reply stated to him that she and her child named Clarissa were then on board said ship - this deponent knows that the said Negroes has never returned to Miss Canoll their owner: or any one else, to his knowledge.

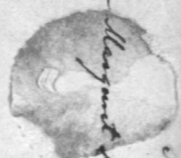

Dear Sir

I have the pleasure to forward you by Mr. Carroll, the deposition of Robert Jackson, the husband of Betsey - or Betty Jackson, whose name is to be found on the Halifax list page 87. Her child named Henry is to be found on page 39 - the above named Robert Jackson was the husband to Betty many years before she ran away, and to my knowledge Jackson has always been his name, & Henry is his son. in the absence of Capt. Carroll, who has authorised me to act for him I have to request that you will submit this claim immediately, fearing lest the Board will adjourn until Decr. if you succeed please to apprise me of it & I will come on with a power of attorney for you to draw the money. I write in haste Mr. Carroll is about to be off.
