

Maryland Prince Georges County Court

On this 23rd day of August in the year 1824 before me the subscriber one of the Justices of the peace in and for said County appears John Oden who being duly sworn on the Holy Evangelys of Almighty God, deposes and says on oath that in the month of August 1814 whilst the British fleet was up the River Potomack and lying between Mount Vernon and Fort Washington, he the deponent did see a negro man named Isaac aged as he thinks from 18 to 20 years, the property of Thomas L Maccubbin of said County enter a British boat at the mouth of Piscataway Creek and go on board of the British fleet then lying in the Potomack river and further this deponent says that he verily believes that the said negro Isaac was taken out of the ~~territory of the~~ United States by the British Whipping and that he is satisfied in his own mind that the said Thomas L Maccubbin did not sell or dispose of said negro Isaac further this deponent says that sworn to before me the subscriber on the day above mentioned as Witness my Hand -

On this 3rd day of September 1824
before me the subscriber a Justice of the Peace in
and for said County appears Thomas L Macculbin
and makes oath on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty
God that in the month of August 1814, his
negro man named Isaac about Eighteen
years of age eloped from him (he then living
in the village of Piscataway in said County)
and he verily believes that said negro Isaac
went on board of the British Shipping then
lying in the river Potomack and that since
the time mentioned above when said negro
eloped he has not seen him, nor has
he ever sold him the said negro Isaac or
disposed of him in any manner whatever
and that he verily believes the said negro
Isaac to have been worth at the time he
eloped the sum of five Hundred Dollars

On this seventh day of March in the year
Eighteen Hundred and twenty eight before me
one of the Justices of the peace of the said State
for the County aforesaid, appears John Smith
and deposes and says that he lived near
Piscataway in the year 1814, that he knew and
was well acquainted with Isaac Dines who
was a slave the property of Thomas McCubbin
of Prince Georges County Maryland - that the
said Isaac Dines was about 17 or 18 years
of age and of dark complexion, the said
slave left his masters employ in the year 1814
whilst the British Fleet was in the waters
of the Potomack - at which time it was reported
and generally believed in the neighbourhood
that said slave Isaac Dines had eloped and
gone on board of the British Squadron
then in the Potomack River - Since
the time of his elopement ^{the deponent} hath not
seen, nor heard of him more than as
aforesaid - Sworn to and subscribed by the
said deponent this the day and year above
written before me
