On the 27th day of March 1823 personally app-
-eared, before me the subscriber a Justice
of the Peace in and for the County aforesaid,
Wathirna Bowie, Administrator of John
B Bowie, and made oath on the Holy Evan-
-gelly of Almighty God, that negro Phill
aged about twenty years absconded from
her ^{late} deceased husband, the said John B Bowie
about a Week or ten days before the
British Troops entered the Town of Upper
Marlboro during the late War and that he
the said negro has never been seen nor heard
from by her, since the said British Troops
embarked from Stonington

ten days, before the British Troops entered the
town of Upper Marlboro, during the late war
and that in his opinion the said negro was
worth five hundred dollars

Maryland Prince Georges County to wit

On the 28th day of February 1822 personally appears before me the subscriber Justice of the peace in and for the county and state aforesaid, Humphrey Bell, and made oath on the Holy Evangelly of almighty God, that shortly after the capture of Washington by the British Troops, he was informed by the late Colonel Patrick Sim, who lived in a place called the Long old Fields, thro' which some of the British Troops passed, on their march from the said City to Upper Marlboro, on the 26th day of August 1814, that he the said Patrick Sim did then and there see negro Phill a Black man, the property of the late Bro B Rome, marching in company with the ^{said} British Troops - and also ^{that} the said negro man, was in the opinion of ^{him} the said Humphrey Bell ~~was~~ worth five hundred dollars
