claim for property forfeited

The State of Maryland Queen Anns County to wit,  
on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of Sept. in the year eighteen hundred  
and twenty one personally appeared before me one of the  
Justices of the peace for Queen Anns County Mary  
Alloway a Citizen of Queen Anns County who made  
oath on the holy evangelist of Almighty God that  
on or about the 5<sup>th</sup> day of August 1813 the British  
troops under the Command of Sir Sidney Beckwith  
accompanied by the naval command of Admiral  
Warren took possession of Kent Island and contin-  
-ued to occupy the same until about the twenty seven  
[day of the same month that during the same time  
the British took from her one negro woman, <sup>named Priscilla</sup> slave of  
the value of Three Hundred Dollars, aged about 30 years,  
nine Sheep of the value of eighteen Dollars sixty head  
of Geese of the value of thirty Dollars one steer of the  
value of thirty Dollars one Feather Bed and furniture  
of the value of seventeen Dollars one desk of the value  
of ten Dollars one walnut dining Table of the value  
of six Dollars one large Trunk of the value of three  
Dollars two linen and one Woollen Wheel of the value  
of seven Dollars one Broad Axe of the value of three  
Dollars two sets of carpenters tools of the value of  
twenty Dollars one pair of Heat Irons of the value of  
one Dollar, one pair of steelyards of the value of one  
Dollar two Barrels Corn of the value of six Dollars  
Four Turkeys of the value of three Dollars one pine  
Chest of the value of one Dollar one Frying pan  
of the value of one Dollar, At the same time personally  
appeared James <sup>Benton</sup> and made oath in like manner that  
he knew negro Priscilla mentioned in the deposition  
of Mary Alloway that he believes that the above  
mentioned negro slave at the time she was taken was  
of the age of 30 years and that he verily believes her  
to have been worth Three Hundred Dollars, And  
Mary Alloway the owner, and James Benton the witness  
verily believes that the above mentioned slave was in  
the possession of the British at the time of the  
ratification of the Treaty of Ghent, Sworn to before me
