Plans for the participa-tion of more than 120 elec-ted officials and community leaders from Maryland in a national black political con-vention were made Febr-uary 6 in Glenarden, at the initial meeting of the Maryland Black Caucus.

The convention will be held March 10-12 in Gary, Indiana. Provisional chair-men of the National Black Convention are Congressman Charles Diggs (D-Mich.,) and Imamu Amiri Baraka, internationally-known black nationally-known playwright and poet.

included Participants were: Delegates Arthur King, Kenneth Webster, and John Douglas. members of the Maryland General Assembly, Decatur Trotter, Jr., Mayor of Glanarden, and 150 other b.ack public officials and comindnity leaders over 5.000 voting delegates from all 50 states will attend the convention where a "black platform based on black needs" will be formulated to be presented to the Demonstrate and Population personal persona ocratic and Republican conventions this summer.

Del. Webster, in opening remarks to the Caucus,

stated "Blacks have historically supported the Denio-cratic Party and historically goven nothing. This pattern is going to be changed." The Caucus voted unani-

mously to accept a black platform based on three issues: economics politics, and education.

The Birck Caucus platform states that the crucial issue in education is that of quality schools vs bussing: there is no need, the Black Caulus asserts, "to follow white children into their areas if we wan, qualityeducation in our own areas." The group ex-

presses urgent concern a'so about the millions of dollars poured into white-oriented early childhood education. It is urgent, the Causus adds, to develop concern about the development in the schools of the black curriculum and the teaching of black values. The Caucus plat-form states that one of the central purposes of the Black National Convention will be to unite black voters to support a black plat-form. Delegate Webster "The approach of

said, "the masses will join the Caucus. This is a movement of the whole black community, not just the community leaders and elected officials. The whole black community is going to be involved in the Black Caucus, all socioeconomic strata."
