

## HUNTER-DAVIS PROBE BEGINS

### Grand Jury To Sift Charges Against "Bob" Davis.

The grand jury yesterday began its investigation of the charge made during the trial of former Police Captain B. J. Ward by the Police Board that Mrs. Maggie Hunter had paid money to Robert E. Davis, familiarly known as "Bob" Davis, to keep her from being indicted on the charge of keeping a disorderly house on North Carey street. Besides assembling the testimony concerning the charge taken before the Police Board, the grand jury has issued summonses for Mrs. Hunter and Edward Stowman, who, it is alleged, represented the woman in the alleged negotiation.

Mrs. Hunter did not appear and it was said she was too ill to leave her house. Mr. Stowman answered the summons and was called into the grand jury room. So far as known, no action was taken by the grand jury in the case.

The grand jury adjourned until Monday, when the investigation may be continued.

## TO COURT-MARTIAL LANGHORST

### General Wood Issues Orders For Lieutenant's Trial.

A special dispatch to THE SUN last night from Washington says:

The War Department has been notified that orders have been issued by General Wood, commanding the Department of the East, for the court-martial of First Lieutenant Adolph Langhorst, of Fort McHenry.

Lieutenant Langhorst has been returned to Fort McHenry and will be tried on charges of breaking arrest. Some weeks ago he was placed under arrest by the post commander. In the meantime he received orders to proceed to New Orleans for duty. According to the regulations, no one, officer or enlisted man, is subject to any other orders while under arrest.

The lieutenant escaped and it was some days before he was located. Finally he showed up in New Orleans at his new post of duty. He was promptly ordered returned to Fort McHenry for trial. He was brought back by Capt. H. C. Merriam and First Lieutenant A. L. Loustalot, who have been ordered to testify before the court. The trial will begin next Monday.
