By virtue of a special Warrant granted out of the Land Office on the Western Shore in the State of Maryland bearing date the 28th day of July 1796 to resurvey and lay out for Joseph Miller of said County all that tract of land called Guffey's Romantic Prospect originally on the 1st day of October 1774 granted Henry Guffey for 155 acres according to its ancient metes and bounds nevertheless correcting and amending any errors in the original survey and by my out lines adding any vacant land thereto contiguous be the same cultivated or otherwise &c.

I David Clark Surveyor of Harford County do hereby Certify that I have resurveyed and carefully laid out for and in the name of him the said Joseph Miller all that tract of land called Guffey's Romantic Prospect according to its ancient metes and bounds as shewed to me and find it contains one hundred and fifty five acres, I have also added to the said land the quantity of eighty two acres of vacant land in two parcels, and lastly I have reduced the whole into one entire tract bounded as follows Viz. Beginning at a large heap of stones on the West ^{side} and near the top of of a hill to the Northward of a spring known by the name of Dogwood Spring emptying into Broad Creek, it being the beginning of the original survey and running thence bounding on the Original Survey the two following Courses Viz. South fifty one degrees East sixty four perches North forty three degrees East twenty four perches thence South sixty five degrees East thirty four perches South twenty one degrees West thirty eight perches South fifty degrees East twenty eight perches South twenty six degrees and a half West thirty seven perches North thirty five degrees West sixty seven perches South fifty four degrees West twenty four perches South twenty degrees East twenty perches North twenty six degrees and a quarter East forty four perches to a black Rock stone in a branch on the North side of Broad Creek near the end of the South thirty degrees West sixty four perch line of a tract of land called The Meadow ground thence North twenty nine degrees East sixty four perches South fifty three degrees East sixty seven perches North forty two degrees East eighteen perches North fifty three degrees West one hundred and one perches North eighteen degrees and a half West thirty two perches to a bounded white Oak or Sapling on the North side of a branch thence North eleven degrees East forty eight perches and a half to a bounded white Oak Sapling a boundary of a tract of land called The Grove Enlarged thence bounding on said land reversely the three following Courses Viz. North eleven degrees and a quarter West seventeen perches and a half South eighty seven degrees West thirty two perches to a bounded black Oak marked with the letter R thence South nine degrees West twenty perches to the third line of the original survey thence thence bounding on said line North sixty nine degrees West sixty five perches to the end thereof thence still bounding on the original survey the two following Courses Viz. South seventy five degrees West fifty six perches South thirty one degrees and a third quarter West fifty one perches to the given line of the Grove enlarged aforesaid thence South twenty three degrees and a half West fifteen perches to the beginning of said land thence North sixty nine degrees and a quarter West two perches to the sixth line of the original survey thence South twenty two degrees West thirty six perches to the end of said line thence South twenty five degrees West twenty six perches North seventy degrees West twenty four perches North twenty five degrees West twenty perches West fifty perches North ten degrees East thirty six perches to two bounded black Oaks thence North forty degrees West thirty perches to a stone thence South sixty degrees West twenty two perches to a stone thence South twenty three degrees

degrees West twenty perches to a tree thence South sixty five degrees and three quarters East twelve perches and a half to two bounded Chesnuts by a large Rock Stone at the head of a spring thence North thirty two degrees and a quarter East sixteen perches South sixty five degrees East twenty perches South one degree West thirty two perches South thirty one degree and three quarters East twenty perches South four degrees and a half West twelve perches South fifty five degrees and a quarter East twenty six perches to a place North West six feet distant from a bounded Spanish Oak standing on the top of a hill thence South three degrees and a half West twelve perches and a half to a bounded white Oak in a valley thence South thirty nine degrees East fourteen perches North thirty seven degrees East twenty two perches South fifty five degrees and a half East eight perches North fifty four degrees and three quarters East eleven perches South fifty seven degrees and a half East twenty eight perches to the tenth line of the original survey thence bounding on said line South fourteen degrees and a half West twenty four perches to the end thereof thence still bounding on ~~The~~ Original tract the three following Courses West South twenty five degrees East sixty two perches North sixty seven degrees East eighty perches North eighty six degrees East thirty four perches and thence by a straight line to the beginning containing and laid out for two hundred and thirty seven acres and a half more or less to be held by the name of Prospect June the 23rd 1797

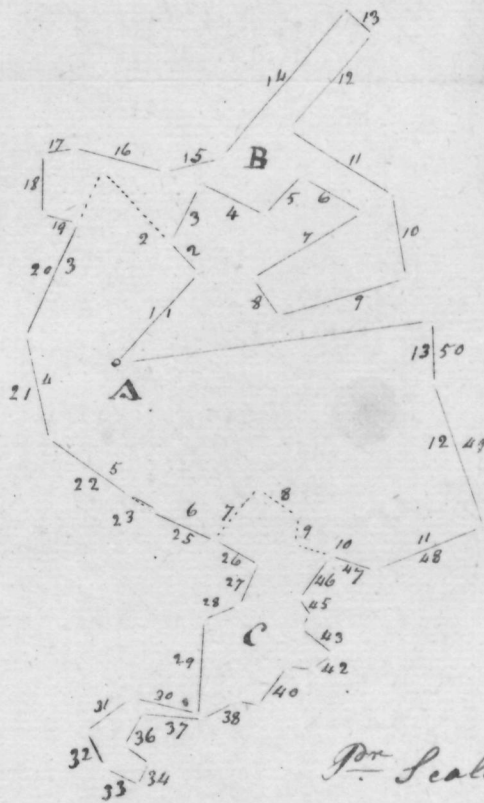
