

Joseph Miller his patent <sup>The State of Maryland &c to knowe that Whereas Joseph</sup>  
 23<sup>rd</sup> Prospect. Miller of Harford County on the twenty eighth day of July seventeen hundred  
 and ninety six obtained out of the western shore land office, a special warrant to resurvey a tract of land  
 called Guffy's Romantic Prospect lying in the County aforesaid originally on the first day of October  
 seventeen hundred and forty four granted Henry Gaffie for one hundred and fifty six acres, to resurvey said land  
 to correct errors and to add any contiguous Vacancy, In pursuance whereof a resurvey was made and a certificate  
 thereof returned by which it appeared that the said Land was found to contain One hundred  
 and fifty six acres, to which there was added the quantity of eighty two acres of Vacant Land, and he  
 having pursuant to Law paid to the treasurer of the western shore the sum of fifteen pounds five Shillings and  
 seven pence halfpenny Current Money Caution, and two Shillings and six pence for Improvements  
 The State of Maryland doth hereby Grant and Confirm unto him the said Joseph Miller the  
 said Land resurveyed as aforesaid with the Vacancy added and called Prospect lying in Harford County aforesaid  
 beginning at a Large heap of Stones on the west side and near the top of a hill to the northward of a spring  
 known by the name of Dogwood Spring emptying into Broad Creek it being the beginning of the original  
 Survey and running thence bounding on the original Survey the two following Courses by South fifty one  
 degrees East sixty four perches North forty three degrees East twenty four perches thence South sixty five degrees  
 East thirty four perches South twenty one degrees West thirty eight perches South fifty degrees East twenty  
 eight perches South twenty six degrees and a half West thirty seven perches North thirty five degrees West  
 Sixty seven perches South fifty four degrees West twenty four perches South twenty degrees East twenty  
 perches North twenty six degrees and a quarter East forty four perches to a black rock stone in a  
 branch on the north side of Broad Creek near the end of the south thirty degrees West sixty four  
 perch line of a tract of Land called The Meadow Ground thence North twenty nine degrees East forty  
 four perches South fifty three degrees East forty seven perches North forty two degrees East sixteen perches  
 North fifty three degrees West one hundred and one perches North eighteen degrees and a half West thirty two  
 perches a bounded white oak sapling on the north side of a branch thence North eleven degrees  
 East forty eight perches and a half to a bounded white oak sapling a boundary of a tract of Land called  
 The Grove enlarged thence bounding on said land resurvey the three following Courses by North eleven  
 degrees and a quarter West fourteen perches and a half South eighty seven degrees West thirty two perches to  
 a bounded black oak marked with the letter R thence South nine degrees West twenty perches to the  
 third line of the original Survey thence bounding on said line North sixty nine degrees West sixty five  
 perches to the end thereof thence still bounding on the original Survey the two following Courses by South  
 twenty five degrees West fifty six perches South thirty one degrees and three quarters West fifty one perches  
 to the given Line of The Grove enlarged aforesaid thence South twenty three degrees and a half West fifteen  
 perches to the beginning of said land thence North sixty nine degrees and a quarter West two perches to the  
 sixth line of the original Survey thence South twenty two degrees West thirty six perches to the end  
 of said line thence South twenty five degrees West twenty four perches North twenty degrees West  
 twenty four perches North twenty five degrees West twenty four perches West fifty perches North ten degrees  
 East thirty six perches to a bounded black oak thence North forty degrees West thirty six perches  
 to a stone thence South sixty degrees West twenty two perches to a stone thence South twenty three  
 degrees West twenty perches to a stone thence South sixty five degrees and three quarters East twelve perches  
 and a half to two bounded Chestnuts by a large rock stone at the head of a spring thence North  
 thirty two degrees and a quarter East fifteen perches South sixty five degrees East twenty perches South  
 one degree West thirty two perches South thirty one degrees and three quarters East twenty perches South  
 four degrees and a half West twelve perches South fifty five degrees and a quarter East twenty six perches  
 to a place North west for feet distant from a bounded Spanish oak standing on the top of a hill  
 thence South three degrees and a half West twelve perches and a half to a bounded white oak in a  
 valley thence South thirty nine degrees East fourteen perches North thirty seven degrees East twenty two  
 perches South fifty five degrees and a half East eight perches North fifty four degrees and three quarters  
 East eleven perches, South fifty seven degrees and a half East twenty eight perches to the tenth line of  
 the original Survey thence bounding on said line South fourteen degrees and a half West twenty four  
 perches

perches to the east thereof thence still bounding out the original tract the three following Courses vizt South twenty five degrees East sixty two perches North sixty seven degrees East eighty six perches North eighty six degrees East thirty four perches and thence by a straight Line to the beginning Containing and laid out for two hundred and thirty seven acres and a half more or less, according to the certificate of survey thereof taken and returned into the Land office bearing date the twenty third day of June seventeen hundred and ninety seven and there remaining together with all rights, profits, benefits, and privileges thereto belonging To have and to hold the same unto him the said Joseph Miller his heirs and assigns forever, Given under the Great Seal of the State of Maryland this fourteenth day of May seventeen hundred and ninety eight.

 by virtue of so much part of a special warrant for five acres obtained by him out of the Western Shore Land  
 office the eighth day of February seventeen hundred and ninety six, as appears, and he having, pursuant to  
 law paid to the treasurer of the Western Shore the sum of four shillings and nine pence current money being  
 the full composition due, The State of Maryland doth hereby grant unto him the said Joseph  
 Miller the said tract of land called Pauls Hill lying in Baltimore County aforesaid Beginning  
 at the end of the fourteenth line of a tract of Land called Wells's Manor and running thence, bounding on said  
 line reversely south forty four degrees East sixty seven perches until it intersects the second line of a  
 tract of Land called Castle Moor then bounding on said line South forty five degrees West six perches  
 to the end of said line then North forty four degrees West sixty six perches to the end of the fourth line of the  
 aforesaid tract of land called Wells's Manor and then with a straight Line to the first beginning Con-  
 taining and laid out for two acres and three eighths of an acre more or less; according to the certificate  
 of Survey thereof taken and returned into the Land office bearing date the twenty ninth day of April seventeen
