Ed,

I had a conversation with Dr. Larry Babits at East Carolina University, author of "A Devil of a Whipping - The Battle of Cowpens" (University of North Carolina Press, Chapel Hill, 1998) [referred to me by Ross Kimmel]:

- 1] No record of any unit with colors at Cowpens (including William Washington's "Seat Cushion" flag);
- 2] He does not believe that the center star of the "Cowpens Flag" represents Maryland;
- 3] Only elements of what had been formerly the Third Maryland (disbanded in August 1780 along with the Maryland Line) were present at Cowpens. They were merged to form a company with members of the former Maryland Fifth;
- 4] National colors only authorized for use by US military unit after 1830 only unit colors before this time;
- 5] Our "Cowpens Flag" may actually be a flag dating from the Mexican War or else a naval ensign.

the questions to be answered are:

1) any blacks serving with Maryland troops at the battle of Long Island

Ross Kimmel believes it to be "highly doubtful".

2) who commanded the third? Maryland at the Battle of Cowpens?

John Eager Howard would be the overall commander. The Third was not a "stand alone" unit. It was part of the second company of a regiment made up of portions of what had been the Maryland Line.

3) how plausible is the Batchelor story?

Professor Babits believes that Batchelor was dead prior to the Battle of Camden. I am still working on this research..

On a US government website I learned that "The Stars and Stripes was officially used in Army artillery units in 1834, and in infantry units in 1842".

I also spoke to a Smithsonian curator/chair Jennifer Jones regarding the Maryland/DC unit Mexican-American War flag on p. 29 of Cooper's book. Unfortunately, its dimensions are not recorded. She is going to get the information and e-mail it to me today.

I said that our "Cowpens Flag" appears to be much longer in its fly. She thought that it was probably a naval ensign and that such ensigns did have one star in the middle of the canton. I will check if the Naval Academy Museum has any examples of 19th c. naval ensigns.

Jones is the Chair of The Division of Military History and Diplomacy. She also gave me other resources to contact on flag issues.
