

OBITUARY.

Capt. Frederick C. Bryan.

Capt. Frederick C. Bryan, one of Baltimore's old shipmasters, died Saturday at Morris Plains, N. J., aged eighty-two years.

In his long sea service of thirty-nine years he commanded the ships Stephen Lurman, Mississippi, Louis Phillippi, James Cheston, Washington Booth and Sarah Newman. While in command of the last-named ship in the harbor of St. Thomas, Danish West Indies, October 29, 1857, the Newman was lost in the great hurricane that devastated the island and wrecked forty sail of vessels, which were either sunk or carried ashore by the tidal wave. Captain Bryan was detained until the following April before he returned to Baltimore.

Afterward he conducted the hardware and grocery business in Baltimore until ten years ago, when he retired. He then went to the Sailors' Song Harbor, on Staten Island. His body will be brought here for burial from the residence of his son, Mr. F. F. Bryan, 1035 Myrtle avenue. Mr. Edmund Bryan and Mrs. Essex Parsons, his other children, live in Baltimore.

John Records Long.

Mr. John Records Long, second son of the late Ellis R. Long, died yesterday at his home, the Arundel, on North Charles street, in the fifty-ninth year of his age.

For a number of years he was associated with his father in conducting a wholesale dry goods business on Baltimore street, near Liberty street. Later he was a member of the firm of Long & Dugdale, on South Gay street. He was also at one time connected with John S. Reese & Company, dealers in fertilizers.

Mr. Long married Miss Annie S. Harvey, who survives him, with two children—Ellis R. Long and Mrs. Alexander Santon.

Joseph Lichtner.

Mr. Joseph Lichtner, one of the oldest employees of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, died yesterday at his home, First and Tenth streets, Canton, aged seventy-three years. Fifty years ago Mr. Lichtner came to this country from Bavaria and entered the employ of the railroad company and for thirty-six years worked at Mt. Clear. In 1888 he was retired with a pension. Five children survive him.

Edward Bryan.

Mr. Edward Bryan, son of the late Capt. Valentine Bryan, of Queen Anne's county, died yesterday at his home, 1809 West Mulberry street. He was the last of six brothers. Mr. Olin Bryan, an ex-member of the Legislature from Queen Anne's, and Charles B. Bryan, ex-sheriff of the same county, are his nephews. Four children, two sons and two daughters, survive him. He was at one time a farmer in Queen Anne's county.

Mrs. Susan J. Smith.

Mrs. Susan J. Smith, widow of Wm. T. Smith, who in his day was one of the largest oyster packers in the city, died at midnight Saturday at her residence, 1302 Myrtle avenue. Mrs. Smith was born in Somerset county, Md., and was a daughter of Samuel T. Ford. She was eighty-two years of age. She has been a member of Starr Methodist Protestant Church since its erection. Mrs. Smith was noted for her charity. Five children survive her.
