enticing slaves to run away. Guilty—not sen-  
tenced.

State vs. George Bearily, indicted for entic-  
ing slaves to run away. Not guilty.

The case of Lieut. B. P. Dulany, indicted for  
an assault with an intent to kill upon John  
Lindenborn, was removed to Howard county.

A LETTER FROM GEN. ROSECRANS.—

private letter from Gen. Rosecrans to  
a gentleman in Washington:

"As to my removal from the com-  
mand of the Army of the Cumberland,  
I have only to say that I pray God  
that the country may be as well and  
better served by another. As for the  
infamous lies which are put forth  
through the Press to blast my repu-  
tation, such as disabling mental dis-  
ease, the use of opium, disobedience  
of orders, in not advancing when or-  
dered, in waiting reinforcements, &c.  
&c., if I thought they came from  
our government, I would despair of  
a nation headed by such a govern-  
ment. That the people will accept  
them or God will prosper their au-  
thors, I do not believe. Personally,  
I commend myself to the just and  
merciful One, who knows what is the  
best for me.

PARTICULARS OF SATURDAY'S FIGHT.

The loss of Gens. Sedgwick and  
French, in the battle on the Rappa-  
hannock, on Saturday, was four hun-  
dred.

Among the Federals wounded in  
the fight were the following officers  
of the Sixth Maryland Regiment:—  
Capt. George W. Buralham, Capt.  
Roberts, Lieuts. Chamberlain, Mar-  
tin, Smith, Jacobs and Potlie. They  
have been brought to Washington.

Nearly all the hard fighting in the  
action of Saturday last took place at  
Rappahannock Station; Gen. French  
having lost but 25 wounded—none  
killed—in his share of the action at  
Kelly's Ford.

So soon as General Sedgwick took  
the rebel redoubts at the "Station,"  
he turned their seven guns upon their  
pontoon bridge, immediately in the  
rear, knocking them into pieces be-  
fore more than a very few of the flee-  
ing foe could effect their escape over  
them.

The 7th (Webster's) Maryland  
Volunteers is the regiment which  
brought the prisoners to this city.

Richmond papers of Friday last  
seem impressed with the idea that  
Meade was advancing towards Freder-  
icksburg, and it is intimated that  
Lee had sent a considerable portion  
of his force to head off such a move-  
ment. If such was the case, the en-  
emy has probably felt some surprise at  
receiving the apprehended attack in  
a somewhat different quarter.

The prisoners which arrived here  
from the Army of the Potomac this  
morning, at 4 o'clock, was marched  
to the Old Capitol six a breast, and  
made a procession extending from  
Seventh street to beyond the Old  
Capitol. They numbered 1,736 in  
that lot. Other arrivals swell the  
number to over two thousand.

ANOTHER ACCOUNT OF SATURDAY'S FIGHT.

A correspondent of the New York  
Tribune writes on Sunday as follows:

General French's column reached  
Kelly's Ford first, in the afternoon,  
and a portion of the 3d corps rapidly  
crossed effecting a partial surprise of  
the enemy. They were found occupy-  
ing rifle pits and earthworks, and  
while a portion of our infantry were  
so posted on this side of the river as  
to prevent any retreat from their po-  
sition, another body of our troops  
made a sudden attack and succeeded  
in capturing nearly the whole force,  
numbering between 500 and 600, be-  
longing principally to the 2d North  
Carolina infantry.

The rebel works further back from  
the river were then vigorously shelled  
and the remainder of the forces has-  
tily retreated toward Rappahannock  
Station, where the other attack was  
progressing. The movements at this  
ford were well conducted, and our  
casualties are reported as slight, per-  
haps twenty wounded. No pontoons  
were used, the river being fordable.

Meanwhile General Sedgwick's col-  
umn approached Rappahannock Sta-  
tion. There they found the rebels in  
considerable force on this side of the  
river, occupying the works erected by  
our forces, and also entrenchments  
which they had recently thrown up  
for defensive purposes. As the col-  
umn approached a heavy artillery fire  
was opened from the rebel batteries,  
which were advantageously posted.  
The roads and the country being ex-  
ceedingly dry, the shot and shell  
raised clouds of dust, nearly blinding  
the men and hiding the rebels from  
view.

Our batteries replied vigorously,  
and under cover of their fire, a charge  
was gallantly made by the Fifth  
Wisconsin and a Maine regiment,  
who, with a terrific yell, dashed upon  
and carried the redoubts, bayoneting  
the rebels at their guns. Our loss
